22	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
23	Section 1. There is hereby appropriated for the
24	support of public education in Alabama for the fiscal year
25	ending September 30, 2018, for debt service, and for capital
26	outlay to be paid out of funds specified in subsection (a) of
27	Section 2 of this act, the amounts specified in subsections

(a), (b), (c), (d), and (e) of Section 3 of this act. For the 1 2 purpose specified in subsection (b) of Section 2 of this act, amounts are shown by programmatic area and the total for all 3 4 programs is shown so as to include estimated sources of funds 5 other than those listed in subsection (a) of Section 2 of this act. For the purpose of this act, "ETF" shall mean the 6 7 Education Trust Fund and "Federal and Local Funds" shall mean all gifts, grants, contributions, or entitlements, including 8 grants by the Congress of the United States, municipalities or 9 10 counties.

11 Section 2. (a) The appropriations provided for in 12 this act shall be paid from funds in the State Treasury to the credit of the Education Trust Fund, Alabama Peace Officers' 13 Standards and Training Fund, Impaired Drivers Trust Fund, 14 15 Driver Education and Training Fund, Special Education 16 Catastrophic Fund, Public School Fund and other listed funds 17 and are hereby made for the support of public education in 18 Alabama for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2018, and the 19 appropriations herein made shall be subject to the provisions, 20 terms, conditions and limitations of the Budget and Financial Control Act (Code of Alabama 1975, Sections 41-4-80 et seq.), 21 22 the provisions of the Budget Management Act of 1976 (Code of 23 Alabama 1975, Sections 41-19-1 et seq.), and shall be in the 24 amounts hereinafter specified.

(b) Amounts shown hereinunder the columns "Earmarked
Funds" and "Appropriation Total" are as set forth for the
purpose of establishing amounts estimated to be available by

(4) The Chancellor of the Alabama Community College System shall report quarterly to the Chairs of the Senate Committee on Finance and Taxation - Education and the House Ways and Means - Education Committee and the Legislative Fiscal Officer any funds expended for the Alabama Technology Network.

Upon certification and approval by the Department's Deputy State Superintendent of the Office of Administrative and Financial Services that the Gardendale City School System is an operational public school system within the State of Alabama, the Department shall ensure that any Foundation Program funds or other state funds allocated to the Jefferson County School System for students that attended and were counted in the Average Daily Membership of the Jefferson County School System and now will attend the Gardendale City School System shall be transferred to the Gardendale City School System for operational expenses.

The above appropriation shall be distributed by the State Board of Education in accordance with the provisions of the Code of Alabama 1975, Sections 16-13-230 through 16-13-239, and all other laws and regulations of the State Board of Education relating to the expenditure of such funds. These funds shall be used to provide a minimum school term of 180 full instructional days, or the hourly equivalent thereof, and for equitable educational opportunities in the public schools of the State. Foundation Program calculations for FY 2017-2018 are based on the funding divisors set forth below. Units earned under the Foundation Program shall be employed as regular classroom teachers and assigned by the local board of education. The divisors listed below shall not serve to prescribe pupil-teacher ratios. It is the intent of the Legislature that local boards of education have flexibility in determining where reductions are made. Any reductions made using flexibility of state units must comply with federal comparability and supplanting guidelines. Each district will submit an application for approval by the State Superintendent as to the unit allocation adjustments requested.

Notwithstanding Section 16-13-231.1(d) of the Code of Alabama 1975, there shall not be an appropriation for the 1% over the total cost of instructional salaries for the Foundation Program as calculated by the State Minimum Salary Schedule for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2017. For "Fringe Benefits" the rate per day for two personal days and five sick days (for units earned in the Foundation Program) shall be \$60. The Teachers' Retirement System employer rate shall be 12.24% of salaries for Tier I members and 11.01% of salaries for Tier II members. The Public Education Employees' Health Insurance Program (PEEHIP) rate shall be \$809 per month for each full-time employee. As funds are appropriated, the appropriation herein shall include funds to pay for substitute support employees for each day a support employee is absent.

For "Classroom Instructional Support," the uniform amounts used in determining the Foundation Program allowance for classroom instructional support shall be: (1) textbooks or digital resources at \$54.52 per pupil in average daily membership during the first 20 scholastic days after Labor Day of the preceding school year; (2) classroom materials and supplies at \$421.51 per unit earned in the Foundation Program; (3) technology at \$211.51 per unit earned in the Foundation Program; (4) professional development at \$77.55 per unit earned in the Foundation Program; and (5) library enhancement at \$30.44 per unit earned in the Foundation Program. Funds allocated for instructional support units to meet Advanced Education standards may be used for principals, assistant principals, counselors, and librarians as calculated by the State Department of Education and assigned to the schools where such units are earned. An instructional support unit earned for a principal shall be increased by .31 for elementary schools, .35 for middle schools, and .45 for secondary schools and unit schools. An instructional support unit earned for an assistant principal shall be increased by .10 for elementary schools, middle schools, secondary schools and unit schools. An instructional support unit earned for a counselor shall be increased by .03 for secondary schools and unit schools. The budgeting and expenditure of funds in the Foundation Program at the local level shall be determined and made by the local board of education in accordance with rules and regulations of the State Board of Education and all laws governing such school budgets and expenditures.

1 Section 4. In addition to all other appropriations 2 made in this act, there is hereby appropriated from the Education Trust Fund for the fiscal year ending September 30, 3 4 2018, as a first priority, conditioned on the estimated appropriation to the Department of Veterans' Affairs Student 5 Financial Aid Program being less than \$91,544,687, the amounts 6 as follows to total the difference between the estimated and 7 actual appropriation to the Department of Veterans' Affairs 8 9 Student Financial Aid Program: (1) to Other Current Expense in the Foundation Program the amount of \$7,000,000, and (2) to 10 the institutions of higher education on a pro rata basis, 11 12 based on the FY 2018 Education Trust Fund Operations and 13 Maintenance appropriations to institutions of higher 14 education, any balance in the difference between the estimated 15 and actual appropriation to the Department of Veterans' 16 Affairs Student Financial Aid Program and the appropriation in 17 (1) above.

Section 5. In addition to the appropriations herein 18 19 made, all gifts, grants, contributions, insurance proceeds or 20 entitlements, in excess of the amount carried in this act, 21 including grants by the Congress of the United States, 22 municipalities or counties, to any department, division, 23 board, bureau, commission, agency, institution, office or 24 officer of the State of Alabama are hereby appropriated and, in the event the same are recurring, are reappropriated to 25 26 such department, division, board, bureau, commission, agency,

institution, office or officer to be used only for the purpose 1 2 or purposes for which the grant or contribution was or shall be made. Further, all state, county, municipal and educational 3 entities are authorized to disburse such sums as deemed 4 5 necessary by mutual agreement between said entities and the State of Alabama, Department of Examiners of Public Accounts 6 7 to partially defray the cost of auditing services performed by said agency. All such sums are hereby appropriated and 8 reappropriated if necessary to the Department of Examiners of 9 Public Accounts for audit services, to be expended through the 10 fund established by Section 41-5-24, Code of Alabama 1975. 11

12 Section 6. The State Superintendent of Education 13 shall make requisitions to the State Comptroller in favor of the proper beneficiary in accordance with the law and rules 14 15 and regulations governing the expenditure or disbursement of 16 any and all funds appropriated to the State Department of 17 Education and/or the State Board of Education in this act, 18 whereupon the Comptroller shall issue his warrant therefor. 19 All other appropriations in this act shall be paid after 20 proper requisitions are made to the State Comptroller in the 21 manner now provided by law.

22 Section 7. Nothing in this act shall be construed to 23 affect or repeal any law authorizing or permitting any 24 college, school or other education or eleemosynary institution 25 of the State to receive, collect or disburse any fees, 26 tuitions, charges, sales, endowments, trusts or income 27 therefrom, which are now or may hereafter be authorized to receive, collect or disburse. The receiving college, school or institution shall further maintain separate accounts for such receipts or shall maintain a system of accounting which will show a cash flow of such receipts received under the provision of this appropriation.

Section 8. The appropriations made herein to the 6 7 departments, boards, offices, commissions, and agencies include the amounts necessary and said departments, boards, 8 offices, commissions, and agencies are hereby directed to make 9 10 the transfer of funds to the State Personnel Department in the 11 amounts enumerated in the general appropriations act for the 12 fiscal year ending September 30, 2018. All agencies and institutions enumerated in this act that receive services from 13 other governmental agencies enumerated in this act or the 14 15 general appropriations act shall make full payment in a timely 16 manner (as determined by the Department of Finance) for such 17 services.

18 Section 9. All encumbered balances of a previous 19 fiscal year appropriation other than the exclusions authorized 20 by the Code of Alabama 1975, Section 41-4-93, shall lapse no later than September 30 of the fiscal year immediately 21 22 following the fiscal year for which the appropriation was made 23 and shall revert to the credit of the Education Trust Fund or 24 earmarked fund from which the appropriation or appropriations 25 were made.

26 Section 10. Upon certification to the Director of 27 Finance by the State Attorney General that a federal court has

ordered the State of Alabama to pay claims, attorney fees, or 1 2 other costs relating to said court order, funds are hereby appropriated to the affected department, board, bureau, or 3 commission in the amount necessary to satisfy that court 4 5 order. Such appropriations are in addition to any other appropriation heretofore or hereafter made in this 6 7 appropriation act. Such appropriations are conditioned upon the availability of funds and a determination by the Director 8 of Finance that other current appropriations are not available 9 10 for court-ordered payments.

11 Section 11. For FY 2018, local boards of education 12 may exercise flexibility among line item expenditures, not to 13 create a reduction of earned teacher units and/or local board 14 of education support personnel.

15 Section 12. The State Superintendent of Education 16 may approve a request by a local board of education for 17 redirecting Other Current Expense funds designated for 18 pass-through calculations to their local Child Nutrition 19 Program if the redirected funds do not prevent the Child 20 Nutrition Program of that local board of education from 21 maintaining a fund balance equal to or greater than a two 22 month operating reserve.

23 Section 13. The appropriations made herein to the 24 departments, boards, offices, commissions and agencies include 25 the amounts necessary to pay the State Employees' Insurance 26 Board (SEIB). The SEIB rate shall be \$930 per month for each 27 full-time employee for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2018. The State Employees' Insurance Board will adjust the
 insurance program wherever appropriate to maintain the
 aforementioned fixed rate.

Section 14. Notwithstanding any other provisions of 4 5 this act or any other act, any amount from appropriations for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2017 to the various state 6 7 agencies and institutions in this act, except appropriations from the Education Trust Fund, which are unexpended and 8 reverted on September 30, 2017 are hereby reappropriated to 9 10 the respective state agencies, offices and institutions for 11 the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2017.

Section 15. The At-Risk and High Hopes appropriations made to the State Department of Education shall be expended as follows: 40% shall be at the discretion of the State Superintendent of Education and 60% shall be awarded through grants utilizing the following criteria:

17 (a) In an effort to provide the best implementation 18 for intervention and innovation in schools, grants may be 19 awarded anytime after July 1st so schools can prepare for the 20 new school year. No funding will be available until October 1, 21 2017. Grantees will have no guarantee of funding until October 22 1, 2017 and all costs incurred by grantees will strictly be 23 their responsibility. RFP applications shall be submitted to 24 the State Department of Education from May 15 through 25 September 15, 2017.

1 (b) Grants awarded will be based on applications 2 that have been evaluated and scored and that best meet the 3 following criteria:

4 (1) Includes K-12 content that directly impacts student achievement and improves performance on state 5 assessments to include remediation for students, after-school 6 7 and tutorial programs, career/technical programs, character education, enrichment activities, programs that enhance 8 reading and mathematics abilities in students, activities that 9 10 increase grade-to-grade promotion, career and college 11 readiness and early warning and prevention programs;

12 (2) Includes content, under one management system 13 aligned to state standards, that promotes rigor and relevancy in the learning process and acceptance of and encouragement 14 for cultural diversity, while incorporating a strong emphasis 15 16 on technology integration and application to prepare students 17 for a global society. Programs should also provide evidence of sustained student achievement over time. Grant applicants 18 19 should provide research-based evidence demonstrating the 20 academic success of their programs in the State of Alabama;

(3) Provides an intervention and acceleration
 solution with a built in screener to measure progress;

(4) Includes the capability to integrate with state
 assessment systems to include accountability reporting such as
 individual school reports to the State Department of Education
 and parents;

(5) Provides research-based content and shows proven
 success and growth in student achievement as demonstrated
 through student test results in the State of Alabama;

4 (6) Offers grade or credit recovery options for
5 middle and high school students;

6 (7) Provides a blended learning solution to include 7 an overall strategy to deliver initial training, provide 8 systemic and sustained professional development, including 9 support to local educational agencies (LEAs) and schools, on 10 modifying the curriculum based on benchmark assessments;

(8) Provides school systems with dedicated account managers, i.e. instructional specialists, who schedule and facilitate quarterly meetings with the LEA and schools; and

(9) Requires grants to be used to serve lower income students and failing schools/programs that assist in decreasing the student drop-out rate, focus on at-risk students, and provides access for students after school, including twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week availability from home, as well as during summer and holiday school breaks.

Section 16. If any section, paragraph, sentence, clause, provision or portion of this act or all or any portion of the appropriations herein made is held unconstitutional or invalid, it shall not affect any other section, paragraph, sentence, clause, provision or portion of this act or any other appropriation or appropriations or portion thereof hereby made not in and of itself unconstitutional or invalid. Section 17. All laws or parts of laws, general,
 special, private or local in conflict with or inconsistent
 with the provisions of this act are hereby expressly repealed.
 Section 18. This act shall become effective on
 October 1, 2017.
