9 (b) Each state agency and local board of education, 10 commencing on January 1, 2015, and each year thereafter, shall 11 provide its employees with an itemized statement of all 12 employee benefits. The itemization may be disseminated to the 13 employees electronically or on the last pay stub of the 14 employee.

Section 2. This act shall become effective on the first day of the third month following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.

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
