1 139761-4:n:04/03/2012:JGW/JGW 2 3 4 5 6 7 URGING CONGRESS TO REAUTHORIZE THE CONSERVATION 8 TITLE OF THE UNITED STATES FARM BILL. 9 10 WHEREAS, deliberations needed to re-authorize the 11 12 Farm Bill in 2012 will be particularly difficult given the need to reduce federal government spending, and we believe the 13 Conservation Title can continue to meet vital national needs 14 15 while sharing in budget reductions; and 16 WHEREAS, landowners, farmers, ranchers, forest 17 managers, agricultural and forest businesses, hunters and 18 anglers, local and state government officials, and nonprofit 19 organizations representing a wide range of interests, can 20 attest that, without any doubt, the programs within the 21 Conservation Title work cost-effectively to serve the 22 short-term and long-term interests of the American people; and 23 WHEREAS, the Conservation Title programs recognize 24 that the health of America's soil, water, and other natural 25 resources is essential to the long-term productivity and 26 economic viability of agriculture and forestry, that

1 protecting and managing our natural resources is critical to 2 the future of American communities, and that most of our nation's opportunities for hunting, fishing, and observing 3 nature depend upon privately owned habitat on farms, ranches, 4 and forest land. The Conservation Title programs help to 5 protect these resources in a uniquely successful way by 6 7 funding a variety of voluntary partnerships and cooperative conservation efforts between the U.S. Department of 8 Agriculture and private landowners. These conservation 9 10 programs are essential to the sustainability of U.S. 11 agriculture and forestry and to meeting the growing demand for 12 food and fiber at home and abroad; and

WHEREAS, while America has become a more urban 13 14 nation, agriculture, forestry, and outdoor recreation continue 15 to be essential to America's economy, and according to the 16 United States Department of Agriculture, farm and farm-related 17 employment includes about 24 million jobs. Estimates by the American Forest and Paper Association are that forest 18 19 management and forest dependent industries account for 20 approximately five percent of the total U.S. manufacturing 21 GDP, produce about \$175 billion in products annually, and 22 employ nearly 900,000 people; and

23 WHEREAS, A study by United States Fish and Wildlife 24 Service finds that hunting, angling, and wildlife-dependent 25 recreation contribute \$122 billion annually to our national 26 economy. Much of this economic activity is located in rural 1 areas where these activities are vital to local economies.
2 Natural resources-based products represent a significant
3 proportion of the export sector so essential to our economic
4 health. Indeed, U.S. agricultural exports exceeded \$137
5 billion and accounted for a \$42 billion farm trade surplus in
6 2011, one of the few bright spots in the American economy last
7 year; and

WHEREAS, the Farm Bill programs fund voluntary 8 agreements between the USDA, nongovernmental organizations and 9 10 farmers, ranchers, and foresters to keep their land in 11 agriculture and forestry, to preserve natural habitat in rural 12 landscapes, to save the productivity and economic value of 13 soil and water, and to assist in the management of 14 agricultural and forest lands. The result is real conservation 15 with multiple benefits for every region of America, not the 16 least of these is helping landowners to stay on the land as 17 stewards of America's legacy of natural resources; now therefore, 18
