1 WHEREAS, an estimated 1.2 million Alabamians provide 2 care to adult relatives or friends, which equates to an 3 estimated 783 hours a year and an estimated value of \$7.3 4 billion each year; and

(3) The study committee is requested to receive
 testimony on the needs for family caregivers including
 designation of caregivers, training, respite services, medical
 leave policies, delegation of tasks to nonmedical aides and
 other policies.

8 (5) The study committee is requested to issue a 9 report to the Legislature by January 31, 2016, with 10 recommendations for legislative and administrative action to 11 support family caregivers.
