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8 SYNOPSIS: Under existing law, a person commits the
9 crime of disrupting a funeral or memorial service
10 if the person engages in a protest within 500 feet
11 of the entrance to a funeral facility or church
12 within 60 minutes before or during a funeral
13 service.

14 This bill would provide that a person would
15 be guilty of the offense if a protest is within
16 1,000 feet of the property line of the funeral
17 facility.

18 Amendment 621 of the Constitution of Alabama
19 of 1901, now appearing as Section 111.05 of the
20 Official Recompilation of the Constitution of
21 Alabama of 1901, as amended, prohibits a general
22 law whose purpose or effect would be to require a
23 new or increased expenditure of local funds from
24 becoming effective with regard to a local
25 governmental entity without enactment by a 2/3 vote
26 unless: it comes within one of a number of

1 specified exceptions; it is approved by the
2 affected entity; or the Legislature appropriates
3 funds, or provides a local source of revenue, to
4 the entity for the purpose.

5 The purpose or effect of this bill would be
6 to require a new or increased expenditure of local
7 funds within the meaning of the amendment. However,
8 the bill does not require approval of a local
9 governmental entity or enactment by a 2/3 vote to
10 become effective because it comes within one of the
11 specified exceptions contained in the amendment.

14 TO BE ENTITLED

17 To amend Section 13A-11-17 of the Code of Alabama
18 1975, providing the offense of disrupting a funeral or
19 memorial service, to increase the distance within which a
20 protest is prohibited subject to existing penalties; and in
21 connection therewith would have as its purpose or effect the
22 requirement of a new or increased expenditure of local funds
23 within the meaning of Amendment 621 of the Constitution of
24 Alabama of 1901, now appearing as Section 111.05 of the
25 Official Recompilation of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901,
26 as amended.

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

2 Section 1. Section 13A-11-17 of the Code of Alabama
3 1975, is amended to read as follows:

4 "§13A-11-17.

5 "(a) A person commits the crime of disrupting a
6 funeral or memorial service if, during the 60 minutes
7 immediately preceding a funeral or memorial service that has a
8 scheduled starting time, during the funeral or memorial
9 service, or immediately following the funeral or memorial
10 service, the person does any of the following with the
11 intention of disrupting the funeral or memorial service:

12 "(1) Engages in a protest, including, but not
13 limited to, protest with or without using an electric sound
14 amplification device, that involves singing, chanting,
15 whistling, yelling, or honking a motor vehicle horn within ~~500~~
16 1,000 feet of the ~~entrance to~~ property line of a facility
17 being used for a funeral or memorial service.

18 "(2) Blocks access to a facility being used for the
19 service.

20 "(3) Impedes vehicles that he or she knows are part
21 of the procession.

22 "(b) For purposes of this section, the term
23 "facility" includes a funeral home, church, or cemetery in
24 which the funeral or memorial service takes place.

1 "(c) A violation of subsection (a) is a Class A
2 misdemeanor for the first conviction and a Class C felony for
3 each subsequent conviction."

4 Section 2. Although this bill would have as its
5 purpose or effect the requirement of a new or increased
6 expenditure of local funds, the bill is excluded from further
7 requirements and application under Amendment 621, now
8 appearing as Section 111.05 of the Official Recompilation of
9 the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended, because the
10 bill defines a new crime or amends the definition of an
11 existing crime.

12 Section 3. This act shall become effective on the
13 first day of the third month following its passage and
14 approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
