By Representative Ross:

HB131 Relating to license tags; to amend Section 32-6-350, Code of Alabama 1975, to include additional veterans who were exposed to dangerous levels of radiation due to their service to those eligible to receive a distinctive license tag.

Military and Veterans' Affairs

FISCAL NOTE

HB131 as introduced would expand the Alabama Veteran Tag Program to include veterans who were exposed to dangerous levels of radiation due to their service. The required issuance fee to obtain this license plate is the same as for all other the plate license plates, \$23.00 annually and there is an additional issuance fee of \$3.00 in years when the actual metal plate is issued (initially and every five years thereafter). The standard fee is distributed as follows:

State General Fund	\$10.00
Public Road and Bridge Fund	\$ 9.30
Municipalities	\$ 2.52
Counties	\$ 1.18
Total	\$23.00

Finally, this bill could increase the administrative obligations of the Department of Veterans Affairs to provide certificates of eligibility to license plate applicants.

FISCAL NOTE

HB107 as introduced would establish a new distinctive license plate for motor vehicle owners who served in a component of the United States Armed Forces and received the Combat Action Ribbon, Combat Infantryman Badge, Combat Action Badge, or Air Force Combat Action Medal. The fee for the plate would be the same as for standard vehicles (\$23) and there would be an additional fee of \$3 for each plate issued. The standard fee would be distributed as follows:

State General Fund	\$10.00
Public Road and Bridge	\$9.30
Municipalities	\$2.52
Counties	\$1.18
Total	\$23.00

This bill would also establish a class C misdemeanor for falsely obtaining a military combat action special license plate and could increase receipts to the State General Fund and municipal general funds from fines; increase receipts to the State General Fund, county general funds, municipal general funds, and other funds to which court costs are deposited; and could increase the obligations of the State General Fund, district attorneys, and local jails by an undetermined amount dependent upon the number of persons charged with and convicted of this offense and the penalties imposed.

FISCAL NOTE

HB20 as introduced could increase receipts to the State General Fund from fines; increase receipts to the State General Fund, county general funds and other funds to which court costs are deposited; and could increase the obligations of the State General Fund, district attorneys, the Bureau of Pardons and Paroles and the Department of Corrections by an undetermined amount dependent upon the number of persons charged with and convicted of the offenses provided by the bill and the penalties imposed.

HB100 Relating to the Alabama Justice Information Commission; to amend Sections 41-9-590, 41-9-594, 41-9-625, and 41-9-650, Code of Alabama 1975, to mandate the collection and dissemination of biometric identifiers by certain entities; to authorize the use of certain approved biometric identification devices by law enforcement officers to identify individuals; to establish and provide for the operation of the Alabama Background Check Service; to add Sections 41-9-650.1, 41-9-650.2, 41-9-650.3, 41-9-650.4, and 41-9-650.5 to the Code of Alabama 1975, to authorize the Alabama State Law Enforcement Agency (ALEA) to perform authorized background checks for noncriminal justice purposes; to provide for approved types and uses of background checks for noncriminal justice purposes; to authorize the Secretary of ALEA to establish and collect fees for background checks for noncriminal justice purposes; to establish the Alabama Rap Back Program; to provide penalties for the misuse of a background check report; to make conforming changes to update terminology; to make nonsubstantive, technical revisions to update the existing code language to current style; and to repeal Article 4 of Chapter 2 of Title 32, Code of Alabama 1975, regarding the dissemination of criminal history information.

FISCAL NOTE

HB100 as reported by the Committee on Judiciary could increase receipts to the Public Safety Fund by an estimated maximum of \$673,000 annually beginning in Fiscal Year 2027, by authorizing the Alabama Law Enforcement Agency (ALEA) to increase the fee for certain background checks from either \$15 or \$25, under current law, up to \$30, as provided in this bill.

In addition, this bill could further increase the receipts to the Public Safety Fund by \$12 annually beginning in Fiscal Year 2027, for each individual enrolled in the Alabama Rap Back Program, which ALEA may establish pursuant to this bill. Per ALEA, these fees will offset any costs incurred to administer the program.

Finally, this bill could increase receipts to the State General Fund and municipal general funds from fines; increase receipts to the State General Fund, county general funds, municipal general funds, and other funds to which court costs are deposited; and could increase the obligations of the State General Fund, district attorneys, and local jails by an undetermined amount dependent upon the number of persons charged with and convicted of the offenses provided by this bill and the penalties imposed.

HB91 Relating to court fees; to amend Section 12-19-312, Code of Alabama 1975, to allow funds allocated to the sheriff's office to be expended to support the functions of his or her office.

FISCAL NOTE

HB91 as introduced would allow certain existing docket fees that are currently allocated to the sheriff's office to be used for the operation of the jail to instead be used for law enforcement purposes. This bill will not otherwise affect state or local funding.

In Fiscal Year 2024, an estimated cumulative total of \$605,578 of these fees were disbursed to sheriffs (average \$9,000 per county).

HB275 as introduced allows the Alabama Board of Athletic Trainers to join the Athletic Trainers compact: The provisions of this bill: (1) would increase the financial obligations of the Board by an undetermined amount dependent on the amount of the annual assessment fee levied by the Athletic Trainer Compact Commission on each member state to cover the costs of its operations, activities, staff, and annual budget as authorized in the compact; (2) may decrease the amount of license fees currently collected from licensed athletic trainers with out-of-state residences who decide to become licensed in their home state and practice in Alabama under the compact privilege by an undetermined amount annually; and (3) would increase receipts to the Board from fees imposed for the multistate license by an undetermined amount dependent upon the number of licenses issued and the fee amounts set by the Board.

Further, this bill would increase the administrative obligations of the Board to submit information to the commission's licensure data system as provided for by the provisions of this bill.

HB156 as introduced would allow the Alabama Board of Medical Examiners to join the Physician Assistant (PA) Licensure Compact. The provisions of this bill: (1) would increase the financial obligations of the Board by an undetermined amount dependent on the amount of the annual assessment fee levied by the PA Licensure Compact Commission on each member state to cover the costs of its operations, activities, staff, and annual budget as authorized in the compact; (2) could decrease the amount of license fees currently collected from licensed physician assistants with out-of-state residences who decide to become licensed in their home state and practice in Alabama under the compact privilege by \$44,000 annually; and (3) would increase receipts to the Board from fees imposed for the multistate license by an undetermined amount dependent upon the number of licenses issued and the fee amounts set by the Board.

Further, this bill would increase the administrative obligations of the Board to submit information to the commission's licensure data system as provided for by the provisions of this bill.

HB67 as reported by the Committee on Constitution, Campaigns and Elections would increase or decrease receipts to the Voter Registration Fund by an undetermined amount dependent on the difference in collections from: 1) the current one-cent per electronic voter record fee, set by the Secretary of State under current law; and 2) the amount set by the secretary up to \$1000 per voter list, as provided by this law.

According to the Secretary of State's Office, the office received 874 voter list requests in 2025, which generated approximately \$426,000 in receipts.

FISCAL NOTE

HB267 as introduced could increase the obligations of the State Forestry Commission by an undetermined amount dependent on the value of annual or sick leave earned by the State Forester as provided by this bill. This bill could also increase or decrease the commission's obligations by an undetermined amount dependent on the difference in actual travel expenses under current law and the per diem travel rate for state employees under this bill.

In addition, this bill would provide that certain construction projects of the commission would no longer be subject to the oversight of the Division of Construction Management, which could decrease or decrease obligations of the commission by an undetermined amount dependent on the cost differential in obtaining bids and contracts under current law versus as provided for in this bill.

This bill would also decrease the administrative obligations of the commission by: 1) increasing the maximum assessed value of a property before it is subject to the Land Sales and Leasing Act; and 2) allowing the commission to issue burn permits electronically.

Lastly, this bill could also increase receipts to the State General Fund and municipal general funds from fines; increase receipts to the State General Fund, county general funds, municipal general funds, and other funds to which court costs are deposited; and could increase the obligations of the State General Fund, district attorneys, and local jails by an undetermined amount dependent upon the number of persons charged with and convicted of the offenses provided by this bill and the penalties imposed.
