1 147761-1:n:02/04/2013:DSM/tj LRS2013-484 2 3 5 6 7 AFFIRMING THE SPIRIT AND INTENT OF AMENDMENT 448 OF 8 THE CONSTITUTION OF ALABAMA OF 1901, KNOWN AS THE BUDGET 9 10 ISOLATION AMENDMENT. 11 12 WHEREAS, the adoption of Amendment 448 of the 13 Constitution of Alabama of 1901 by the people of Alabama in 14 1984 affirmed that the paramount duty of the Legislature is to make basic appropriations during regular sessions, ensuring 15 that the ordinary expenses of the executive, legislative, and 16 17 judicial departments of the state, for payment of the public debt, and for education, shall be the first order of business 18 before any other matter; and 19 WHEREAS, Amendment 448 requires the Governor to 20 21 submit budget proposals to the House of Representatives and 22 Senate for consideration no later than the second legislative 23 day; and

WHEREAS, Amendment 448 requires that before any single bill, local or general, may be transmitted from one chamber to the other, that the House and Senate shall pass the budgets and that those budgets be signed by the presiding

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officers of each house of the Legislature and that they be presented to the Governor; and

WHEREAS, Amendment 448 contains a provision, commonly known as the Bill Isolation Resolution or BIR, by which an exception is allowed to temporarily set aside the budget isolation requirement established by Amendment 448 upon a three-fifths vote of the House or Senate by resolution, declaring that the provisions shall not applicable to a bill specified in the resolution by number and title; and

WHEREAS, in recent years application of the BIR has become commonplace in nature resulting in the Legislature paying little heed to the mandate of Amendment 448, that the budgets shall be prioritized before all other legislation; and

WHEREAS, in recent Legislative sessions, passage of the budgets did not occur until the final days or hours of the legislative session; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That beginning with the 2013 Regular Session and sessions following, we reaffirm our commitment to the people's will, ardently expressed in their passage of Amendment 448, and acknowledge our paramount duty of passing the budgets in a timely manner and that our actions will promote accountability and budget transparency through embracing the spirit and intent of the Budget Isolation Amendment.
