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8	MOURNING THE DEATH OF REVEREND NIMROD Q. REYNOLDS.

10	WHEREAS, it is with an overwhelming sense of loss
11	that we mourn the death of Reverend Nimrod Q. Reynolds of
12	Anniston, Alabama, on May 12, 2013, at the age of 82 years;
13	and
14	WHEREAS, his passing leaves a void in the lives of
15	his loving family and his many friends; he was among the
16	titans of the struggle for equal rights as well as a dedicated
17	pastor who preached his first sermon in 1949; and
18	WHEREAS, born on April 30, 1931, in Chambers County,
19	Alabama, he earned a Bachelor's Degree from Clark College in
20	Atlanta, Georgia; Master's Degree from the International
21	Theological Seminary; and Doctor of Ministry Degree from
22	Wesleyan Theological Seminary at American University in
23	Washington, D.C.; and
24	WHEREAS, among the highlights of his role as a Civil
25	Rights pioneer, he was attacked and beaten by members of the
26	Ku Klux Klan as he attempted to check out a book from the

Public Library in Anniston in September 1963 when Blacks were not allowed to utilize the library's resources; and

WHEREAS, he went on to roles of leadership in the Civil Rights Movement, including serving as EEOC officer with the Community Action Agency, in key positions of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, as a member of the Human Relations Council, and as chairman of the Anniston Improvement Association; and

WHEREAS, in 1967, he integrated Tenth Street
Elementary School with his two children, the only Blacks in
the school at that time; in 1972, he sued the school board and
forced desegregation; and in 1976, he was elected the first
Black president of the Anniston City Board of Education; and

WHEREAS, Reverend Reynolds is credited with being one of the influential leaders who worked diligently to implement peaceful change in the City of Anniston during the turbulent Civil Rights era; and

WHEREAS, among his well-deserved recognitions, he was honored in January 2012 by The University of Alabama for his work in Civil Rights and in June 2012 by the Alabama Black Achievers; and

WHEREAS, his devout service as a minister encompassed 48 years as pastor of the 17th Street Baptist Church, where he shepherded the church's growth both spiritually and structurally to its standing as a pillar of faith in the community; and

WHEREAS, he was married for 47 years to the late Lue
Nell Todd Reynolds and their union was blessed with a
daughter, Tammye Quinnell, and son, Andre'deKoven; and
WHEREAS, Reverend Reynolds dedicated his life to the
service of God and mankind, and few individuals have surpassed
the extent of his far-reaching contributions to the struggle
for equal rights; although his presence will be greatly
missed, his legacy will endure and his memory will be
cherished in the hearts of those who were fortunate to know

him; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, That the death of Reverend Nimrod Q. Reynolds is recorded with deep sadness, and this resolution is offered in highest tribute to his life and with heartfelt sympathy to his family, whose grief is shared by many.
