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8	RECOGNIZING THE IMPORTANCE OF REMOVING BARRIERS TO
9	BREAST FEEDING.
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11	WHEREAS, the American Academy of Pediatrics, the
12	American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, the
13	American Academy of Family Physicians, the Academy of
14	Breastfeeding Medicine, and the World Health Organization
15	recommend that babies be exclusively breast fed for the first
16	six months of an infant's life and continue to be breast fed
17	until 12 months of age or longer as mutually desired; and
18	WHEREAS, only 29.5 percent of Alabama infants are
19	still breastfeeding at six months of age, giving Alabama the
20	ranking 49 out of 50 for breastfeeding rates among all states;
21	and
22	WHEREAS, Alabama rates of breast feeding initiation,
23	duration, exclusivity, and work site support fall well below
24	both the national baseline and the Healthy People 2020 goal to
25	increase the proportion of infants who are ever breast fed to

26 82 percent; and

WHEREAS, in January 2011, the United States Surgeon 1 General announced a "Call to Action to Support Breastfeeding" 2 that identifies barriers to optimal breastfeeding in health 3 care practices, employment, communities, research, public 4 5 health infrastructure, and social networks, and also recommended methods in which families, communities, employers, 7 and health care professionals could help eliminate those barriers to improve breastfeeding rates and increase support 8 for breastfeeding; and 9 10 WHEREAS, children fed mainly breast milk for the first six months of life are 22 percent less likely to be 11 12 overweight by age 14; and WHEREAS, research shows that human milk and 13 breastfeeding provide advantages with regard to general 14 health, growth, and development while significantly decreasing 15 16 the risk of a large number of acute and chronic diseases such 17 as Sudden Infant Death Syndrome, asthma, allergies, diabetes, 18 viral and bacterial infections, childhood obesity, childhood 19 leukemia, necrotizing enterocolitis, and infant mortality; and 20 WHEREAS, mothers who breastfeed have a decreased 21 risk of breast, uterine and ovarian cancer, postpartum 22 depression, and osteoporosis later in life; and 23 WHEREAS, the nutrients exclusive to human milk are 24 vital to the growth, development, and maintenance of the human 25 brain and cannot be manufactured; and 26 WHEREAS, the United States Department of 27 Agriculture's Economic Research Service estimates that at

least 3.6 billion dollars in medical expenses could be saved each year if the number of children breast fed for at least six months increased to 50 percent; and

WHEREAS, breastfeeding has positive economic impacts on families by decreasing the need to pay for medical care for a sick infant and eliminating the need to purchase infant formula: and

WHEREAS, the health benefits to breastfed children and their mothers result in lower health care costs for employers, less employee time off to care for sick children and higher productivity and employee loyalty; and

WHEREAS, employers, employees, and society benefit by supporting a mother's decision to breastfeed and by helping to reduce the obstacles to initiating and continuing breastfeeding; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That the unique health, economic, and societal benefits that breastfeeding provides to babies, mothers, families, and the community as a whole and affirms that the State of Alabama should work to ensure that barriers to initiation and continuation of breastfeeding are removed.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That we encourage employers to strongly support and encourage breastfeeding by striving to provide accommodations of appropriate space and time to allow employees to express their milk.

RESOLVED FURTHER, That we encourage all state agencies that administer programs providing maternal or child

health services to provide information about breastfeeding to program participants, and to encourage and support program participants' choices to breastfeed.

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RESOLVED FURTHER, That the Secretary of the Senate is directed to transmit copies of this resolution to the Department of Human Resources, Department of Public Health, Department of Labor, and other such agencies deemed appropriate by the Secretary to advance the causes of this resolution.
