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8	REQUESTING THE ALABAMA DEPARTMENT OF SENIOR SERVICES
9	TO ESTABLISH A STUDY COMMITTEE ON FAMILY CAREGIVING.
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11	WHEREAS, family caregivers are considered the
12	backbone of Alabama's long-term care system; and
13	WHEREAS, a 2013 PEW study estimates that 39 percent
14	of the adult population care for a loved one with significant
15	health issues; and
16	WHEREAS, that study would estimate that 1.8 million
17	Alabamians are providing care for a loved one or family
18	member; and
19	WHEREAS, the population of the state that is 85
20	years of age or older and most likely to need caregiving
21	assistance is projected to reach one million in the next
22	decade; and
23	WHEREAS, almost all people who need assistance with
24	activities of daily living want to remain in their homes and
25	communities: and

WHEREAS, providing services and support in homes and communities is generally much less expensive than nursing home care; and

WHEREAS, people who receive services from caregivers in their homes are much less likely to need public assistance;

and

WHEREAS, almost three-fourths of older people living in the community who receive personal assistance relied exclusively on unpaid caregivers for help; and

WHEREAS, the most recent survey completed by the AARP Public Policy Institute shows the population of caregivers who are caring for an adult with a disability or chronic health condition in Alabama is estimated at 818,000, and these caregivers are providing 783,000,000 hours of unpaid respite at a market rate of \$7,800,000,000, saving the State and Federal Government billions of dollars in health care-related costs; and

WHEREAS, in addition to the 2014 National Alzheimer Report showing 86,000 Alabamians diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease, the 2012 U.S. census estimates over 425,000 Alabamians representing 15.5 percent of adults aged 21-64 as having a disability, and most of these identified individuals with special health care or behavioral issues require a caregiver to assist with their independence, living at home or in the community; and

WHEREAS, the number of caregivers providing care to children with disabilities is in addition to the adult

caregiver statistics listed above, and their hours of unpaid respite reflect similar health care-related cost savings to the state; this group includes those caring for the 6,200 children age birth to three served in Alabama's Early Intervention Program in 2014 and another 133,000 children ages 3-21 enrolled in Alabama Department of Education Special Education Programs, with both age groups inclusive of CDC's estimate of 1 in 68 children reported as having an identified Autism Spectrum Disorder; and

WHEREAS, to successfully address the surging population of older adults who have significant needs for long-term services and support, in addition to the long-term services and support needs of those affected by developmental and acquired disabilities, the state must develop methods to both encourage and support families to assist their relatives affected by aging or disability and develop ways to recruit and retain a qualified, responsive in-home care workforce; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That (1) the Alabama Department of Senior Services (ADSS) is urged to establish a study committee on family caregiving and long-term support and services for the purpose of providing recommendations and advice to the Governor and Legislature to encourage innovative and creative means to support family caregivers to continue to provide needed in-home support for older adults and individuals with

1 disabilities and chronic conditions who need long-term 2 services and supports.

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- (2) The study committee is further requested to identify policies, resources, and programs available for family caregivers and encourage additional innovative and creative means to support family caregivers to continue to provide needed in-home support for care recipients.
- (3) The ADSS shall include representatives from the Alabama Lifespan Respite Resource Network and Coalition, AARP Alabama, the Disability Leadership Coalition of Alabama, the Alabama Developmental Disability Council, health and human service agencies, and other interested stakeholders including family caregiver representatives to participate in the study committee.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this 15 resolution shall be sent to the Alabama Department of Senior 17 Services.
