8	RECOGNIZING PORNOGRAPHY AS A PUBLIC HEALTH HAZARD.

10	WHEREAS, pornography is creating a public health
11	crisis; and
12	WHEREAS, pornography perpetuates a sexually toxic
13	environment; and
14	WHEREAS, efforts to prevent pornography exposure and
15	addiction, to educate individuals and families concerning its
16	harms, and to develop recovery programs must be addressed
17	systemically in ways that hold broader influences accountable;
18	and
19	WHEREAS, pornography is contributing to the
20	hypersexualization of teens, and even prepubescent children,
21	in our society; and
22	WHEREAS, due to advances in technology and the
23	universal availability of the Internet, young children are
24	exposed to what used to be referred to as hard core, but is
25	now considered mainstream, pornography at an alarming rate;
26	and

1	WHEREAS, the average age of exposure to pornography
2	is now 11 to 12 years of age; and
3	WHEREAS, this early exposure is leading to low
4	self-esteem and body image disorders, an increase in
5	problematic sexual activity at younger ages, and an increased
6	desire among adolescents to engage in risky sexual behavior;
7	and
8	WHEREAS, exposure to pornography often serves as
9	childrens' and youths' sex education and shapes their sexual
10	templates; and
11	WHEREAS, because pornography treats women as objects
12	and commodities for the viewer's use, it teaches girls they
13	are to be used and teaches boys to be users; and
14	WHEREAS, pornography normalizes violence and abuse
15	of women and children; and
16	WHEREAS, pornography treats women and children as
17	objects and often depicts rape and abuse as if they are
18	harmless; and
19	WHEREAS, pornography equates violence towards women
20	and children with sex and pain with pleasure, which increases
21	the demand for sex trafficking, prostitution, child sexual
22	abuse images, and child pornography; and
23	WHEREAS, potential detrimental effects on
24	pornography's users can impact brain development and
25	functioning, contribute to emotional and medical illnesses,
26	shape deviant sexual arousal, and lead to difficulty in

forming or maintaining intimate relationships, as well as 1 problematic or harmful sexual behaviors and addiction; and 2 WHEREAS, recent research indicates that pornography 3 4 is potentially biologically addictive, which means the user 5 requires more novelty, often in the form of more shocking material, in order to be satisfied; and 6 WHEREAS, this biological addiction leads to increasing themes of risky sexual behaviors, extreme 8 degradation, violence, and child sexual abuse images and child 9 10 pornography; and 11 WHEREAS, pornography use is linked to lessening 12 desire in young men to marry, dissatisfaction in marriage, and 13 infidelity; and WHEREAS, this link demonstrates that pornography has 14 a detrimental effect on the family unit; and 15 WHEREAS, overcoming pornography's harms is beyond 16 17 the capability of the afflicted individual to address alone; 18 now therefore, 19 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH 20 HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That we find that pornography is a 21
