8	MOURNING THE DEATH OF FORMER STATE SENATOR BILL
9	MENTON.

11	WHEREAS, it is with profound sorrow that news is
12	received of the death of our friend and former colleague, the
13	Honorable Bill Menton, of Irvington, Alabama, at the age of 90
14	years; and
15	WHEREAS, a dedicated public servant who was
16	motivated by the desire to help people, Mr. Menton was elected
17	to the Alabama Senate in 1982 representing Mobile County's
18	District 35 and later served as a Mobile County Commissioner
19	from 1988 to 1992; he was a faithful member of St. Margaret
20	Catholic Church in Bayou La Batre; and
21	WHEREAS, an alumnus of Spring Hill College, he was
22	an outstanding athlete with scholarships in football,
23	basketball, and baseball, and he is a member of two Halls of
24	Fame, the Spring Hill College Badger Hall of Fame and the
25	Mobile Sports Hall of Fame; after graduation in 1942, he
26	coached at the college in the 1940s and at UMS High School for
27	several years, prior to embarking on a career in law

enforcement with an emphasis on making a difference in the lives of troubled youth; while working as a Mobile County juvenile probation officer, he helped establish a juvenile division for the Mobile County Sheriff's Office; in addition, he also served with distinction as police chief for Bayou La Batre and in 1975 and 1976 served as a crime prevention officer for Mobile County Public Schools; in 1996, Mr. Menton became executive director of the Alabama Fraternal Order of Police; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Menton and his wife were among the founders of Mobile Area Retarded Citizens in the late 1950s and also helped establish Little League Baseball in Mobile around the same time; he also served in various other positions throughout his long career including a time as general manager of the Mobile Tarpons minor league football team and assistant general manager of the Mobile A's minor league baseball team; and

WHEREAS, a devout Roman Catholic, Mr. Menton was bestowed the honor of Knight of Saint Gregory by Pope John Paul II at the nomination of Archbishop Oscar H. Lipscomb; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Menton established a popular radio sports program and was the voice of the Mobile Bears throughout the 1940s and 1950s, covering high school football games and hosting a popular scoreboard show on radio during football games on Saturday evenings; and

WHEREAS, he was an accomplished master of ceremonies and was a most sought-after banquet personality in Mobile for

decades; above all, he never learned the meaning of the word
"no" when asked to help with someone's child, a charity, or
any worthy cause; and

WHEREAS, he leaves to mourn his death his beloved wife of 65 years, Carmen Santana Menton; eight children; six grandchildren; and four great-grandchildren; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Menton earned widespread respect for his commitment and exceptional abilities as he worked tirelessly for his fellow citizens; through the years, he made a positive impact on the lives of countless young people, and while his presence will be missed, his legacy will endure for future generations; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That the death of the Honorable Bill Menton is recorded with deep sadness, and this resolution is offered in highest tribute to his life of achievement and service, along with heartfelt sympathy to his grieving family.
