3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

4 Section 1. Sections 36-25-1, 36-25-13, 36-25-16, and
5 29-1-26, Code of Alabama 1975, are amended to read as follows:
6 "\$36-25-1.

7 "Whenever used in this chapter, the following words8 and terms shall have the following meanings:

9 "(1) BUSINESS. Any corporation, partnership, 10 proprietorship, firm, enterprise, franchise, association, 11 organization, self-employed individual, or any other legal 12 entity.

"(2) BUSINESS WITH WHICH THE PERSON IS ASSOCIATED.
Any business of which the person or a member of his or her
family is an officer, owner, partner, board of director
member, employee, or holder of more than five percent of the
fair market value of the business.

18 "(3) CANDIDATE. This term as used in this chapter 19 shall have the same meaning ascribed to it in Section 20 17-22A-2.

21

"(4) COMMISSION. The State Ethics Commission.

"(5) COMPLAINT. Written allegation or allegationsthat a violation of this chapter has occurred.

24 "(6) COMPLAINANT. A person who alleges a violation 25 or violations of this chapter by filing a complaint against a 26 respondent. "(7) CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION. A complaint filed
pursuant to this chapter, together with any statement,
conversations, knowledge of evidence, or information received
from the complainant, witness, or other person related to such
complaint.

"(8) CONFLICT OF INTEREST. A conflict on the part of 6 7 a public official or public employee between his or her private interests and the official responsibilities inherent 8 in an office of public trust. A conflict of interest involves 9 10 any action, inaction, or decision by a public official or public employee in the discharge of his or her official duties 11 12 which would materially affect his or her financial interest or 13 those of his or her family members or any business with which 14 the person is associated in a manner different from the manner 15 it affects the other members of the class to which he or she belongs. A conflict of interest shall not include any of the 16 17 following:

18 "a. A loan or financial transaction made or19 conducted in the ordinary course of business.

20 "b. An occasional nonpecuniary award publicly 21 presented by an organization for performance of public 22 service.

"c. Payment of or reimbursement for actual and necessary expenditures for travel and subsistence for the personal attendance of a public official or public employee at a convention or other meeting at which he or she is scheduled to meaningfully participate in connection with his or her 1 official duties and for which attendance no reimbursement is
2 made by the state.

"d. Any campaign contribution, including the 3 4 purchase of tickets to, or advertisements in journals, for political or testimonial dinners, if the contribution is 5 6 actually used for political purposes and is not given under 7 circumstances from which it could reasonably be inferred that the purpose of the contribution is to substantially influence 8 a public official in the performance of his or her official 9 10 duties.

11

"(9) DAY. Calendar day.

"(10) DEPENDENT. Any person, regardless of his or her legal residence or domicile, who receives 50 percent or more of his or her support from the public official or public employee or his or her spouse or who resided with the public official or public employee for more than 180 days during the reporting period.

"(11) DE MINIMIS. A value twenty-five dollars (\$25) 18 or less per occasion and an aggregate of fifty dollars (\$50) 19 or less in a calendar year from any single provider, or such 20 21 other amounts as may be prescribed by the Ethics Commission 22 from time to time by rule pursuant to the Administrative 23 Procedure Act or adjusted each four years from August 1, 2012, 24 to reflect any increase in the cost of living as indicated by 25 the United States Department of Labor Consumer Price Index or 26 any succeeding equivalent index.

1 "(12) ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT FUNCTION. Any function 2 reasonably and directly related to the advancement of a 3 specific, good-faith economic development or trade promotion 4 project or objective.

"(13) EDUCATIONAL FUNCTION. A meeting, event, or 5 6 activity held within the State of Alabama, or if the function 7 is predominantly attended by participants from other states, held within the continental United States, which is organized 8 9 around a formal program or agenda of educational or 10 informational speeches, debates, panel discussions, or other 11 presentations concerning matters within the scope of the 12 participants' official duties or other matters of public 13 policy, including social services and community development 14 policies, economic development or trade, ethics, government 15 services or programs, or government operations, and which, taking into account the totality of the program or agenda, 16 17 could not reasonably be perceived as a subterfuge for a purely social, recreational, or entertainment function, and the total 18 cost of travel and attendance for a public official and his or 19 her spouse is less than five hundred dollars (\$500). 20

21 "(14) FAMILY MEMBER OF THE PUBLIC EMPLOYEE. The22 spouse or a dependent of the public employee.

"(15) FAMILY MEMBER OF THE PUBLIC OFFICIAL. The
spouse, a dependent, an adult child and his or her spouse, a
parent, a spouse's parents, a sibling and his or her spouse,
of the public official.

"(16) GOVERNMENTAL CORPORATIONS AND AUTHORITIES. 1 2 Public or private corporations and authorities, including but not limited to, hospitals or other health care corporations, 3 4 established pursuant to state law by state, county or municipal governments for the purpose of carrying out a 5 specific governmental function. Notwithstanding the foregoing, 6 7 all employees, including contract employees, of hospitals or other health care corporations and authorities are exempt from 8 the provisions of this chapter. 9

10 "(17) HOUSEHOLD. The public official, public11 employee, and his or her spouse and dependents.

12 "(18) LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER. A full-time employee 13 of a governmental unit responsible for the prevention or 14 investigation of crime who is authorized by law to carry 15 firearms, execute search warrants, and make arrests.

16 "(19) LEGISLATIVE BODY. The Senate of Alabama, the 17 House of Representatives Legislature of Alabama, a county 18 commission, city council, city commission, town council, or 19 municipal council or commission, and any committee or 20 subcommittee thereof.

"(20) LOBBY or LOBBYING. The practice of promoting, opposing, or in any manner influencing or attempting to influence the introduction, defeat, or enactment of legislation before any legislative body; opposing or in any manner influencing the executive approval, veto, or amendment of legislation; or the practice of promoting, opposing, or in any manner influencing or attempting to influence the

1 enactment, promulgation, modification, or deletion of 2 regulations before any regulatory body. The term does not include providing public testimony before a legislative body 3 4 or regulatory body or any committee thereof. However, any person who, on behalf of his or her 5 6 employer or a third-party with whom he or she has a contract, 7 speaks with a member or members of a legislative body about proposed, pending, or potential legislation, formally or 8 informally, shall be deemed to be engaged in lobbying. 9 10 "(21) LOBBYIST. "a. The term lobbyist includes any of the following: 11 12 "1. A person who receives compensation or 13 reimbursement from another person, group, or entity to lobby. 14 "2. A person who lobbies as a regular and usual part 15 of employment, whether or not any compensation in addition to regular salary and benefits is received. 16 17 "3. A consultant to the state, county, or municipal levels of government or their instrumentalities, in any manner 18 employed to influence legislation or regulation, regardless 19 whether the consultant is paid in whole or part from state, 20 21 county, municipal, or private funds. 22 "4. An employee, a paid consultant, or a member of 23 the staff of a lobbyist, whether or not he or she is paid, who 24 regularly communicates with members of a legislative body 25 regarding pending legislation and other matters while the legislative body is in session. 26

1 "b. The term lobbyist does not include any of the 2 following:

3 "1. An elected official on a matter which involves4 that person's official duties.

5 "2. A person or attorney rendering professional 6 services in drafting bills or in advising clients and in 7 rendering opinions as to the construction and effect of 8 proposed or pending legislation, executive action, or rules or 9 regulations, where those professional services are not 10 otherwise connected with legislative, executive, or regulatory 11 action.

12 "3. Reporters and editors while pursuing normal13 reportorial and editorial duties.

14 "4. Any citizen not lobbying for compensation who 15 contacts a member of a legislative body, or gives public 16 testimony on a particular issue or on particular legislation, 17 or for the purpose of influencing legislation and who is 18 merely exercising his or her constitutional right to 19 communicate with members of a legislative body.

20 "5. A person who appears before a legislative body,
21 a regulatory body, or an executive agency to either sell or
22 purchase goods or services.

"6. A person whose primary duties or responsibilities do not include lobbying, but who may, from time to time, organize social events for members of a legislative body to meet and confer with members of professional organizations and who may have only irregular

contacts with members of a legislative body when the body is
 not in session or when the body is in recess.

3 "7. A person who is a member of a business,
4 professional, or membership organization by virtue of the
5 person's contribution to or payment of dues to the
6 organization even though the organization engages in lobbying
7 activities.

8 "8. A state governmental agency head or his or her 9 designee who provides or communicates, or both, information 10 relating to policy or positions, or both, affecting the 11 governmental agencies which he or she represents.

12 "(22) MINOR VIOLATION. Any violation of this chapter 13 in which the public official or public employee receives an 14 economic gain in an amount less than two hundred fifty dollars 15 (\$250) or the governmental entity has an economic loss of less 16 than two hundred fifty dollars (\$250).

"(23) PERSON. A business, individual, corporation,
partnership, union, association, firm, committee, club, or
other organization or group of persons.

"(24) PRINCIPAL. A person or business which employs,
hires, or otherwise retains a lobbyist. A principal is not a
lobbyist but is not allowed to give a thing of value.

"(25) PROBABLE CAUSE. A finding that the allegations
are more likely than not to have occurred.

25 "(26) PUBLIC EMPLOYEE. Any person employed at the 26 state, county, or municipal level of government or their 27 instrumentalities, including governmental corporations and

authorities, but excluding employees of hospitals or other 1 2 health care corporations including contract employees of those hospitals or other health care corporations, who is paid in 3 4 whole or in part from state, county, or municipal funds. For purposes of this chapter, a public employee does not include a 5 6 person employed on a part-time basis whose employment is 7 limited to providing professional services other than lobbying, the compensation for which constitutes less than 50 8 percent of the part-time employee's income. 9

10 "(27) PUBLIC OFFICIAL. Any person elected to public office, whether or not that person has taken office, by the 11 vote of the people at state, county, or municipal level of 12 13 government or their instrumentalities, including governmental 14 corporations, and any person appointed to a position at the 15 state, county, or municipal level of government or their instrumentalities, including governmental corporations. For 16 17 purposes of this chapter, a public official includes the chairs and vice-chairs or the equivalent offices of each state 18 political party as defined in Section 17-13-40. 19

"(28) REGULATORY BODY. A state agency which issues
regulations in accordance with the Alabama Administrative
Procedure Act or a state, county, or municipal department,
agency, board, or commission which controls, according to rule
or regulation, the activities, business licensure, or
functions of any group, person, or persons.

"(29) REPORTING PERIOD. The reporting official's or
 employee's fiscal tax year as it applies to his or her United
 States personal income tax return.

4 "(30) REPORTING YEAR. The reporting official's or
5 employee's fiscal tax year as it applies to his or her United
6 States personal income tax return.

7 "(31) RESPONDENT. A person alleged to have violated
8 a provision of this chapter and against whom a complaint has
9 been filed with the commission.

10 "(32) STATEMENT OF ECONOMIC INTERESTS. A financial 11 disclosure form made available by the commission which shall 12 be completed and filed with the commission prior to April 30 13 of each year covering the preceding calendar year by certain 14 public officials and public employees.

15 "(33) SUPERVISOR. Any person having authority to hire, transfer, suspend, lay off, recall, promote, discharge, 16 17 assign, or discipline other public employees, or any person responsible to direct them, or to adjust their grievances, or 18 to recommend personnel action, if, in connection with the 19 foregoing, the exercise of the authority is not of a merely 20 21 routine or clerical nature but requires the use of independent 22 judgment.

23

"(34) THING OF VALUE.

24 "a. Any gift, benefit, favor, service, gratuity,
25 tickets or passes to an entertainment, social or sporting
26 event, unsecured loan, other than those loans and forbearances
27 made in the ordinary course of business, reward, promise of

1 future employment, or honoraria or other item of monetary 2 value.

3 "b. The term, thing of value, does not include any 4 of the following, provided that no particular course of action 5 is required as a condition to the receipt thereof:

6 "1. A contribution reported under Chapter 5 of Title 7 17 or a contribution to an inaugural or transition committee.

8 "2. Anything given by a family member of the 9 recipient under circumstances which make it clear that it is 10 motivated by a family relationship.

"3. Anything given by a friend of the recipient under circumstances which make it clear that it is motivated by a friendship and not given because of the recipient's official position. Relevant factors include whether the friendship preexisted the recipient's status as a public employee, public official, or candidate and whether gifts have been previously exchanged between them.

18 "4. Greeting cards, and other items, services with
19 little intrinsic value which are intended solely for
20 presentation, such as plaques, certificates, and trophies,
21 promotional items commonly distributed to the general public,
22 and items or services of de minimis value.

23 "5. Loans from banks and other financial24 institutions on terms generally available to the public.

"6. Opportunities and benefits, including favorable
rates and commercial discounts, available to the public or to
a class consisting of all government employees.

"7. Rewards and prizes given to competitors in
 contests or events, including random drawings, which are open
 to the public.

"8. Anything that is paid for by a governmental
entity or an entity created by a governmental entity to
support the governmental entity or secured by a governmental
entity under contract, except for tickets to a sporting event
offered by an educational institution to anyone other than
faculty, staff, or administration of the institution.

10 "9. Anything for which the recipient pays full11 value.

"10. Compensation and other benefits earned from a non-government employer, vendor, client, prospective employer, or other business relationship in the ordinary course of employment or non-governmental business activities under circumstances which make it clear that the thing is provided for reasons unrelated to the recipient's public service as a public official or public employee.

19 "11. Any assistance provided or rendered in20 connection with a safety or a health emergency.

"12. Payment of or reimbursement for actual and necessary transportation and lodging expenses, as well as waiver of registration fees and similar costs, to facilitate the attendance of a public official or public employee, and the spouse of the public official or public employee, at an educational function or widely attended event of which the person is a primary sponsor. This exclusion applies only if 1 the public official or public employee meaningfully 2 participates in the event as a speaker or a panel participant, by presenting information related to his or her agency or 3 4 matters pending before his or her agency, or by performing a ceremonial function appropriate to his or her official 5 6 position; or if the public official's or public employee's 7 attendance at the event is appropriate to the performance of his or her official duties or representative function. 8

9 "13. Payment of or reimbursement for actual and 10 necessary transportation and lodging expenses to facilitate a 11 public official's or public employee's participation in an 12 economic development function.

"14. Hospitality, meals, and other food and 13 14 beverages provided to a public official or public employee, and the spouse of the public official or public employee, as 15 an integral part of an educational function, economic 16 17 development function, work session, or widely attended event, such as a luncheon, banquet, or reception hosted by a civic 18 club, chamber of commerce, charitable or educational 19 organization, or trade or professional association. 20

"15. Any function or activity pre-certified by the
Director of the Ethics Commission as a function that meets any
of the above criteria.

24 "16. Meals and other food and beverages provided to 25 a public official or public employee in a setting other than 26 any of the above functions not to exceed for a lobbyist 27 twenty-five dollars (\$25) per meal with a limit of one hundred fifty dollars (\$150) per year; and not to exceed for a
principal fifty dollars (\$50) per meal with a limit of two
hundred fifty dollars (\$250) per year. Notwithstanding the
foregoing, the lobbyist's limits herein shall not count
against the principal's limits and likewise, the principal's
limits shall not count against the lobbyist's limits.

7 "17. Anything either (i) provided by an association or organization to which the state or, in the case of a local 8 government official or employee, the local government pays 9 10 annual dues as a membership requirement or (ii) provided by an 11 association or organization to a public official who is a 12 member of the association or organization and, as a result of 13 his or her service to the association or organization, is 14 deemed to be a public official. Further included in this 15 exception is payment of reasonable compensation by a 16 professional or local government association or corporation to 17 a public official who is also an elected officer or director of the professional or local government association or 18 corporation for services actually provided to the association 19 or corporation in his or her capacity as an officer or 20 21 director.

"18. Any benefit received as a discount on accommodations, when the discount is given to the public official because the public official is a member of an organization or association whose entire membership receives the discount. "c. Nothing in this chapter shall be deemed to
limit, prohibit, or otherwise require the disclosure of gifts
through inheritance received by a public employee or public
official.

"(35) VALUE. The fair market price of a like item if 5 purchased by a private citizen. In the case of tickets to 6 7 social and sporting events and associated passes, the value is the face value printed on the ticket. However, if a social or 8 sporting event is sold out, meaning that the tickets are not 9 10 available to the general public at the box office or ticket office managing the event for purchase at the face value of 11 12 the ticket, the ability to purchase a ticket to that event at 13 face value shall itself be deemed a thing of value. Likewise, 14 if a team or organization has a method through which a donation is required to be able to purchase season tickets and 15 the ability to purchase special event tickets for that team or 16 17 organization's events, the ability to purchase season tickets at face value without paying such a donation shall be deemed a 18 thing of value. If there is a waiting list for such a program, 19 the ability to skip the waiting list shall be deemed a thing 20 21 of value.

"(36) WIDELY ATTENDED EVENT. A gathering, dinner, reception, or other event of mutual interest to a number of parties at which it is reasonably expected that more than 12 individuals will attend and that individuals with a diversity of views or interest will be present, and where public officials shall comprise 10 percent or less of the attendees. 1

2	"(a) <u>No Governor shall serve for a fee as a lobbyist</u>			
3	or otherwise represent clients, including his or her employer

For the purposes of 20 21 this subsection, such prohibition shall not include a former member of the Alabama judiciary who as an attorney represents 22 a client in a legal, non-lobbying capacity. 23

24 "(b)(c) No public employee shall serve for a fee as 25 a lobbyist or otherwise represent clients, including his or 26 her employer before the board, agency, commission, or 27 department, of which he or she is a former employee for a period of two years after he or she leaves such employment.
For the purposes of this subsection, such prohibition shall
not include a former employee of the Alabama judiciary who as
an attorney represents a client in a legal, non-lobbying
capacity.

"(c)(d) No public official, director, assistant 6 7 director, department or division chief, purchasing or procurement agent having the authority to make purchases, or 8 9 any person who participates in the negotiation or approval of 10 contracts, grants, or awards or any person who negotiates or approves contracts, grants, or awards or any family member of 11 such official as defined by Section 36-25-1(15) shall enter 12 13 into, solicit, or negotiate a contract, grant, or award with 14 the governmental agency of which the person was a member or 15 employee for a period of two years after he or she leaves the membership or employment of such governmental agency. 16

17 "(d)(e) No public official or public employee who 18 personally participates in the direct regulation, audit, or 19 investigation of a private business, corporation, partnership, 20 or individual shall within two years of his or her departure 21 from such employment solicit or accept employment with such 22 private business, corporation, partnership, or individual.

23 "(e)(f) No former public official or public employee
24 of the state may, within two years after termination of office
25 or employment, act as attorney for any person other than
26 himself or herself or the state, or aid, counsel, advise,
27 consult or assist in representing any other person, in

1 connection with any judicial proceeding or other matter in 2 which the state is a party or has a direct and substantial interest and in which the former public official or public 3 4 employee participated personally and substantially as a public official or employee or which was within or under the public 5 6 official or public employee's official responsibility as an 7 official or employee. It shall likewise be unlawful for any business entity that sells any goods or services to the State of 18 Alabama, or any subdivision thereof, regardless of amount of 19 procurement method, to employ a public official or a family 20 member thereof, as defined by Section 36-25-1(15), during the 21 22 public official's term of office or for two years thereafter.

23 "(f)(h) Nothing in this chapter shall be deemed to 24 limit the right of a public official or public employee to 25 publicly or privately express his or her support for or to 26 encourage others to support and contribute to any candidate, 27 political committee as defined in Section 17-22A-2, referendum, ballot question, issue, or constitutional

4 (a) When any citizen of the state or business with which he or she is associated represents for a fee any person 5 6 before a regulatory body of the Executive Branch or 7 Legislative Branch, he or she shall report to the commission the name of any adult child, parent, spouse, brother, or 8 sister who is a public official or a public employee of that 9 10 regulatory body of the Executive Branch or who has served as a public official in any capacity in the last 10 years. 11

4 "(a) This section shall be known and may be cited as
5 the Legislative Double Dipping Prohibition Act.

"(b) Any other provision of law to the contrary 6 7 notwithstanding, and except as provided in subsection (c), a member of the Legislature, and his or her family members, as 8 defined by Section 36-25-1(15), during his or her term of 9 10 office, may not be an employee of any other branch of state government, any department, agency, board, or commission of 11 12 the state, or any public educational institution including, 13 but not limited to, a local board of education, a two-year 14 institution of higher education, or a four-year institution of higher education. For purposes of this section, employee means 15 any of the following: 16

17 (1) An employee as defined in Section 36-27-1, or a
18 teacher as defined in Section 16-25-1. An employee as defined
19 in this subsection shall not include any person receiving
20 pension benefits from the Retirement Systems of Alabama.

(2) A person who is personally providing services under a personal or professional services contract paid for by the department, agency, board, commission, or educational entity, including the Department of Postsecondary Education or a two-year institution of higher education, except that persons appointed by any court or any district attorney in this state to provide legal services on a temporary, 1 case-by-case, or part time basis shall not be considered an
2 employee for purposes of this section.

(3) A person who has a substantial financial 3 4 interest by reason of full- or part-time employment of himself or herself of a family member by, compensation to himself or 5 her self or a family member from, ownership of, control of, or 6 7 exercise of power over any interest greater than five percent of the value of any corporation, partnership, company, joint 8 venture, or other business entity that is providing goods or 9 10 services under any contract paid for by the branch, department, agency, board, commission, or educational 11 12 institution, including the Department of Postsecondary 13 Education or a two-year institution of higher education, 14 except for contracts awarded pursuant to competitive bidding, on sealed bids, to the lowest responsible bidder, and except 15 where the contract service of the business or the business 16 17 entity with the state branch, department, agency, board, commission, or educational institution consists of acting as a 18 qualified public depository for a public depositor under 19 Chapter 14A of Title 41. The competitive bidding requirements 20 21 of this subdivision do not apply during an emergency or 22 disaster situation where the legislator is the single or sole 23 source provider of necessary emergency equipment or services.

24 "(c) the prohibition provided in subsection (b) does25 not apply to any of the following:

"(1) Any administrative or teaching contract thatdoes not extend beyond December 31, 2014.

1 "(2) The continued employment of a legislator, until 2 November 5, 2014, if the legislator is an employee or teacher 3 as provided in subdivision (1) of subsection (b) on December 4 1, 2010.

5 "(3) Any contract as provided in subdivision (2) or 6 subdivision (3) of subsection (b) that is in force on December 7 1, 2010, if the contract expires before November 5, 2014.

"(4) Membership in or employment by the Alabama 8 National Guard, the civil defense force, or the state defense 9 10 force including, but not limited to, the Naval Militia, the Alabama State Guard, organized in lieu of the National Guard, 11 12 the civilian auxiliary of the United States Air Force known as 13 the Civil Air Patrol, the National Disaster Medical System, or 14 any other reserve component of the uniformed services of the 15 State of Alabama or the United States.

16 "(5) Any contract with providers of Medicaid 17 services in the ordinary and normal course of their profession 18 <u>as a physician, nurse, counselor, therapist, pharmacist, or</u> 19 <u>other health care professional</u>.

"(6) Any person employed on a part-time basis as referred to in Section 36-25-1, provided the income from such part-time employment does not exceed five percent of the part-time employee's income for each client and the total income from the part-time employment does not exceed 10 percent of the part-time employee's total income.

"(d) Subject to subsection (c), any employment or
contract that violates subsection (b) is void.

1 "(e) A legislator <u>or former legislator</u> shall be 2 personally liable to the State of Alabama for the amount of 3 any employment compensation received in violation of 4 subsection (b).

5 "(f) The Attorney General shall enforce this 6 section.

7 "(g) It is the intent of this section to treat the 8 employees of, and persons providing services under a personal 9 or professional services contract paid for by, the Department 10 of Postsecondary Education or any public two-year institution 11 of higher education in the state in the same manner as other 12 public education employees in the state are treated under this 13 section."

14 Section 2. Section 17-5-15.2 is added to the Code of 15 Alabama 1975, to read as follows:

16

§17-5-15.2.

17 (a) It shall be unlawful for any corporation, partnership, sole proprietorship, or other business entity 18 which has a contract with the State of Alabama, any board, 19 20 agency, commission, department, or legislative body of the 21 State of Alabama, or any subdivision thereof, to make a 22 contribution to a candidate for Governor, any constitutional 23 office, or any candidate for legislative office, unless such 24 contract was secured by sealed bid or was less than five hundred dollars (\$500) in value. 25

(b) The prohibition in subsection (a) shall also
apply to any stockholder, partner, shareholder, member, or

other individual who holds more than five percent equity share of such a business entity, his or her spouse or adult children.

4 (c) The prohibition in subsection (a) shall also
5 apply to any business entity that employs an elected official
6 or a former elected official within two years of the end of
7 his or her term. An elected official shall be deemed employed
8 by an entity from which he or she receives one dollar (\$1) or
9 more per year for services rendered.

10 Section 3. This act shall become effective 11 immediately following its passage and approval by the 12 Governor, or its otherwise becoming law and shall apply to 13 public officials elected or re-elected on or after that date.
