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8	MOURNING THE DEATH OF MR. W.L. STRAIN AS A GREAT
9	ADVOCATE FOR SICKLE CELL ORGANIZATIONS.
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11	WHEREAS, with deep sadness for his death but in
12	admiration and appreciation of his life, we record the passing
13	of Mr. W. L. Strain of Tuskegee, Alabama, on September 14,
14	2011, at the age of 81 years; and
15	WHEREAS, Mr. Strain was revered as an icon in the
16	battle against Sickle Cell Disease and a champion in the arena
17	of equal rights; and
18	WHEREAS, born on April 16, 1930, in Decatur,
19	Alabama, he became a devout Christian at an early age and
20	joined Greenwood Missionary Baptist Church after moving to
21	Tuskegee; and
22	WHEREAS, he earned a Bachelor of Science Degree in
23	1954 in Agriculture Science and a Master of Science Degree in
24	Agriculture Education, both from Tuskegee Institute; he then
25	served his country with honor and distinction, commissioned as
26	a Second Lieutenant in the United States Air Force, prior to

receiving a terminal degree in Agriculture Journalism from the University of Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, always an exceptional student, Mr. Strain worked very hard to overcome challenging circumstances in order to reach his desired goals; he was noted for his perseverance and tenacity in working to achieve equality for African-Americans, women, and other minorities, including those who faced discriminatory practices in the Alabama Cooperative Extension System, where he was instrumental in creating unprecedented opportunities for minorities and later became Assistant Director and Head of the Cooperative Extension Services Information Services Unit and also an Associate Professor in the Journalism Department at Auburn University; he retired in 1995 with the rank of Professor Emeritus in two Colleges of Auburn University and remained very active in effective service to his profession and the community; and

WHEREAS, he was a dedicated and active member of numerous professional organizations and civil rights groups, including being a founder of the Auburn Black Caucus, which awarded its first W. L. Strain Award in 1995; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Strain was especially active in the advocacy of Sickle Cell treatment and research organizations, serving as president of the Board of Directors of the Southeast Alabama Sickle Cell Association during the mid 1980s; in his capacity as president, he began working with the members of the Alabama Legislative Black Caucus and the

various committee chairs in behalf of additional funding for
Sickle Cell and became the contact person for the Sickle Cell
Chapters in Alabama, working with Representative James E.
Buskey and Senator Hank Sanders along with others on many
occasions during Budget Hearings by the Legislature as well as
during the legislative session, and effectively monitoring the
entire funding process for Sickle Cell until the budgets were

signed by the Governor; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Strain worked with the Sunset Committee of the Alabama Legislature to help create the Sickle Cell Oversight and Regulatory Commission, which was enacted in 1996 by Act 96-727, and funding to this Commission was \$1,304,771 in 2011; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Strain's legacy as a great advocate for Sickle Cell Organizations will endure far into the future; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That the death of Mr. W.L. Strain is recorded with deep sadness, and this resolution is offered in highest tribute to his life, along with heartfelt sympathy to his family, whose grief we share.
