9	ALABAMA-KOREA EDUCATION AND ECONOMIC PARTNERSHIP.

11	WHEREAS, the Republic of South Korea has created and
12	expanded numerous industrial efforts throughout the State of
13	Alabama and the Southeastern United States, creating an annual
14	cash flow to the region of approximately \$40 billion; and
15	WHEREAS, Alabama alone has experienced a dramatic
16	economic impact from Hyundai and Kia, their suppliers, service
17	providers, and other directly related companies; and
18	WHEREAS, Hyundai's Alabama auto assembly plant and
19	its supplier network generated a total economic impact
20	approaching \$5 billion in 2014 while accounting for more than
21	12,600 new direct jobs across the state; and
22	WHEREAS, Hyundai Motor Manufacturing Alabama alone
23	generated an annual payroll of \$260 million including more
24	than \$44 million in benefits in 2014, and their direct
25	suppliers collectively generated an annual payroll of \$226
26	million in 2014; and

WHEREAS, the combined earnings and employment 1 2 impacts of Hyundai Motor Manufacturing Alabama and its suppliers were responsible for more than 38,000 direct 3 4 full-time jobs across Alabama and also responsible for more 5 than 15,000 indirect full-time jobs across Alabama; and WHEREAS, Hyundai Motor Manufacturing Alabama has 7 invested a total of \$2 billion in its Montgomery plant, while its direct suppliers have made a total capital investment of 8 more than \$650 million in Alabama; and 9 10 WHEREAS, in 2014 alone, Hyundai Motor Manufacturing 11 Alabama spent more than \$6 billion to support its 12 manufacturing operation and maintain its facility and 13 investment, purchasing more than \$3 billion in goods and services from Alabama-based businesses; and 14 WHEREAS, in 2014, its direct suppliers had total 15 16 sales of more than \$5 billion from Alabama; and those 17 suppliers' non-payroll expenditures were \$1 billion and 56 percent of that total was purchased from Alabama-based 18 19 businesses; and 20 WHEREAS, Korean employers provide numerous 21

WHEREAS, Korean employers provide numerous additional Alabamians employment from all areas of industries to support Hyundai-related businesses including housing, construction, and transportation industries; professional service industries including banking, insurance, health, legal, and marketing; and other industries such as energy, utilities, and retail; and

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That we encourage the creation of a Center for Alabama-Korea Education and Economic Partnership to promote new and continued education, trade, economic, and workforce relationships; to encourage the joint effort of all the counties of the State of Alabama to join together as a region to support and cooperate with the Republic of South Korea for mutual benefit particularly relating to education and economic concerns, to retain and support the prosperity of existing businesses, and to encourage cultural and educational exchange.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That A-KEEP shall serve as the basis for the organization and foundation for the creation of Alabama-Korea Education Economic Partnership.
