| 13 | Tuscaloosa County, Alabama, we recommend naming the Bridge |
| 14 | over Hurricane Creek the Horace and Thelma Sellers Bridge; and |
| 15 | WHEREAS, James Horace Sellers was born May 11, 1918, |
| 16 | in rural Tuscaloosa County; his wife, Thelma Cordella Clements |
| 17 | Sellers was born on October 16, 1921; Horace and Thelma were |
| 18 | married on September 2, 1940; they had three children, Billy |
| 19 | Ray Sellers (Barbara Clark Sellers), Linda Sellers Dill |
| 20 | (Freddie Eugene Dill), and Walter Lee Sellers (Lucy Rosenfeld |
| 21 | Sellers); and |
| 22 | WHEREAS, after marrying Thelma, Mr. and Mrs. Sellers |
| 23 | began living their lives in Peterson; he began Sellers |
| 24 | Trucking Company in 1945, originally a logging company; in |
| 25 | 1963, Billy, his oldest son, began working with him; Sellers |
| 26 | Trucking Company employed anywhere from 15 to 40 persons |
| 27 | during its 58 years in business; their youngest son, Lee, |

joined the company in 1979 and with his father, began
Fleetwood Trucking Company, an-over-the-road division of
Sellers Trucking; it employed an additional 60 employees; it
still operates in Fleetwood, Alabama; Horace and his sons
often rehired workers who had left or quit without a reason;
they always knew what a risk this was but were determined to
give employees a second and even third chance to make things
right; and

WHEREAS, Horace Sellers became a deacon at Ruhama Baptist Church, the same church where his father so often preached; he remained a deacon until his health kept him from serving the community he loved so well; his son, Billy also served as deacon for 25 years; Horace was able to use his compassion as well as his business sense to aid the church in assisting multitudes of people over the years; people who came to him for assistance were never turned down, even if they had borrowed from him before; and

WHEREAS, Horace Sellers was well known for his fear of tornadoes, but even this was an opportunity for him to aid the community; he installed a storm shelter with a tunnel from his house all the way underneath his yard and out to the highway; this gave easy access to anyone who lived nearby, especially the trailer park inhabitants who lived across the road; these shelters provided much needed protection during the horrible April 27, 2011, tornado for untold numbers; and WHEREAS, Horace Sellers was a businessman, a deacon,

a father, a grandfather, and a friend; he helped untold

numbers of people and taught his children and grandchildren 1 what true charity, compassion, and love really is; now 2 therefore, 3 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That we do hereby name the bridge 5 over Hurricane Creek on Highway 216 in Tuscaloosa County, 6 7 Alabama, the Horace and Thelma Sellers Bridge and request the appropriate officials to place and maintain signs or markers 8 as provided in this resolution. 9 10 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this 11 resolution be provided to Horace Sellers so that this

meritorious designation is known.
