1 manner to maintain free and safe passage for ships and flights
2 on and over the South China Sea; and

3 WHEREAS, since 1983, the State of Alabama and Taiwan 4 have enjoyed long, cordial, and mutually beneficial 5 sister-state relations, a friendship that continues to 6 strengthen with each passing year; and

7 WHEREAS, Taiwan is the United States' tenth-largest
8 trading partner, and the United States is Taiwan's
9 second-largest trading partner; and

10 WHEREAS, the designation of Taiwan into the United 11 States' Visa Waiver Program is a significant step to draw 12 travelers from Taiwan choosing the United States as their 13 destination for trade, investment, and sightseeing; and

14 WHEREAS, by working together with Taiwan, Alabama 15 welcomes all opportunities for an even closer economic partnership, such as the signing of a US-Taiwan Bilateral 16 17 Investment Agreement and a Free Trade Agreement, and the 18 inclusion of Taiwan in the Trans-Pacific Partnership in order to enhance the bond between Alabama and Taiwan and to 19 20 encourage further cultural, educational, and business exchanges between the citizens of both nations; and 21

22 WHEREAS, Taiwan is an active member in the 23 international community with a long history of commitment to 24 international health and humanitarian aid as well as 25 environmental protection; now therefore,

26 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH 27 HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That we commend and support the
