8	RECOGNIZING THE LIFE OF COLONEL ROBERT LEWIS HOWARD.
9	
10	WHEREAS, it is a unique privilege to pay homage to a
11	native son who became one of America's greatest heroes, United
12	States Army Colonel (Retired) Robert Lewis Howard, who died on
13	December 23, 2009, at the age of 70 years; and
14	WHEREAS, Colonel Howard was credited with being the
15	most decorated American soldier in history, having been
16	awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor, two Distinguished
17	Service Crosses, the Silver Star, four Bronze Stars, eight
18	Purple Hearts, and scores of additional citations for valor
19	and merit during the course of his 36-year career; and
20	WHEREAS, born in Opelika on July 11, 1939, he joined
21	the Army at the age of 17, enlisting in the paratroopers, and
22	retired as a full Colonel in 1992; during the Vietnam War, he
23	served in the Green Berets and spent most of his five tours of
24	duty in the covert Special Operations Group that carried out
25	some of the most daring and dangerous missions ever conducted
26	by the American military; he was wounded 14 times in 54

months; and

WHEREAS, the Medal of Honor citation described his action on a mission to rescue a missing American soldier in enemy-controlled territory: although a grenade attack had left him weaponless, wounded, and unable to walk, he managed to crawl through a hail of fire to retrieve his critically wounded platoon leader, then administered first aid and rallied his platoon to repulse the enemy for more than three hours, gaining sufficient control to permit the landing of rescue helicopters; he was cited for conspicuous gallantry, intrepidity, and complete devotion to the welfare of his men at the risk of his life; and

WHEREAS, Colonel Howard was nominated for the Medal of Honor two additional times for extraordinary heroism within a 13-month period; he holds the distinction of being the only soldier in history to be nominated for the nation's highest honor three times for three separate actions, and although an individual can receive only one Medal of Honor, the men who served with Colonel Howard said he deserved all three; and

WHEREAS, although his formal education was interrupted when he answered the call of his country to serve in the military, he later pursued advanced studies and earned an AA in Business Administration in 1962 from the University of Maryland, a Bachelor's Degree in Police Administration in 1973 from Texas Christian University, a Master's Degree in Management and Supervision from Central Michigan University in 1980 and a Master's Degree in Public Administration in 1981, also from Central Michigan University; and

WHEREAS, he leaves to mourn his death his children 1 2 and grandchildren, as well as his siblings who reside in Alabama: brother and sister, Steve Howard and Frances Jackson 3 of Prattville, and sisters, Judy Roberts and Alice Carter of Opelika; and 5 WHEREAS, Colonel Howard's burial with full military 6 7 honors is scheduled on February 22, 2010, in Arlington National Cemetery; now therefore, 8 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH 9 10 HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That while we mourn the loss of our 11 native son, United States Army Colonel (Retired) Robert Lewis 12 Howard, we celebrate the valiant life of this American patriot 13 and hero of incomparable stature.
