10	TO A POLICY FOR PULSE OXIMETRY SCREENING ON ALL ALABAMA

13	WHEREAS, Mary Beth Miller, born on October 17, 2005,
14	to Mark and Stacee Miller of Dothan, Alabama, passed away
15	Saturday, March 23, 2013, at the young age of seven; and
16	WHEREAS, throughout her life Mary Beth was an
17	example of true courage; being born premature at only 3.6
18	pounds and with a very complex heart condition, she endured
19	six open-heart surgeries and more than 340 medical procedures;
20	and
21	WHEREAS, Mary Beth saw the world as a place to learn
22	new things, loved making friends, and in her own words wanted
23	to dedicate her life to helping Alabama babies; and
24	WHEREAS, Mary Beth's personal story, along with the
25	dedication of her parents, served as the impetus for statewide
26	efforts to require all Alabama birthing facilities to perform

pulse oximetry screening on newborns prior to their being discharged; and

WHEREAS, the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention states that congenital heart defects (CHD) is the leading cause of infant death due to birth defects, and it is calculated that 300 infants with an unrecognized critical heart defect are discharged each year from newborn nurseries in the United States; and

WHEREAS, pulse oximetry is a noninvasive test to estimate the percentage of hemoglobin in blood that is saturated with oxygen and, when performed on a newborn within 24 to 48 hours of age, pulse oximetry screening is often more effective at detecting critical, life-threatening CHDs which otherwise go undetected by current screening methods; and

WHEREAS, many newborn lives will potentially be saved by earlier detection and treatment of CHDs when birthing facilities in the state are required to perform this simple, noninvasive newborn screening in conjunction with current CHD screening methods; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That Mary Beth Miller be commended for her legacy in the efforts leading to a policy requiring that the pulse oximetry testing be completed on all Alabama newborns prior to discharge.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That Mark and Stacee Miller, Representative Paul Lee, Senator Mark Keahey, the American

Heart Association, the Alabama Hospital Association, the
Medical Association of the State of Alabama, and the Alabama
Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics also be
commended for their collaborative effort working in
conjunction with the Alabama Department of Public Health to
achieve this very important change in policy in the health
care of newborns in Alabama.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That Mark and Stacee Miller, Representative Paul Lee, Senator Mark Keahey, Alabama

Department of Public Health, the American Heart Association, the Alabama Hospital Association, the Medical Association of the State of Alabama, and the Alabama Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics, be presented with a copy of this resolution.
