19	and 17 of this act. For the purpose specified in subsection
20	(b) of Section 2 of this act, amounts are shown by
21	programmatic area and the total for all programs is shown so
22	as to include estimated sources of funds other than those
23	listed in subsection (a) of Section 2 of this act. For the
24	purpose of this act, "ETF" shall mean the Education Trust Fund
25	and "Federal and Local Funds" shall mean all gifts, grants,
26	contributions, or entitlements, including grants by the
27	Congress of the United States, municipalities or counties.

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1 Section 2. (a) The appropriations provided for in 2 this act shall be paid from funds in the State Treasury to the credit of the Education Trust Fund, Alabama Peace Officers' 3 4 Standards and Training Fund, Impaired Drivers Trust Fund, Driver Education and Training Fund, Special Education 5 6 Catastrophic Fund, and Public School Fund and are hereby made 7 for the support of public education in Alabama for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2012, and the appropriations herein 8 made shall be subject to the provisions, terms, conditions and 9 10 limitations of the Budget and Financial Control Act (Code of Alabama 1975, Sections 41-4-80 et seq.), the provisions of the 11 Budget Management Act of 1976 (Code of Alabama 1975, Sections 12 13 41-19-1 et seq.), and shall be in the amounts hereinafter 14 specified.

15 (b) Amounts shown hereinunder the columns "Earmarked Funds" and "Appropriation Total" are as set forth for the 16 17 purpose of establishing amounts estimated to be available by programmatic area from sources other than those listed in 18 subsection (a) of this Section 2, in order, upon consideration 19 of such other funds so estimated to be available, to promote 20 21 the accountability for an efficient use of funds available, 22 and the same are hereby appropriated by the Legislature. 23 Provided, however, that regardless of the ending date of any 24 pay period which has been or may be established by the 25 Legislature for the payment of salaries of state employees, 26 the entire payment due shall be made from the fiscal year's 27 appropriation in which the pay date falls.

Notwithstanding Section 16-13-231.1(d) of the Code of Alabama 1975, there shall not be an appropriation for the 1% over the total cost of instructional salaries for the Foundation Program as calculated by the State Minimum Salary Schedule for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2011. For "Fringe Benefits" the rate per day for two personal days and five sick days (for units earned in the Foundation Program) shall be \$60. The Teachers' Retirement System rate shall be 10.00% of salaries. The Public Education Employees' Health Insurance Program (PEEHIP) rate shall be \$714 per month for each full-time employee. As funds are appropriated the appropriation herein shall include funds to pay for substitute support employees for each day a support employee is absent.

For "Classroom Instructional Support" the uniform amounts used in determining the Foundation Program allowance for classroom instructional support shall be: (1) textbooks at \$15.88 per pupil in average daily membership during the first 20 scholastic days after Labor Day of the preceding school year and (2) classroom materials and supplies at \$103.11 \$134.78 per unit earned in the Foundation Program. Funds allocated for instructional support units to meet SACS standards shall be used exclusively and specifically for principals, assistant principals, counselors, and librarians and library aides, as calculated by the State Department of Education and assigned to the schools where such units are earned. An instructional support unit earned for a principal shall be increased by .31 for elementary schools, .35 for middle schools, and .45 for secondary schools and unit schools. An instructional support unit earned for an assistant principal shall be increased by .10 for elementary schools, middle schools, secondary schools and unit schools. An instructional support unit earned for a counselor shall be increased by .03 for secondary schools and unit schools. The budgeting and expenditure of funds in the Foundation Program at the local level shall be determined and made by the local board of education in accordance with rules and regulations of the State Board of Education and all laws governing such school budgets and expenditures. It is the intent of the Legislature that funds allocated for textbooks shall be expended to purchase textbooks within the first two weeks of the school year.

In addition to all other appropriations, there is hereby appropriated \$8,940,252 from the Education 16 17 Trust Fund representing the remaining 50% of the interest income accumulated at the rate of 6% from FY 1992 through FY 18 19 2002 for the K-12 school systems that did not receive allocations of interest from their Sixteenth Section Land Grants 20 21 held in trust by the State of Alabama, to be conditioned upon the availability of funds, the recommendation of the Finance 22 23 Director, and approval of the Governor. 10 Section 5. In addition to all other appropriations, 11 there is hereby appropriated from the Education Trust Fund the 12 following amounts to be conditioned upon the availability of 13 funds, the recommendation of the Director of Finance, and the 14 approval of the Governor:

Section 6. In addition to the appropriations herein 1 2 made, all gifts, grants, contributions, insurance proceeds or 3 entitlements, in excess of the amount carried in this act, including grants by the Congress of the United States, 4 municipalities or counties, to any department, division, 5 board, bureau, commission, agency, institution, office or 6 7 officer of the State of Alabama are hereby appropriated and, 8 in the event the same are recurring, are reappropriated to 9 such department, division, board, bureau, commission, agency, 10 institution, office or officer to be used only for the purpose or purposes for which the grant or contribution was or shall 11 12 be made. Further, all state, county, municipal and educational entities are authorized to disburse such sums as deemed 13 14 necessary by mutual agreement between said entities and the State of Alabama, Department of Examiners of Public Accounts 15 16 to partially defray the cost of auditing services performed by said agency. All such sums are hereby appropriated and 17 18 reappropriated if necessary to the Department of Examiners of 19 Public Accounts for audit services, to be expended through the 20 fund established by Section 41-5-24, Code of Alabama 1975.

21 Section 7. The State Superintendent of Education 22 shall make requisitions to the State Comptroller in favor of 23 the proper beneficiary in accordance with the law and rules 24 and regulations governing the expenditure or disbursement of 25 any and all funds appropriated to the State Department of Education and/or the State Board of Education in this act, whereupon the Comptroller shall issue his warrant therefor. All other appropriations in this act shall be paid after proper requisitions are made to the State Comptroller in the manner now provided by law.

Section 8. Nothing in this act shall be construed to 6 7 affect or repeal any law authorizing or permitting any college, school or other education or eleemosynary institution 8 of the State to receive, collect or disburse any fees, 9 10 tuitions, charges, sales, endowments, trusts or income 11 therefrom, which are now or may hereafter be authorized to 12 receive, collect or disburse. The receiving college, school or 13 institution shall further maintain separate accounts for such 14 receipts or shall maintain a system of accounting which will 15 show a cash flow of such receipts received under the provision 16 of this appropriation.

17 Section 9. The appropriations made herein to the departments, boards, offices, commissions, and agencies 18 include the amount necessary and said departments, boards, 19 20 offices, commissions, and agencies are hereby directed to make 21 the transfer of funds to the State Personnel Department in the 22 amounts enumerated in the general appropriations act for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2012. All agencies and 23 24 institutions enumerated in this act that receive services from 25 other governmental agencies enumerated in this act or the 26 general appropriations act shall make full payment in a timely

1 manner (as determined by the Department of Finance) for such 2 services.

Section 10. All encumbered balances of a previous 3 4 fiscal year appropriation other than the exclusions authorized by the Code of Alabama 1975, Section 41-4-93, shall lapse no 5 later than September 30 of the fiscal year immediately 6 7 following the fiscal year for which the appropriation was made and shall revert to the credit of the Education Trust Fund or 8 earmarked fund from which the appropriation or appropriations 9 10 were made.

Section 11. Upon certification to the Director of 11 12 Finance by the State Attorney General that a federal court has 13 ordered the State of Alabama to pay claims, attorney fees, or 14 other costs relating to said court order, funds are hereby appropriated to the affected department, board, bureau, or 15 commission in the amount necessary to satisfy that court 16 17 order. Such appropriations are in addition to any other appropriation heretofore or hereafter made in this 18 appropriation act. Such appropriations are conditioned upon 19 the availability of funds and a determination by the Director 20 21 of Finance that other current appropriations are not available 22 for court-ordered payments.

23 Section 12. For FY 2012, local boards of education 24 may exercise flexibility among line item expenditures, not to 25 create a reduction of earned teacher units and/or local board 26 of education support personnel. Section 13. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this act or any other act, any amount from appropriations for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2011 to the various state agencies and institutions in this act which are unexpended and reverted on September 30, 2011 are hereby reappropriated to the respective offices for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2011.

Section 14. No funds provided herein for the public 8 9 schools shall be used for the payment of any salaries of 10 personnel which are not under the direct control, employment, and supervision of local boards of education; provided, 11 12 however, that this section shall not apply to the 13 construction, renovation or major repair of buildings or other 14 capital improvements which are beyond the capacity of regular employees to perform. 15

16 Section 15. If merit pay increases are reinstated 17 after December 31, 2011, current anniversary dates will be 18 maintained for all employees. Agencies are prohibited from 19 adjusting employee anniversary dates to obtain merit pay 20 increases at an earlier date.

21 Section 16. The appropriations made herein to the 22 departments, boards, offices, commissions and agencies include 23 the amounts necessary to pay the State Employee Health 24 Insurance Board (SEIB). The SEIB rate shall be \$765 per month 25 for each full-time employee for the fiscal year ending 26 September 30, 2012. The SEIB shall adjust the insurance program wherever appropriate to maintain the aforementioned fixed rate.

Section 17. This Act anticipates \$0 in an
unappropriated or unanticipated ending balance in the
Education Trust Fund. Notwithstanding any other law, if FY
2012 ends with a balance in the ETF, 50% of any ending balance
must be transferred by the Director of Finance toward
repayment of the Rainy Day Account as provided for in
Amendment 803 to the Alabama Constitution.

10 Section 18. If any section, paragraph, sentence, 11 clause, provision or portion of this act or all or any portion 12 of the appropriations herein made is held unconstitutional or 13 invalid, it shall not affect any other section, paragraph, 14 sentence, clause, provision or portion of this act or any 15 other appropriation or appropriations or portion thereof 16 hereby made not in and of itself unconstitutional or invalid.

Section 19. All laws or parts of laws, general,
special, private or local in conflict with or inconsistent
with the provisions of this act are hereby expressly repealed.

20 Section 20. This act shall become effective on 21 October 1, 2011.
