119702-1:n:03/04/2010:HLI/hli LRS2010-1677 1 2 3 4 5 6 7 URGING THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS TO CONSIDER ALL 8 AVAILABLE MECHANISMS TO LESSEN THE SUDDEN IMPACT OF THE 9 10 CHANGES MADE TO THE MAGNUSON-STEVENS FISHERY CONSERVATION AND 11 MANAGEMENT ACT. 12 13 WHEREAS, the Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Conservaton 14 and Management Act emphasized prevention of overfishing and 15 rebuilding overfished stocks; and WHEREAS, recent revisions to the Act were prompted 16 17 in part by criticism of progress toward ending overfishing and 18 rebuilding fish stocks; and 19 WHEREAS, such revisions impose significant restrictions on commercial and recreational fishing in federal 20 21 waters and prohibitively short deadlines to end overfishing; 22 and 23 WHEREAS, every federally managed fishery that is 24 classified as undergoing overfishing is required to have 25 annual catch limits and accountability measures in place by 26 2010; and

WHEREAS, all other federally managed species are
required to have annual catch limits and accountability
measures in place by 2011; and

WHEREAS, such requirements include accountability measures which stipulate that, if catch limits are exceeded for such federally managed species, federal actions must be stipulated to compensate for the harvest overage; and

8 WHEREAS, the consequence of such accountability 9 measures is that certain types of fishing activity, such as 10 recreational fishing, could be faced with ever-increasing 11 limits imposed over a minimal timeframe; and

WHEREAS, federal managers are considering a ten-month closure of all fishing for the red snapper fishery; and

15 WHEREAS, severely restricting or eliminating harvest 16 of the State's most valuable reef fish species will have the 17 unfortunate impact of putting Alabamians out of business; and

18 WHEREAS, the Act requires federal managers to use 19 the best scientific information available to end overfishing 20 and provide future sustainable harvest; and

21 WHEREAS, even though fishery scientists are using 22 the best scientific information available, there continues to 23 be inadequate funding to conduct the level of fisheries 24 monitoring and research necessary to meet the standards of the 25 Act; and

26 WHEREAS, to meet such standards, it is imperative to 27 provide federal fishery managers with the financial means

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necessary to gather and analyze more complete and continuous
information on the status of fish stocks; and

WHEREAS, consistent with these conservation requirements, recent changes to the Act direct that economic impacts to fishing communities be minimized and that mechanisms be provided to support the economic health of fishing communities; and

8 WHEREAS, every effort should be made to provide 9 economic assistance to key fishing industries and businesses 10 that cannot survive the restrictions being implemented by 11 recent changes to the Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Conservation 12 and Management Act; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, That we hereby urge the Congress of the United States to consider all available mechanisms to lessen the sudden impact of the changes made to the Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Conservation and Management Act and to seek to balance resource protection with economic prosperity in Alabama.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution will be provided to the President of the United States, to the President of the United States Senate, to the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, and to each member of Alabama's Congressional Delegation.
