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20	To add Article 44 to Chapter 9 of Title 41 of the
21	Code of Alabama 1975, to create the Creek War and War of 1812
22	Bicentennial Commission; to make legislative findings; to
23	provide definitions; to provide for the purpose, membership,
24	powers, duties, and operations of the commission; to provide
25	for expenses subject to available funds; and to provide for
26	termination of the commission.
27	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

Section 1. Article 44 is added to Chapter 9 of Title
 41 of the Code of Alabama 1975, to read as follows:
 Article 44.
 \$41-9-1060.
 There is hereby created and established the Creek
 War and War of 1812 Bicentennial Commission.

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§41-9-1061.

8 The Legislature of Alabama makes the following 9 findings:

10 (1) Because the onset and subsequent activities of
11 the Creek War and the War of 1812 were seminal events for our
12 young nation, and especially for the area that would become
13 the State of Alabama, it is important for this state to
14 commemorate the historical activities and people of this era.

15 (2) At the onset of the War of 1812, the lands comprising the future State of Alabama were a part of the 16 17 Mississippi territory, the Kingdom of Spain, and the Cherokee, Chickasaw, Choctaw, and Creek Indian Nations. At the time of 18 the outbreak of the War of 1812, the Creek nation was on the 19 verge of civil conflict, which broke out in early 1813. When 20 21 the Creek National Council called on the United States for 22 assistance in fighting the Red Stick insurgents, the Creek 23 civil war quickly became an American-Creek war, and Red Stick Creeks sought British assistance against their adversaries. In 24 the ensuing conflict, the United States and its Indian allies 25 26 won victories against Red Stick forces, conquered Spanish

territory, and twice defended the Alabama coastline against
 British-led invasions.

(3) The Creek War and the War of 1812 were 3 4 distinguished by a number of significant battles. Battles, campaigns, encampments, and expeditions took place in every 5 6 part of the state, with American armies from Georgia, 7 Tennessee, and the Mississippi territory converging on the central part of the state. Naval activity also occurred in 8 Mobile Bay. These battles and troop movements exposed the 9 10 lands of the future State of Alabama to potential settlers.

11 (4) Among the most prominent battles were the Fort 12 Mims Massacre, an action by Red Stick insurgents that 13 galvanized American public opinion in support of a war against the Creeks; the Battle of Horseshoe Bend, in which Andrew 14 15 Jackson's forces won a decisive victory against the Creeks, 16 thereby ending the Creek War and securing for Jackson the 17 status of national war hero and propelling him to fame; the defeat of the British in their attempt to take Mobile Bay, 18 thereby delaying the British campaign to take New Orleans and 19 20 allowing time for American armies to prepare for defenses in 21 that city; and the final large-scale military action of the War of 1812 that took place at Fort Bowyer, now called Fort 22 23 Morgan, more than a month after the Battle of New Orleans.

(5) As a result of the war, 22,000,000 acres were
ceded by the Creek Nation to the United States in the Treaty
of Fort Jackson. The majority of this land ultimately became
part of the Alabama territory and was later designated as the

State of Alabama. The subjugation of the Creek Indians
 precipitated a land rush in the newly-ceded lands, leading to
 the rapid expansion of settlement in Baldwin and Mobile
 Counties and in the Tennessee Valley.

5 (6) Current Alabama counties which saw significant
6 action during the war years were: Autauga, Baldwin, Chambers,
7 Cherokee, Clarke, Clay, Coosa, Dallas, Elmore, Lee, Lowndes,
8 Macon, Madison, Marengo, Marshall, Mobile, Monroe, Montgomery,
9 Morgan, Perry, Randolph, Russell, St. Clair, Talladega,
10 Tallapoosa, Washington, and Wilcox.

(7) The importance of a bicentennial commemoration 11 12 has been recognized by other states and by the United States 13 Congress. Commemoration of the period offers an excellent 14 opportunity to enhance educational programs and engender heritage tourism within Alabama. Therefore, it is in the 15 interest of the state to provide and support the appropriate 16 17 celebrations and commemorative activities to maximize public education and appreciation of significant events in the 18 history of the period. 19

21 For purposes of this article, the following words 22 shall have the following meanings:

23 (1) COMMEMORATION. A commemoration of the Creek War24 and the War of 1812.

25 (2) COMMISSION. The Creek War and War of 1812
26 Bicentennial Commission.

1 (3) COUNTIES. The counties of Autauga, Baldwin, 2 Chambers, Cherokee, Clarke, Clay, Coosa, Dallas, Elmore, Lee, Lowndes, Macon, Madison, Marengo, Marshall, Mobile, Monroe, 3 4 Montgomery, Morgan, Perry, Randolph, Russell, St. Clair, Talladega, Tallapoosa, Washington, and Wilcox. 5 (4) QUALIFIED RESIDENT. Any resident of the State of 6 7 Alabama with an interest in, support for, and expertise appropriate to the commemoration. 8 \$41-9-1063. 9 10 (a) The commission shall be composed of 29 members 11 to be appointed by the following: 12 (1) Ten members shall be qualified residents 13 appointed by the commission after consideration of nominations 14 submitted by the county commissions of Autauga, Baldwin, 15 Clarke, Elmore, Macon, Madison, Mobile, Talladega, Tallapoosa, and Washington Counties. 16 17 (2) Four members shall be qualified residents appointed by the commission after consideration of nominations 18 submitted by the mayors of the City of Alexander City, the 19 City of Huntsville, the City of Mobile, and the City of 20 21 Montgomery. 22 (3) Two members shall be employees of and appointed 23 by the Alabama Historical Commission. 24 (4) One member shall be an employee of and appointed 25 by the Bureau of Tourism and Travel. 26 (5) One member shall be an employee of and appointed 27 by the Alabama Department of Archives and History.

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1 (6) One member shall be an employee of and appointed 2 by the Alabama Department of Indian Affairs. (7) One member shall be an employee of, and 3 4 appointed by the Department of Conservation and Natural 5 Resources. (8) One member shall be an employee of and appointed 6 7 by the Alabama Department of Education. (9) One member shall be an employee of and appointed 8 by the Horseshoe Bend National Military Park. 9 10 (10) One member shall be appointed by the Alabama Historical Commission. 11 12 (11) One member shall be appointed by the Poarch Band of Creek Indians. 13 14 (12) One member shall be appointed by the Alabama 15 Archaeological Society. (13) One member shall be appointed by the Alabama 16 17 Association of Historians. (14) One member shall be appointed by the Historic 18 Chattahoochee Commission. 19 (15) One member shall be appointed by the Alabama 20 Black Heritage Council. 21 22 (16) One member shall be appointed by the Alabama 23 Humanities Foundation. (b) Members of the commission shall be appointed to 24 reflect the racial, gender, geographic, urban/rural, and 25 economic diversity of the State of Alabama. 26

(c) The members of the commission shall be appointed
 120 days after the effective date of this act. A person
 appointed to the commission shall serve until written notice
 is given to the chair by the appointing authority that the
 appointment is no longer effective, or until the commission
 determines that such appointment is no longer effective.

7 (d) Members shall be appointed for the life of the8 commission.

9 (e) A vacancy on the commission shall not affect the 10 powers of the commission and shall be filled in the same 11 manner as the original appointment for any unexpired term.

12 (f) The commission shall act on an affirmative vote 13 of a majority of the members of the commission attending a 14 meeting of the commission for which notice was provided 15 pursuant to subsection (g). Members of the commission may participate in any meeting of the commission by means of a 16 17 conference telephone or similar communications equipment by means of which all persons participating at the meeting can 18 hear each other at the same time, and participation by such 19 20 means shall constitute presence in person at a meeting.

(g) Notice of the time, day, and place of all meetings of the commission shall be given to all members of the commission in person or by telephone, mail, e-mail, or facsimile, by or at the direction of the chair or the vice chair. If the notice is sent by mail, it shall be deposited in the United States post office as first class mail or with a private mail carrier for overnight delivery, postage prepaid and addressed to the member at his or her address as it appears on the records of the commission, at least five days before the day of the meeting. If the notice is sent by any other method or is delivered in person, the notice shall be sent or delivered at least 48 hours before the meeting.

6 (h) The commission shall select a chair and a vice 7 chair from among the members of the commission.

8 (i) The commission shall hold an initial meeting
9 within 150 days after the effective date of this act.

10 (j) During the years 2010 and 2011, there shall be 11 no fewer than three meetings of the commission per year at the 12 call of the chair or a majority of the members of the 13 commission.

(k) During the years 2012 through 2015, there shall be no fewer than two meetings of the commission per year at the call of the chair or a majority of the members of the commission.

Subject to available funds, the commission shall do all of the following:

(1) Plan, develop, execute, coordinate, and assist
in programs, observances, studies, and activities
commemorating the historic events associated with the Creek
War and War of 1812.

(2) Facilitate and encourage the commemorationthroughout the state.

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(3) Lead in the establishment of a statewide
 observance of the Creek War and War of 1812 by complementing,
 cooperating with, and providing assistance to the programs and
 activities of the various counties and organizations involved
 in the commemoration.

6 (4) Encourage observances benefiting the diverse 7 population of the state by interacting with all of the natural 8 and cultural treasures of the state.

9 (5) In cooperation with the appropriate federal 10 agencies, and through archival and archaeological research, 11 the commission may work with the state archaeologist to update 12 and augment the inventory and assessments of the 13 archaeological and historic sites enumerated in the 14 state-developed and National Park Service American Battlefield 15 Protection Programs to also reflect historic sites that are not associated with battles. 16

17 (6) Encourage and assist in the preparation of
18 printed books, electronic web pages, and associated
19 educational material.

(7) Encourage and welcome international involvement
in celebrations and observances and cooperate and coordinate
with the National War of 1812 Bicentennial Commission and
commissions in other states.

(8) Cooperate with and assist the Alabama Bureau of
Tourism and Travel in developing maps and other material to
encourage heritage-related tourism during the commemoration
period, with such cooperation extended to counties and

municipalities through chambers of commerce, convention and
 visitors bureaus, and similar agencies.

3 (9) Seek out and encourage national and regional4 groups to hold events and living history gatherings.

5 (10) Coordinate with appropriate private, municipal,
6 county, regional, and federal agencies including the National
7 Park Service and the federal Department of Defense.

8 (11) Encourage agencies and groups throughout the 9 state to organize and participate in the commemoration.

10 (12) Encourage civic, patriotic, historical,
11 educational, religious, economic, tourism, and other
12 organizations throughout the state to expand the understanding
13 and appreciation of the significance of the Creek War and War
14 of 1812.

(13) Coordinate with the States of Mississippi,
Georgia, Louisiana, Tennessee, North Carolina, South Carolina,
and Florida to exchange information, present beneficial joint
programs, encourage tourism, and educate students and the
public.

(14) Provide a calendar of events to the Departments
of Education and Tourism and Travel no later than six months
prior to the commemoration.

(15) Work with the Department of Archives and
History and state colleges and universities to design,
develop, and provide, during the designated commemoration
period for the purpose of promoting education and tourism, a
website that shall include a calendar of statewide

1 commemoration festivities, an explanation of events preceding 2 and associated with the Creek War and War of 1812 in Alabama, 3 and a selection of documents and maps from the period in order 4 to make the wealth of historical resources of the state easily 5 accessible to the general public and schools.

6 (16) Collaborate with the Department of Archives and 7 History to design, develop, and provide an exhibit or exhibits 8 to interpret the events of the period for the educational and 9 informational benefit of the citizens and tourists of Alabama.

10 (17) Collaborate with the State Archaeologist to 11 update and enhance the inventory of significant archaeological 12 sites and structures associated with the commemorative period 13 and, upon completion of the list, execute surveys necessary 14 for the identification and potential preservation of the 15 sites.

16 (18) Cooperate with the Department of Tourism and 17 Travel, state historians, regional and local agencies, and the 18 State Archaeologist to produce a Bicentennial Trail map to be 19 available for public distribution no later than January 1, 20 2012.

(19) Direct a state historian to compile for
distribution to appropriate state historic sites and Alabama
schools a pamphlet including the biographies of notable War of
1812-era Alabamians, including citizens, military figures,
political figures, Indian leaders, and namesakes for Alabama
counties.

(20) Ensure that commemorations provide a lasting
 legacy and long-term public benefit leading to the protection
 of the resources associated with the era.

4 (21) Cooperate and coordinate with other state and
5 national archives, museums, and repositories holding pertinent
6 Alabama-associated artifacts, images, and documents to secure
7 loans and exhibits of the materials in Alabama during the
8 commemoration period.

9 (22) Cooperate and coordinate with the Department of 10 Transportation to mark and interpret the Old Federal Road 11 route.

12 (23) Cooperate and coordinate with the Alabama 13 Humanities Foundation to establish a speakers' bureau of 14 experts and publicize the experts to communities across the 15 state.

16 (24) Cooperate with the Department of Education, the 17 Department of Archives and History, state colleges and 18 universities, and the Alabama Humanities Foundation to 19 encourage and support the development of teaching materials 20 and teacher workshops related to the Creek War and War of 1812 21 in Alabama.

(25) Prepare a strategic plan and annual performanceplans for any activity carried out by the commission.

(26) Solicit, accept, use, and dispose of gifts or
 donations of money, services, and real and personal property
 related to its mission.

(27) Appoint an advisory committee as the commission
 deems necessary.

3 (28) Authorize any member or employee of the
4 commission to take any action the commission is authorized to
5 undertake.

6 (29) Use the United States mails in the same manner 7 and under the same conditions as other agencies of the state 8 government.

9 (30) Use the printing and other state resources in 10 the same manner and under the same conditions as other 11 agencies of the state government.

12 (31) Make grants to communities, nonprofit
13 commemorative commissions, educational institutions and
14 organizations, and research and scholarly organizations to
15 develop programs and products to assist in researching,
16 publishing, marketing, and distributing information relating
17 to the commemoration.

18

(32) Secure supplies, services, and property.

(33) Make or enter into contracts, leases, or other
 legal agreements not to extend beyond the termination date of
 the commission.

(34) Secure directly from a state agency such information as the commission considers to be necessary to carry out its mission and, upon request of the chair of the commission, the head of the agency shall provide information to the commission. (35) Have any other powers the commission deems
 necessary to commemorate the Creek War and War of 1812.

3 (36) Receive and expend any funds, including state4 funds which are appropriated to the commission.

5

(37) Employ state employees.

Notwithstanding the above powers, the commission 6 7 shall have no authority to obligate state funds or to require any unit of state or local government to expend or obligate 8 funds. Any provision of this article that shall make any power 9 10 or duty of the commission subject to availability of funding, 11 the provision shall be intended to make the exercise of such 12 power or duty contingent on the commission having received 13 grants, donations, or contract funds sufficient for such 14 purpose.

16 (a) No later than September 30, 2015, the commission
17 shall submit a report to the Department of Examiners of Public
18 Accounts that includes all of the following:

(1) A summary of the activities of the commission.
(2) A final accounting of any funds received or
expended by the commission.

(3) The final disposition of any historically
 significant items or other items acquired by the commission.

(b) The commission shall terminate upon submission
of the final report pursuant to subsection (a).

(c) No later than the date of termination of the
 commission, the commission shall transfer any documents,

materials, books, manuscripts, miscellaneous printed matter, 1 memorabilia, relics, and exhibits and any materials donated to 2 the commission that relate to the Creek War and War of 1812 to 3 4 the Alabama Department of Archives and History, which may de-accession any of these materials that do not conform with 5 its mission. Following the termination of the commission, the 6 7 Alabama Department of Archives and History may continue any of the initiatives and purposes of the commission. Items produced 8 for sale by the commission shall be transferred to the Alabama 9 10 Historical Commission and the Alabama Department of Archives and History for use at its retail outlets. 11

12 (d) Any funds held by the commission on the date of
13 termination shall be deposited into the State General Fund.
14 \$41-9-1066.

(a) Except as provided in subsection (b), all
members of the commission shall serve without compensation.

(b) A member of the commission who is an official or
employee of the State of Alabama shall serve without
compensation and shall receive his or her compensation for his
or her employment or official duties.

(c) Subject to available funds, a member of the
commission shall be allowed travel expenses within the
guidelines established by the State of Alabama for state
employees and officials.

(d) Subject to available funds, the chair of the
 commission, without regard to Merit System laws and
 regulations, may appoint and terminate an executive director

1 and such other additional personnel as shall be necessary to 2 enable the commission to perform the duties of the commission. The employment of an executive director shall be subject to 3 4 confirmation by the commission. The chair of the commission may fix the compensation of the executive director and other 5 personnel without regard to the provisions of the law relating 6 7 to classification of positions, general schedule pay rates, and any provisions of the state Merit System, but only upon 8 the approval of the commission. 9

10 (e) At the request of the commission and subject to available funds, the head of any state agency may assign, on a 11 12 reimbursable or nonreimbursable basis, any of the personnel of 13 such agency to the commission to assist the commission in 14 carrying out the duties of the commission under this article. 15 The assignment of an employee shall be without loss of Merit System status or privilege. Any city and any county may assign 16 17 personnel on similar terms and conditions. Notwithstanding the foregoing sentences of this subsection, the commission shall 18 receive administrative support from the Alabama Historical 19 Commission on a nonreimbursable basis. 20

(f) The commission may accept and use voluntary and
 uncompensated services as the commission determines necessary.

23 (g) Nothing in this article shall be construed to24 require any state appropriations.

26 (a) The commission and all contracts made by it
27 shall be exempt from all laws of the State of Alabama

requiring competitive bids in connection with contracts,
 including, without limitation, Chapter 16 of Title 41 of the
 Code of Alabama 1975.

4 (b) The commission shall not be subject to Article 3
5 of Chapter 15 of Title 9 of the Code of Alabama 1975,
6 regardless of the prior ownership of any property or interest
7 therein to be disposed of in any fashion by the commission.

8 (c) The commission shall not be subject to the Open 9 Meetings Act codified at Chapter 25A of Title 36 of the Code 10 of Alabama 1975 nor to any public record requirements of the 11 state, including without limitation, Chapter 12 of Title 36 12 and Chapter 13 of Title 41 of the Code of Alabama 1975.

13 (d) The commission shall not be subject to the
14 Alabama Administrative Procedure Act codified at Chapter 22 of
15 Title 41 of the Code of Alabama 1975.

(e) Members of the commission shall not be subject 16 17 to Chapter 25 of Title 36 merely because of their service on the commission or because of the reimbursement of travel 18 expenses provided in Section 41-9-1066(c) of this act. 19 20 However, compensated employees of the commission shall be 21 subject to Chapter 25 of Title 36 of the Code of Alabama 1975, 22 so long as they are not employed in maintenance, clerical, 23 secretarial, or other similar positions.

24 (f) The commission shall be exempt from all state25 and local taxes and assessments.

(g) Members and employees of the commission shall be
 immune from civil liability and shall not be liable for

1 damages when performing their duties under this article. The
2 Attorney General shall represent members of the commission and
3 the employees of the commission in litigation filed because of
4 the performance of their duties under this article.

5 (h) Subject to available funding, the commission 6 shall hire an independent certified public accounting firm to 7 examine its books and records and render a written audit 8 report annually.

9 (i) No part of the net earnings of the commission 10 remaining after payment of its expenses shall inure to the 11 benefit of any private entity or person.

12 (j) The commission, by resolution legally adopted to 13 conform to rules prescribed by the Board of Control of the 14 State of Alabama Employees' Retirement System, may elect to 15 have its employees become eligible to participate in the State of Alabama Employees' Retirement System. The commission may 16 17 similarly agree that its employees shall be subject to state insurance on the same basis as other state employees of the 18 Alabama Historical Commission. 19

20 (k) Notwithstanding any other provisions of this 21 act, the members of the commission, all employees, and any 22 contracts entered into by the commission shall reflect the 23 racial, gender, geographic, urban/rural, and economic 24 diversity of the state.

25 Section 2. If a court of competent jurisdiction 26 adjudges invalid or unconstitutional any clause, sentence, 27 paragraph, section, or part of this act, such judgment or decree shall not affect, impair, invalidate, or nullify the remainder of this act, but the effect of the decision shall be confined to the clause, sentence, paragraph, section, or part of this act adjudged to be invalid or unconstitutional.

5 Section 3. All laws or parts of laws which conflict 6 with this act are repealed.

Section 4. This act shall become effective
immediately following its passage and approval by the
Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
