WHEREAS, community involvement in promoting HIV
testing and education is crucial in our efforts to stem the
rise of HIV transmissions; and

WHEREAS, we must encourage treatment as prevention efforts, expand access to Pre-exposure Prophylaxis (PrEP), strengthen the AIDS Drug Assistance Program (ADAP), and establish harm-reducing syringe exchange programs; and

8 WHEREAS, Alabama AIDS Service Organizations (ASOs), 9 state legislators, local and state health officials, networks 10 of people living with HIV, and allies are committed to ending 11 the epidemic in the State of Alabama; and
