17	located were used for thousands of years by the pre-colonial

20	WHEREAS, the vast network of marker trees and the
21	early trails and roads have been photographed and documented
22	throughout Alabama and North America since the early 1800's,
23	and these early routes are extremely significant to the
24	development of our modern highway system; and
25	WHEREAS, one of the most impressive examples of the
26	many marker trees still standing across Alabama is a stately

oak in Madison County that is located on the historic route of
the Trial of Tears; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF
THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, That we recognize the great
historic and cultural significance and lasting influence of
the trail marker tree network in this state and North America.
