WHEREAS, during its service as the state's capital, 1 2 Cahawba grew into a town of more than 1,000 residents, a place of commerce with two newspapers and numerous inns, stores, and 3 the first state bank, built in 1824; and 4 5 WHEREAS, on December 13, 1825, the state Legislature voted to relocate the state capital to Tuscaloosa; and 6 7 WHEREAS, now a property of the Alabama Historical 8 Commission, the Old Cahawba Archeological Site continues to be an important resource for understanding Alabama's early 9 10 history as a state; and WHEREAS, Alabama is currently engaged in a 11 commemoration of the Bicentennial of Statehood, a three-year 12 13 celebration of the people, places, and events that form our 14 rich history; now therefore, 15 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That we do hereby recognize Cahawba 16

17 as the first permanent capital of the State of Alabama.
