WHEREAS, the accomplished Boaz native was a 1926 agricultural education graduate of Alabama Polytechnic Institute, where he was involved in many extracurricular activities and earned numerous honors; he was described as the most popular man to ever grace the Auburn campus; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Aldridge and his beloved and devoted wife, Zeta, had two sons, Mac and Eddie; Mr. Aldridge passed away in 1978; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Aldridge's significant contributions to the rewarding field of agriculture are a tremendous source of credit to the entire State of Alabama; his legacy will remain an inspiration for years to come; now therefore,
