26		AN ACT
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To add Section 23-1-40.1 to the Code of Alabama 1 2 1975, to require the Department of Transportation to implement complete street design features for safe travel in the 3 planning, design, construction, reconstruction, and rehabilitation of highways, roads, and streets subject to 5 6 department oversight in this state; to provide for plans that 7 enable safe access for all users of highways, including bicyclists, public transportation vehicles, motorists, and 8 9 pedestrians of all ages and abilities; to provide exceptions 10 to the design-plan requirements; to require the department to 11 publish a best-practice report demonstrating how the 12 department revised procedures and practices to improve the effectiveness and safety of the roadways for the benefit of 13 14 all users.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

Section 1. Section 23-1-40.1 is added to the Code of Alabama 1975, to read as follows:

\$23-1-40.1

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(a) The Department of Transportation shall provide for the consideration of safe travel by all users of the public road network, including motorists, pedestrians, bicyclists, and public transportation users, regardless of age or ability, through the use of complete street design features that facilitate safe travel by all users in the planning, design, construction, reconstruction, resurfacing, and rehabilitation, of all state, county, and local highways,

roads, and streets that are eligible for both federal and state funding and are subject to department oversight.

- (b) For the purposes of this section, "complete street design features" mean features of a public road that expand upon state and federal design requirements to accommodate all users, including current and projected users, particularly pedestrians, bicyclists, and individuals of all ages and mobile capabilities. These features shall include, but not be limited to, sidewalks, paved shoulders, suitable for use by bicyclists, lane striping, bicycle lanes, share the road signage, crosswalks, pedestrian control signalization, bus pull outs, curb cuts and raised crosswalks, ramps, roundabouts, and other traffic calming measures.
  - (c) To implement the requirements under this section, the department may consult with transportation, land-use, and environmental officials, in addition to representatives from the following:
    - (1) Counties, cities, and other municipalities.
    - (2) Public transit organizations.
    - (3) Relevant state agencies.
  - (4) Other relevant stakeholders, including, but not limited to, representatives from disability-rights groups, senior citizens groups, bicycle and pedestrian advocates, and developers.
  - (d) Exceptions to the requirements of this section shall be permissible only after the department fully

- demonstrates, with supporting documentation made available to the public, any one of the following:
- 3 (1) Use by bicyclists and pedestrians is prohibited 4 by law, such as within interstate highway corridors.

- (2) The cost would be disproportionate to the need as determined by factors including, but not limited to, land use, current and projected traffic volumes including non-motorized traffic, and population density.
- (3) A demonstrated lack of need as determined by factors including, but not limited to, land use, current and projected traffic volumes including non-motorized traffic, and population density.
- (e) No later than two years after the effective date of the act adding this section, the department shall publish a report summarizing how it has complied with this section by changes to its procedures to institutionalize complete street design features into planning, project scope, design, and implementation of public road projects. The report shall include, but not be limited to, a discussion and review of the revisions to various guidance documents prepared by the department regarding lane width, design speed, average daily traffic thresholds, level of service, and roadway classification. The report shall also include any best practices the department utilized related to the development of complete street design features.

Section 2. This act shall become effective on the first day of the third month following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
