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8 SYNOPSIS:

Under Amendment 57 to the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, now appearing as Sections 48.01 and 49 of the Official Recompilation of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended, members of the Legislature are provided certain compensation and an expense reimbursement authorized to be fixed by the Legislature. Several acts of the Legislature provide reimbursement for presiding officers and members of the Legislature.

This bill would propose a constitutional amendment to amend Amendment 57, to provide that the presiding officers and members of the Legislature would receive compensation and benefits for legislative service that is the same as the average gross income and receive the same average benefits of public classroom teachers in Alabama and reimbursement of expenses to the same extent as paid to public classroom teachers; to provide that each member of the Alabama Legislature may elect to be compensated at a rate lower than the average

gross income of public classroom teachers and opt

out of accepting the same benefits as granted to

the teachers; and to repeal existing law on the

subject.

Proposing an amendment to Amendment 57, now appearing as Sections 48.01 and 49 of the Official Recompilation of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended, providing that the presiding officers and members of the Legislature would receive compensation and benefits for legislative service that is the same as the average gross income and receive the same average benefits of public classroom teachers in Alabama and reimbursement of expenses to the same extent as paid to public classroom teachers; provide that each member of the Alabama Legislature may elect to be compensated at a rate lower than the average gross income of public classroom teachers and opt out of accepting the same benefits as granted to the teachers; and repeal existing law on the subject.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

Section 1. The following amendment to the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended, is proposed and shall become valid as a part thereof when approved by a

majority of the qualified electors voting thereon and in accordance with Sections 284, 285, and 287 of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended:

## PROPOSED AMENDMENT

"Amendment 57.

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"(a) All sessions of the legislature shall be held at the capitol in the senate chamber and in the hall of the house of representatives, unless at any time it should from any cause become impossible or dangerous for the legislature to meet or remain at the capitol, or for the senate to meet or remain in the senate chamber, or for the representatives to meet or remain in the hall of the house of representatives, in which case the governor may convene the legislature, or remove it after it has convened, to some other place, or may designate some other place for the sitting of the respective houses, or either of them, as necessity may require. The legislature shall convene on the second Tuesday in January next succeeding their election and shall remain in session for not longer than ten consecutive calendar days. No business can be transacted at such sessions except the organization of the legislature, the election of officers, the appointment of standing committees of the senate and the house of representatives for the ensuing four years, which election and appointment may, however, also be made at such other times as may be necessary, the opening and publication of the returns and the ascertainment and declaration of the results of the election for governor, lieutenant-governor, attorney-general,

state auditor, secretary of state, state treasurer, superintendent of education, and commissioner of agriculture and industries, the election of such officers in the event of a tie vote, the determination of contested elections for such offices, the judging of the election returns and qualification of the members of the legislature, and the inauguration of the governor and the other elected state officers whose terms of office are concurrent with that of the governor. At the beginning of each such organization session, and at such other times as may be necessary, the senate shall elect one of its members president pro tempore thereof, to preside over its deliberations in the absence of the lieutenant-governor, and the house of representatives shall elect one of its members as speaker, to preside over its deliberations. The president of the senate and the speaker of the house of representatives shall each hold his respective office until his successor has been elected and qualified. The legislature shall convene in regular sessions on the first Tuesday in May of 1947 and on the first Tuesday in May in each second year thereafter, until the date of meeting shall have been changed by act of the legislature and approved by the governor. The legislature shall not remain in session longer than thirty-six days at any such regular session. Special sessions of the legislature convened in the manner provided by this Constitution also shall be limited to thirty-six days. The pay of members of the legislature shall be ten dollars per day. Each member of the legislature shall be paid ten cents per mile in going from his

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residence to, and in returning to his residence from, the seat of government, to be computed by the nearest usual route traveled; and not more than one such travel allowance shall be paid for each session of the legislature. In addition to his travel allowance, each member of the legislature also shall be allowed expenses, other than actual expenses of traveling, not exceeding an amount to be fixed by the legislature, incurred in the performance of his duties; but such expense allowance shall not be less than the smallest allowance to any other person traveling within the state in the service of the state of Alabama, or any of its agencies, for expenses other than actual expenses of traveling. The provisions of this Constitution in conflict herewith are hereby modified to conform to the provisions of this amendment. The provisions of this amendment shall become effective at the beginning of the term of the members of the legislature elected at the general election in 1946.

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"(b) (1) The presiding officers and members of the

Legislature shall be compensated in the same annual amount as

the average gross income and receive the same average benefits

of public classroom teachers in Alabama for the preceding

calender year as determined by the Department of Finance,

beginning with the 2012 calendar year. Adjustments shall be

made to the compensation payable in January 2013 and each

January thereafter.

"(2) In addition to the compensation provided in subdivision (1), the presiding officers and members of the

1 Legislature shall receive reimbursement for expenses for each 2 day of attending a session or committee meeting of the Legislature or traveling on legislative business at the same 3 4 rates as are reimbursed to public classroom teachers for in-state and out-of-state travel on official state business, 5 6 upon the submission of vouchers to the Lieutenant Governor and 7 Speaker of the House of Representatives. "(3) Each member of the Alabama Legislature may 8 elect to be compensated at a rate lower than the average gross 9 10 income of public classroom teachers and opt out of accepting the same benefits as granted to the teachers. 11 12 "(4) The compensation, benefits, and reimbursement provided in subdivisions (1) and (2) shall constitute the 13 14 total amounts payable to the presiding officers and members of 15 the Legislature, beginning January 1, 2013. All laws or parts of laws in conflict with this subsection are repealed, 16 17 including, but not limited to: Act 87-209, Act 91-108, Act 2007-75, Act 1196 of the 1971 Regular Session, Act 91-95, Act 18 90-490, and Section 29-1-8, Code of Alabama 1975." 19 Section 2.
