JOSEPH PETTWAY, SR. 8 9 WHEREAS, with profound sorrow and regret, we receive 10 news of the death of Mr. Joseph Pettway, Sr., on April 16, 11 12 2011, at the age of 93 years; and 13 WHEREAS, the passing of Mr. Pettway leaves a void in 14 the lives of his loving family, his many friends, and the 15 entire community, where he was highly regarded as a community leader, businessman, and trailblazer of the Civil Rights 16 17 Movement, devoting his life to the cause of equality for Blacks; and 18 WHEREAS, born on February 8, 1918, in Pass 19 20 Christian, Mississippi, his mother died when he was an infant 21 and he was reared by his paternal grandmother near Gee's Bend 22 on a sharecropping farm; he was endowed with a strong work 23 ethic, love of education, and unwavering commitment to justice 24 and serving his fellowman; and 25 WHEREAS, after gaining a high school diploma through 26 a correspondence course, he was hired by the Southern 27 Railroad, where he was retired in 1969 as the first Black

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foreman in Alabama after a series of hard-won promotions; a man of many talents, he was an expert builder, farmer, and businessman, the owner and operator of Pettway's Place, where he and his wife conducted citizenship classes; and

5 WHEREAS, he was baptized at Oak Grove Missionary 6 Baptist Church and served faithfully there until uniting with 7 Mt. Sinai Missionary Baptist Church in 1984, where he was a 8 deacon for 27 years, superintendent of the Sunday School, and 9 active in the Uniontown District Association and Sunday School 10 Congress; and

11 WHEREAS, Mr. Pettway's key Civil Rights role began 12 when he attended the first Mass Meeting at Tabernacle Baptist 13 Church, and he participated wholeheartedly in the movement; he 14 was a shareholder in B and P Grocery Store, a furniture store, 15 a credit union, and any activity that advanced the financial, 16 social, and economic well-being of Black people; and

17 WHEREAS, he was determined to become a registered voter and a first-class citizen of the United States of 18 America and was rejected many times by the Dallas County Board 19 of Registrars before he finally registered as a beneficiary of 20 21 the 1965 Voting Rights Act; because of his activism, his 22 business was boycotted and a cross was burned on his property, 23 but he persevered; his trailblazing candidacy for the Dallas 24 County Commission paved the way for the election of the first 25 Black member, and on every Election Day he transported voters 26 to the polls and assisted them in exercising their rights; and 1 WHEREAS, Mr. Pettway was a founding member of the 2 Safford Improvement Association and was a mentor and role 3 model for young men; as a supporter of education for all 4 children, he was a dedicated member of the Tri-Church 5 Scholarship program and challenged others to contribute; he 6 also proudly supported Black businesses in the area; and

7 WHEREAS, married to Menda Gamble Pettway for 60
8 years, he is the father of Coach Joseph Pettway and Judge Jo
9 Celeste Pettway; adoptive father of Maxwell Cabble; and
10 grandfather of four; and

11 WHEREAS, Mr. Pettway was an unheralded warrior in 12 the struggle for equality and justice; although his presence 13 will be missed, his legacy will endure and his memory will be 14 cherished in the hearts and minds of those who were fortunate 15 to know him; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, That the death of Mr. Joseph Pettway, Sr., is recorded with deep sadness, and this resolution is offered in highest tribute to his life of achievement and service, along with heartfelt sympathy to his grieving family.

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
