| 9 | INDEPENDENT MEMBERS OF THE ALABAMA LEGISLATURE AND URGING THE |
| 10 | GOVERNOR TO IMMEDIATELY EXPAND MEDICAID UNDER THE AFFORDABLE |
| 11 | CARE ACT IN THE STATE OF ALABAMA. |
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| 13 | WHEREAS, the question of how to provide |
| 14 | comprehensive, quality health care to all Alabamians |
| 15 | regardless of income, health status, age, or gender has been |
| 16 | one the Alabama Legislature has asked itself time and time |
| 17 | again; and |
| 18 | WHEREAS, Alabamians are suffering because of their |
| 19 | lack of access to health care; and |
| 20 | WHEREAS, according to the Kaiser Foundation, people |
| 21 | in Alabama go to the emergency room 20 percent more than the |
| 22 | average American; and |
| 23 | WHEREAS, according to the Centers for Disease |
| 24 | Control and Prevention, over 12 percent of Alabama's |
| 25 | population has been diagnosed with diabetes, which ranks it |
| 26 | among the highest rate in the nation; and |

1 WHEREAS, according to the Kaiser Foundation, Alabama 2 has the third highest amount of heart disease-related deaths in the nation (228.4 deaths per 100,000 people); and 3 WHEREAS, according to the Kaiser Foundation, Alabama 5 has the second highest infant mortality rate in the nation 6 (8.8 deaths per 1,000 live births); and 7 WHEREAS, more broad access to health care leads to preventive care, which produces healthier families, a 8 healthier workforce, and an all-around healthier state; with 9 10 the expansion of Medicaid, hundreds of thousands of Alabamians 11 will have access to preventive care versus acute care for the first time in their lives; and 12 13 WHEREAS, a 2012 study from the School of Public 14 Health at the University of Alabama at Birmingham (UAB) estimates that 300,000 additional Alabamians would be eligible 15 for health coverage should Medicaid be expanded, with a 16 17 majority of those people being employed, working Alabamians; 18 and WHEREAS, expansion of Medicaid will result in 19 20 reduced state spending on health care related services to 21 those previously uninsured residents with incomes below 133 22 percent of the federal poverty limit; and 23 WHEREAS, according to the 2012 UAB study, Shelby, 24 Blount, and Baldwin Counties have the largest percentages of 25 uninsured people among their low-income populations that would

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be newly eligible; and

1 WHEREAS, according to the 2012 UAB study, a \$1 2 increase in federal spending on Medicaid yields an additional 65-75 cents of economic activity; and 3 WHEREAS, according to a 2013 study conducted by the Culverhouse College of Commerce at the University of Alabama, 5 6 Medicaid expansion would create \$28 billion in overall 7 business activity through 2020 and approximately 30,000 new jobs would be created in the following industries: 11,290 jobs 8 in health care and social assistance; 6,390 jobs in retail 9 trade; 5,490 jobs in professional, scientific, and technical 10 services; 1,423 jobs in administrative and other support 11 12 services; 1,247 jobs in accommodation and food service; and 13 1,095 jobs in the finance and insurance industry; and 14 WHEREAS, the federal government will pay 100 percent 15 of the Medicaid expansion until 2017; the federal government's share will decrease to 95 percent in 2017 and ultimately to 90 16 17 percent by 2020; and

WHEREAS, with the additional revenue and economic activity that would be generated from expanding Medicaid, the cost to the State of Alabama would be more than covered; and

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WHEREAS, if Medicaid is not expended, the State of Alabama stands to lose \$12 billion in federal funds which are Alabamians' tax dollars going to provide health care in other states; and

WHEREAS, the State of Alabama has lost approximately 2.25 billion in federal dollars as of April 2015 by not expanding Medicaid and will continue to lose \$375 million for

every additional quarter that Medicaid expansion is rejected;
and

WHEREAS, a 2012 study conducted by the University of Alabama at Birmingham's School of Public Health found that the Medicaid expansion would generate \$20 billion in new economic activity and increase tax revenues by \$925 million through 2020; and

WHEREAS, Alabama's hospitals have experienced cuts that equal millions of dollars due to the Governor's refusal to expand Medicaid which has placed a tremendous financial strain on hospitals resulting in elimination of services, loss of jobs, and even hospital closures thus reducing access to care for every Alabamian; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That the Governor of the State of Alabama is urged to expand Medicaid immediately in this state under the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act to enhance access to health care, promote revenue and economic activity, and to save and create jobs in this state.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be sent forthwith to Governor Robert Bentley that he may know of our strong sentiments concerning this issue.
