organizations representing a wide range of interests, can attest that, without any doubt, the programs within the Conservation Title work cost-effectively to serve the shortand long-term interests of the American people; and

26 WHEREAS, the Conservation Title programs recognize 27 that the health of America's soil, water, and other natural

1 resources is essential to the long-term productivity and 2 economic viability of agriculture and forestry, that protecting and managing our natural resources is critical to 3 4 the future of American communities, and that most of our nation's opportunities for hunting, fishing, and observing 5 6 nature depend upon privately owned habitat on farms, ranches, 7 and forest land. The Conservation Title programs help to protect these resources in a uniquely successful way by 8 funding a variety of voluntary partnerships and cooperative 9 10 conservation efforts between the U.S. Department of Agriculture and private landowners. These conservation 11 12 programs are essential to the sustainability of U.S. 13 agriculture and forestry and to meeting the growing demand for 14 food and fiber at home and abroad; and

15 WHEREAS, while America has become a more urban nation, agriculture, forestry, and outdoor recreation continue 16 17 to be essential to America's economy, and according to the United States Department of Agriculture, farm and farm-related 18 employment includes about 24 million jobs. Estimates by the 19 American Forest and Paper Association are that forest 20 21 management and forest dependent industries account for 22 approximately five percent of the total U.S. manufacturing 23 GDP, produce about \$175 billion in products annually, and employ nearly 900,000 people; and 24

25 WHEREAS, A study by United States Fish and Wildlife 26 Service finds that hunting, angling, and wildlife-dependent 27 recreation contribute \$122 billion annually to our national

1 economy. Much of this economic activity is located in rural 2 areas where these activities are vital to local economies. Natural resources-based products represent a significant 3 4 proportion of the export sector so essential to our economic health. Indeed, U.S. agricultural exports exceeded \$137 5 billion and accounted for a \$42 billion farm trade surplus in 6 7 2011, one of the few bright spots in the American economy last 8 year; and

9 WHEREAS, the Farm Bill programs fund voluntary 10 agreements between the USDA, nongovernmental organizations and farmers, ranchers, and foresters to keep their land in 11 12 agriculture and forestry, to preserve natural habitat in rural 13 landscapes, to save the productivity and economic value of 14 soil and water, and to assist in the management of 15 agricultural and forest lands. The result is real conservation with multiple benefits for every region of America, not the 16 17 least of these is helping landowners to stay on the land as stewards of America's legacy of natural resources; now 18 therefore, 19

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, That by copy of this resolution to each member of the Alabama Congressional delegation, we urge each of you to vote to reauthorize the Farm Bill in a manner that sustains the integrity and effectiveness of the Conservation Title and maintains conservation funding that meets our national needs.
