135832-1:n:01/24/2012:KMS/th LRS2012-378 1 2 3 4 5 6 7 URGING THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION AND THE 8 ALABAMA DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH TO ENCOURAGE ALL SCHOOLS 9 10 TO PARTICIPATE IN A SCHOOL-BASED INFLUENZA VACCINATION 11 PROGRAM. 12 13 WHEREAS, the Alabama Legislature finds as follows: 14 (1) Influenza is a contagious respiratory illness 15 caused by influenza viruses, and the best way to help prevent seasonal influenza is by being vaccinated each year. 16 17 (2) Every year in the United States, on average, more than 200,000 people are hospitalized from 18 influenza-related complications and about 36,000 people, 19 mostly elderly, die from influenza-related causes. 20 21 (3) The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices 22 of the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (ACIP) recommended, effective July 1, 2008, routine 23 24 seasonal influenza vaccination for all children ages six 25 months to 18 years, inclusive.

(4) Children and young adults ages five years to 19
 years, inclusive, are three to four times more likely to be
 infected with influenza than adults.

4 (5) School-aged children are the population group
5 most responsible for the transmission of contagious
6 respiratory viruses, including influenza.

7 (6) The elderly are the most vulnerable population
8 to suffer severe illness from influenza due to weaker immune
9 response to vaccination.

10 (7) School-based vaccination programs may be an
11 effective way to vaccinate children while reducing
12 transmission and infection rates to the larger community and
13 reducing rates of school absenteeism due to children being
14 infected with influenza.

(8) Increased focus on providing influenza vaccine
to children targeted for immunization may assist efforts to
build a sound foundation for future vaccination efforts.

18 (9) Schools may be an effective infrastructure tool
19 to improve pandemic planning by identifying known and
20 effective pandemic vaccination centers.

(10) School-based programs may help facilitate mass
immunization clinics and build partnerships with local public
health teams in the event of a public health emergency, such
as a pandemic.

(11) Although experience has demonstrated the
 feasibility and success of school-based influenza vaccination
 programs in vaccinating children, funding and logistical

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issues, particularly involving the delivery of vaccine to children with private insurance coverage, are issues with program sustainability; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That the State Department of Education, in consultation with the Alabama Department of Public Health, strongly encourage all public K-12 schools to participate in a school-based influenza vaccination program with all of the following attributes:

10 (1) The program shall be run entirely by health care11 providers or community immunizers, or both.

a. Health care providers and community immunizers
shall be responsible for ordering vaccine for children (VFC)
influenza vaccine through the Alabama Department of Public
Health and for purchasing non-VFC influenza vaccine from
manufacturers.

b. Health care providers and community immunizers
shall be responsible for acquiring insurance information and
billing for the administration of the vaccine to the
appropriate insurer.

c. No child, regardless of insurance, shall berefused a vaccine.

(2) The program shall be designed to administer
 influenza vaccine consistent with the recommendations of the
 ACIP for the annual vaccination of school-aged children ages
 five years to 19 years, inclusive.

(3) The program may be implemented by any willing
 provider with the ability to order and administer both VFC and
 non-VFC influenza vaccines in accordance with Alabama law.

4 (4) Only federal Food and Drug Administration 5 approved influenza vaccines may be used in the program.

6 (5) Individual student participation shall be 7 voluntary and the vaccine shall only be administered to a 8 student with the written consent of the parent or legal 9 guardian of the student.

10 (6) Information on the school-based influenza 11 program and a consent for vaccination form shall be included 12 by each participating local board of education in the 13 applicable Student/Parent Information Guide provided to each 14 student at the beginning of each school year.

15 (7) The program may not restrict the discretion of a
16 health care provider or community immunizer, or both, to
17 administer seasonal influenza vaccine approved by the federal
18 Food and Drug Administration for use in pediatric populations.

(8) Influenza vaccination shall be offered to all
children as soon as the vaccine becomes available, before the
start of the influenza season, and shall continue to be
offered throughout the entire influenza season.
