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6	CREATING AN INTERIM STUDY COMMITTEE TO REVIEW THE
7	FEASIBILITY OF DELEGATING TO TRAINED SCHOOL PERSONNEL THE
8	AUTHORITY TO ADMINISTER INSULIN AND GLUCAGON TO STUDENTS WITH
9	DIABETES.
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11	WHEREAS, the care of a student with diabetes usually
12	requires management during the school day, given that high and
13	low blood glucose levels are dangerous, even life-threatening,
14	in the short term, good management is needed to prevent
15	long-term complications of diabetes, and well-managed diabetes
16	is also critical for students' ability to learn; and
17	WHEREAS, while the school nurse plays a key role in
18	providing care for a student with diabetes in the school
19	setting and is the most appropriate person in the school
20	setting to provide care for a student with diabetes, many
21	Alabama schools do not have a full-time nurse, and even a
22	full-time school nurse will not always be available due to
23	absence, illness, or the need to treat the injury or illness
24	of another student; and
25	WHEREAS, a large and growing number of states permit

insulin and glucagon administration by trained school

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personnel; and

WHEREAS, the delegation to trained non-medical 2 school personnel of the authority to administer insulin and glucagon has been found to be safe by the primary diabetes and 3 pediatric medicine organizations, along with key educational organizations and relevant government agencies, including, but not limited to: the American Academy of Pediatrics; American 6 7 Association of Clinical Endocrinologists; American Association of Diabetes Educators; American Diabetes Association; American 8 Dietetic Association; American Medical Association; Barbara 9 Davis Center for Childhood Diabetes; Centers for Disease 10 Control and Prevention: Children with Diabetes: The Endocrine 11 12 Society; Indian Health Service, Division of Diabetes Treatment 13 and Prevention; Joslin Diabetes Center; Juvenile Diabetes 14 Research Foundation International; Pediatric Endocrine 15 Society, National Association of Chronic Disease Directors 16 Diabetes Council; National Association of Elementary School 17 Principals; National Association of School Psychologists; National Association of Secondary School Principals; National 18 Education Association Health Information Network; National 19 20 Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases; 21 Pediatric Endocrine Nursing Society; and U.S. Department of 22 Education: and 23 WHEREAS, the health and welfare of school children 24 in Alabama is of paramount interest to the Legislature of 25 Alabama; now therefore, 26 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH

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HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That there is created an interim

study committee to review the feasibility of delegating to trained school personnel the authority to administer insulin and glucagon to students with diabetes, with guidance from the

American Diabetes Association's Safe at School program.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the interim study committee shall be comprised of the following members:

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- 7 (1) The Chair of the Senate Health Committee, or his or her designee.
  - (2) The Chair of the House Health Committee, or his or her designee.
    - (3) One member of the Senate appointed by the President Pro Tempore.
  - (4) One member of the House appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
- 15 (5) The State Health Officer, or his or her designee.
  - (6) The Executive Director of the State Board of Nursing, or his or her designee.
  - (7) The Director of the School Nurses Program at the State Department of Education.
  - (8) One representative each from the American
    Diabetes Association, Childrens' Health System, the Alabama
    State Nurses Association, the Alabama School Nurses
    Association, the Alabama Chapter of the American Academy of
    Pediatrics, the Alabama Association of School Boards, the
    School Superintendents Association of Alabama, and the Alabama
    Council of Administrators in Special Education.

Each legislative member of the committee shall be entitled to his or her regular legislative compensation, his or her per diem, and travel expenses for each day he or she attends a meeting of the committee. Upon requisitions signed by the chair of the committee, these payments shall be paid out of any funds appropriated to the use of the Legislature by means of warrants drawn by the Comptroller on the State Treasury. Notwithstanding the foregoing, no member shall receive additional legislative compensation or per diem when the Legislature is in session or if a member is being paid any other payments on the same dates for attendance on other state business.

The membership of the committee shall be inclusive and reflect the racial, gender, geographic, urban/rural, and economic diversity of the state. The committee shall annually report to the Legislature by the second legislative day of each regular session the extent to which the committee has complied with the diversity provision provided for in this resolution.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this interim committee shall make its recommendations as to how the State of Alabama should proceed in order to ensure that necessary care is provided for students with diabetes, 15 days prior to the 2013 Regular Session of the Alabama Legislature so that legislation may be prepared or administrative rules changed so that students with diabetes may safely participate in all school activities without danger or discrimination.
