- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

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Section 1. Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, in order to provide for an increase in 5 receipts into the State General Fund for the funding of the 6 7 operations of state government, there is hereby established the authority to transfer from the several state departments, 8 9 state funds in those amounts as are annually specified in the 10 State General Fund appropriations act beginning with the fiscal year ending September 30, 2014 and each fiscal year 11 12 thereafter. Such transfers shall be for the purpose of 13 providing funds to help offset the costs of state services 14 provided to the several departments by state entities which 15 are supported by appropriations from the State General Fund.

Section 2. This act shall not apply to any state funds which are designated for a specific purpose by the state constitution.

Section 3. All laws or parts of laws which conflict with this act are repealed.

Section 4. This act shall become effective October 1, 2013.
