147263-6:n:08/06/2013:LLR/th LRS2013-80R3 1 2 3 4 5 6 7 SYNOPSIS: This bill would codify the establishment of 8 the Alabama Drought Assessment and Planning Team 9 10 created by the Governor's June 24, 2011, Executive 11 Order Number 19, and provide for its membership, 12 duties, responsibilities, and powers. 13 This bill would establish the Monitoring and Impacts Group Subcommittee and provide for its 14 15 membership, duties, responsibilities, and powers. 16 This bill would codify the charges given to 17 the Alabama Office of Water Resources which is a 18 division of the Alabama Department of Economic and 19 Community Affairs, with the responsibility of 20 developing a State Drought Plan and periodically 21 issuing drought declarations. 22 The bill would reaffirm the Governor's 23 ability to respond to extreme drought conditions 24 under the powers provided under the Alabama 25 Emergency Management Act of 1955. This bill would allow the Office of Water 26 27 Resources to promulgate rules.

13	the Alabama Office of Water Resources which is a division of
14	the Alabama Department of Economic and Community Affairs, with
15	the responsibility of developing a State Drought Plan and
16	periodically issuing drought declarations; to reaffirm the
17	Governor's ability to respond to extreme drought conditions
18	under the powers provided under the Alabama Emergency
19	Management Act of 1955; and to allow the Office of Water
20	Resources to promulgate rules.
21	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
22	Section 1. This act may be known and cited as the
23	Alabama Drought Planning and Response Act.
24	Section 2. As used in this act, the following words
25	shall have the following meanings:
26	(1) ADAPT. The Alabama Drought Assessment and
27	Planning Team as created by this act.

(2) ADECA. The Alabama Department of Economic and
 Community Affairs.

3 (3) ADCNR COMMISSIONER. The Commissioner of the
 4 Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources.

5 (4) ADEM DIRECTOR. The Director of the Alabama
6 Department of Environmental Management.

7 (5) AEMA DIRECTOR. The Director of the Alabama
8 Emergency Management Agency.

9 (6) ALABAMA ADJUTANT GENERAL. The Commanding General 10 of the Alabama National Guard.

(7) AGI COMMISSIONER. The Commissioner of the
 Alabama Department of Agriculture and Industries.

(8) COMMUNITY PUBLIC WATER SYSTEM. A public water
system which serves at least 15 service connections used by
year-round residents or regularly serves at least 25
year-round residents.

(9) DROUGHT CONSERVATION PLAN. A written plan that
addresses graduated drought response procedures with
implementation of specific measures based on drought severity.
The drought conservation plan may be a separate plan or a
component of a broader emergency response plan.

(10) DROUGHT DECLARATION. A written summary, issued
 by OWR, containing a description of drought conditions
 throughout the state.

(11) DROUGHT EMERGENCY. A written declaration by the
 Governor that drought conditions in all or any part of the

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state are of such severity that public health or safety is
 threatened.

3 (12) DROUGHT MONITOR. The assessment of drought
4 conditions throughout the United States published weekly by
5 the National Integrated Drought Information System (NIDIS) on
6 the "drought.gov" domain or its successor.

7 (13) EMERGENCY ACTION PLAN. A written emergency8 response plan.

9 (14) MIG. The Monitoring and Impact Group
10 Subcommittee of ADAPT as created by this act.

(15) MIG CHAIR. The chair of the Monitoring and
 Impact Group Subcommittee as created by this act.

(16) OFFICE OF WATER RESOURCES DIVISION DIRECTOR.
 The Division Director of the Office of Water Resources.

(17) OFFICE OF WATER RESOURCES or OWR. The Alabama
 Office of Water Resources, a division of the Alabama
 Department of Economic and Community Affairs.

(18) STATE CLIMATOLOGIST. The State Climatologist of
 Alabama as appointed by the Governor and qualified to meet the
 roles and standards established by the American Association of
 State Climatologists as a Recognized State Climate Office.

(19) STATE FORESTER. The Director of the Alabama
 Forestry Commission.

24 (20) STATE GEOLOGIST. The Director of the Geological
 25 Survey of Alabama.

1	Section 3. (a) The Office of Water Resources shall
2	publish a drought plan for the State of Alabama which shall
3	include as a minimum the following:
4	(1) Procedures for defining drought levels.
5	(2) ADAPT and MIG operating procedures.
6	(3) Drought-related information collection, storage,
7	and dissemination procedures.
8	(4) Procedures related to the issuance of drought
9	declarations.
10	(5) Procedures for the development of inputs to the
11	drought monitor.
12	(6) Measures that encourage water conservation and
13	efficiency throughout the state.
14	(7) Public information and outreach on drought
15	related programs and conditions.
16	(b) The plan shall be updated periodically but no
17	less than every five years.
18	(c) Upon adoption by the state of any statewide
19	legislation addressing water resource planning or policy, OWR
20	shall review the drought plan and no later than 180 days
21	following the adoption of said legislation shall make any
22	changes in the plan necessary to ensure it is consistent with
23	that legislation.
24	Section 4. (a) There is created the Alabama Drought
25	Assessment and Planning Team (ADAPT) consisting of the
26	following members:

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1 (1) The Office of Water Resources Division Director 2 or his or her designated representative. (2) The AEMA Director or his or her designated 3 4 representative. (3) The ADEM Director or his or her designated 5 representative. 6 7 (4) The Alabama Adjutant General or his or her designated representative. 8 (5) The AGI Commissioner or his or her designated 9 10 representative. 11 (6) The ADCNR Commissioner or his or her designated 12 representative. 13 (7) The Alabama State Forester or his or her 14 designated representative. 15 (8) The State Geologist of Alabama or his or her 16 designated representative. 17 (9) The State Climatologist of Alabama or his or her designated representative. 18 19 (10) The Chair of the Drought Monitoring and Impact Group (MIG) Subcommittee. 20 21 (11) A representative from a recognized Watershed 22 Management Authority as appointed by the Governor. (12) Two members representing the state at large 23 24 appointed by the Governor. (13) The State Executive Director of the Alabama 25 26 Soil and Water Conservation Committee, or his or her designee.

(14) The State Conservationist of the Alabama
 Natural Resource Conservation Service, or his or her designee.

3 (15) From time to time the Governor may appoint
4 additional members of ADAPT as appropriate.

5 (16) In addition to the above members, the Chair of 6 ADAPT is authorized to invite representatives from appropriate 7 federal agencies to be members of ADAPT. A federal 8 representative may participate in an ex officio capacity with 9 no voting rights and shall not count towards a quorum.

10 (b) The Office of Water Resources Division Director, 11 or his or her designee, shall serve as chair of ADAPT and the 12 chair shall have the following duties, powers, and 13 responsibilities:

14 (1) Call, chair, and conduct all meetings of ADAPT.
15 (2) Create and appoint members of any subcommittees;
16 including the MIG. Membership of the MIG shall be based upon
17 an individual's drought-related expertise or experience and
18 may include both members and nonmembers of ADAPT.

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(3) Appoint the chair of the MIG.

20 (c) ADAPT shall have the following duties, powers,
 21 and responsibilities:

(1) To provide advice to the Office of WaterResources on the development of a statewide drought plan.

24 (2) To assess drought conditions in the state,
25 based on input from the MIG.

26 (3) To advise the Governor when a drought emergency
27 exists either statewide or in an area or areas of the state.

1 (4) To make recommendations to the Governor for any 2 mandatory water withdrawal restrictions or reductions that he 3 or she may wish to order.

4 (5) To establish procedures for the operations and 5 meetings of ADAPT and any subcommittees.

6 (6) To administer and spend such funds as are 7 appropriated by the Legislature or provided from other sources 8 for the establishment and administration of ADAPT. ADECA shall 9 serve as the administrative and financial support of ADAPT.

10 (7) ADAPT shall have at least one standing subcommittee which shall be known as the Monitoring and Impact 11 12 Group (MIG) whose duties shall be to conduct meetings and 13 report recommendations to ADAPT. The MIG shall collect and 14 summarize information relating to drought conditions and 15 forecasts including rainfall, stream flows, reservoir elevations, soil moisture, and groundwater levels, as well as 16 17 the impacts of these conditions and forecasts on public water supplies, the environment, agriculture, industry, and 18 recreation. The MIG may also recommend responses and 19 20 strategies necessary to mitigate drought effects on Alabama. 21 The MIG Chair shall provide a summary of drought conditions at 22 the request of the ADAPT Chair and at each ADAPT meeting.

23 (8) ADAPT may establish other subcommittees as24 needed.

25 (d) ADAPT shall meet at least twice annually.
26 (e) Members of ADAPT appointed as at-large members
27 shall be eligible to receive compensation, subsistence

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allowances, mileage, or associated expenses in accordance with state travel policies and procedures which shall be allocated by ADECA. Officials or other state employees who are appointed or designated to ADAPT shall be allowed to participate in ADAPT as part of their duties and may claim per diem, mileage, or associated expenses as allowed by law.

7 (f) If ADAPT determines that the severity of the conditions in a drought area of the state or the whole state 8 9 have progressed to the extent that the safety or health of the citizens of an area of the state or of the whole state is 10 threatened, ADAPT shall expeditiously report those conditions 11 12 to the Governor. In coordination with the AEMA, ADAPT shall 13 also present to the Governor a priority list of recommended 14 actions designed to mitigate the effects of drought 15 conditions. Preservation of drinking water for citizens and 16 water for human health and safety shall be the first priority.

17 Section 5. The State Climatologist, in coordination 18 with the Office of Water Resources, shall be responsible for 19 providing an input to the drought monitor concerning drought 20 conditions in this state. The input shall be consistent with 21 any drought declarations issued by the Office of Water 22 Resources. The state drought plan shall include provisions for 23 this coordination process.

24 Section 6. Each community public water system shall 25 develop a drought conservation plan which addresses graduated 26 drought response procedures with implementation of specific 27 measures based on drought severity. The drought conservation plan may be a separate plan or a component of a broader emergency action plan. The procedures or plans shall include appropriate enforcement mechanisms. Copies of all plans shall be submitted to the Office of Water Resources, and it shall provide copies of the plan to ADEM upon its request.

Section 7. If a community public water system 6 7 implements voluntary or mandatory restrictions or reductions in water use, the system shall report these actions to the 8 Office of Water Resources. The Office of Water Resources shall 9 10 also have the authority to require the reporting of other information, such as the status of local water supplies and 11 12 sources. OWR shall maintain an information clearinghouse for 13 this and other drought-related information and make the 14 information available via the Internet or other appropriate 15 means.

Section 8. The Office of Water Resources, with the 16 17 advice and input from ADAPT, shall have the authority to issue drought declarations. These drought declarations shall provide 18 information on where drought conditions are affecting this 19 20 state, and the severity of those conditions. The drought 21 declaration shall be based on a number of factors including, 22 but not limited to, meteorological conditions, stream flow 23 levels, reservoir elevations, soil moisture conditions, ground 24 water levels, weather forecasts, as well as impacts to 25 agriculture, water supplies, industry, recreation, and fish and wildlife habitats. 26

1 Section 9. Pursuant to the Governor's emergency 2 powers, other powers granted by law, and this act he or she may issue a state of emergency and exercise the rights, 3 4 powers, privileges, immunities, and responsibilities provided by the Alabama Emergency Management Act of 1955, commencing 5 with Section 31-9-1, Code of Alabama 1975. A declared state of 6 7 emergency related to the drought conditions may also include executive orders to require restrictions or reductions of 8 9 water withdrawals, allocating water on an equitable basis, or 10 both. Any executive order restricting or reducing water withdrawals will specify the specific geographic area 11 12 involved, conditions of the restriction and the amount of the 13 withdrawal reductions. These emergency executive orders may 14 continue so long as conditions giving rise to the declaration of a drought emergency continue to threaten public health or 15 16 safety.

Section 10. The Office of Water Resources may promulgate and adopt rules consistent with the objectives of this act.

20 Section 11. The provisions of this act are 21 severable. If any part of this act is declared invalid or 22 unconstitutional, that declaration shall not affect the part 23 which remains.

24 Section 12. This act shall become effective on the 25 first day of the third month following its passage and 26 approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
