4	ENGROSSED
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9	SYNOPSIS: This bill would amend the Alabama Broadband
10	Accessibility Act to expand the definition of an
11	"unserved area" eligible for grant funding,
12	increase the percentage of project costs eligible
13	for grant funding, and to broaden the permitted use
14	of other federal and state support, including loans
15	and grants, in projects receiving grants under the
16	Act.

18	A BILL
19	TO BE ENTITLED
20	AN ACT
21	
22	To amend sections 41-23-212, 41-23-213 and
23	41-23-214, Code of Alabama 1975, to change the definition of
24	an "unserved area", increase the percentage of project costs
25	that may be funded through the Act, and to broaden the
26	permitted use of other federal and state support, including
27	loans and grants, in projects receiving grants under the Act.

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
2	Section 1. Sections 41-23-212, 41-23-213 and
3	41-23-214, Code of Alabama 1975, are amended to read as
4	follows:
5	"§41-23-212.
6	For the purposes of this article, the following
7	words have the following meanings:
8	"(1) ADECA. The Alabama Department of Economic and
9	Community Affairs.
10	"(2) END USER. A residential, business,
11	institutional, or government entity that uses broadband
12	services for its own purposes and does not resell such
13	broadband services to other entities. An internet service
14	provider (ISP) and mobile wireless service provider are not an
15	end user for the purposes of this act.
16	"(3) MIDDLE MILE PROJECT. A broadband infrastructure
17	project that does not provide broadband service to end users
18	<u>or to end-user devices.</u>
19	" (2) (4) MINIMUM SERVICE THRESHOLD. A connection to
20	the Internet that provides capacity for transmission at an
21	average speed per customer of at least 10 <u>25</u> megabits (10 <u>25</u>
22	Mbps) per second downstream and at least one <u>three</u> megabits (1
23	<u>3</u> Mbps) per second upstream.
24	" (3) (5) RURAL AREA. Any area within this state not
25	included within the boundaries of any incorporated city or
26	town having a population in excess of 25,000 inhabitants,
27	according to the last federal census.

"(4) (6) UNSERVED AREA. Any rural area in which 1 2 there is not at least one provider of terrestrial broadband service that is either: (1) offering a connection to the 3 Internet meeting the minimum service threshold; or (2) is 4 5 required, under the terms of the Federal Universal Service Fund or other federal or state grant, to provide a connection 6 7 to the Internet at speeds meeting the minimum service threshold by March 28, 2023. 8

"§41-23-213.

10 "(a) The Director of ADECA may establish and administer the broadband accessibility grant program for the 11 12 purpose of promoting the deployment and adoption of broadband 13 Internet access services to unserved areas. By June 26, 2018, the director shall adopt rules and policies to administer the 14 15 program and begin to accept applications for grants, and shall adopt such rules as may be necessary to meet the future needs 16 17 of the grant program.

18 "(b) The program shall be administered pursuant to policies developed by ADECA in compliance with this article. 19 20 The policies shall provide for the awarding of grants to 21 non-governmental entities that are cooperatives, corporations, 22 limited liability companies, partnerships, or other private 23 business entities that provide broadband services. Nothing in 24 this article shall expand the authority under state law of any 25 entity to provide broadband service.

"(c) There is hereby created the Alabama Broadband
Accessibility Fund in the State Treasury. The fund is subject

to appropriations by the Legislature and gifts, grants, and 1 2 other donations received by ADECA for the broadband accessibility grant program or fund. ADECA may not spend 3 appropriations for the program for purposes other than those 4 5 listed in this section. Any monies appropriated to ADECA for 6 broadband grants that are unspent at the end of a fiscal year 7 shall be carried over for use by the program in the next 8 fiscal year. ADECA shall develop rules ensuring that expenses 9 incurred to administer the program must not exceed the lesser 10 of seven three percent (3%) (7%) of the total amount appropriated for the program in any fiscal year or seven 11 hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$750,000). Moneys in the fund 12 13 shall be invested by the State Treasurer for the sole benefit of the fund. 14

15 "(d)(1) Individual grants awarded by ADECA under 16 this section may only be awarded for projects in unserved 17 areas, and may not exceed the lesser of:

18 "a. Twenty <u>Thirty-five</u> percent <u>(35%)</u> of the project
19 costs.; or

"b. <u>One million five hundred thousand dollars</u>
 (\$1,500,000) for projects that will be capable of transmitting
 broadband signals at or above the minimum service threshold.
 "Seven hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$750,000) for
 projects that will result in transmitting broadband signals at

25 speeds of at least 10 megabits per second of download speed
26 and one megabit per second of upload speed.

"c. One million four hundred thousand dollars 1 2 (\$1,400,000) for projects that will result in transmitting 3 broadband signals at speeds of at least 25 megabits per second of download speed and three megabits per second of upload 4 5 speed. "(2) Grants may be given to any gualified entity 6 7 pursuant to subsection (b) that meets the service criteria for expenditures after March 28, 2018. 8 "(3) ADECA shall ensure that not less than 40 9 10 percent of funds appropriated for grants be utilized in unincorporated areas of the state. 11 "(4) Subject to the limitations in this subsection, 12 13 grants shall be awarded pursuant to the service criteria 14 developed by ADECA, with priority given to projects that meet 15 any of the following: 16 "a. Seek to leverage grant funds through private 17 investment and extension of existing infrastructure. 18 "b. Serve locations with demonstrated community support, including, but not limited to, documented support 19 20 from local government. 21 "c. Demonstrate the operator's technical and 22 managerial capabilities to complete the project within two 23 years of the grant. 24 "d. Demonstrate the applicants' necessary financial 25 resources. "e. Are most cost effective and technically 26 efficient in that they propose to serve the highest number of 27

unserved homes, businesses and community anchor points for the
 least cost and best level of service, emphasizing projects
 including the highest broadband speeds.

4 "f. Provide material broadband enhancement to
5 hospitals located in rural areas as defined in Section
6 22-21-20.

7 "g. Support local libraries in this state for the
8 purpose of assisting the libraries in offering digital
9 literacy training pursuant to state library and archive
10 guidelines.

11 "(5) For the purposes of awarding grants, ADECA
12 shall take into consideration the average pole attachment
13 rates that a grant applicant charges to an unaffiliated
14 entity, provided that this subdivision (5) shall not apply to
15 a utility as defined under Section 37-4-1 (7)a.

16 "(e) The first annual commencement date to submit grant applications shall be by May 27, 2018, and shall be 17 18 March 1 in each subsequent year. For each fiscal year in which grant funds are available, ADECA shall accept applications 19 20 within a 150-day 90-day grant window after the annual 21 commencement date that it shall establish. Applications for 22 eligible projects will be evaluated according to a scoring 23 system developed by ADECA that incorporates the priorities 24 listed in this section, with grant awards published within 90 25 days after expiration of the filing window. Grant applications shall be published by ADECA on the Internet at the end of the 26 filing window, and existing service providers shall have 30 27

business days from the date of publication to file objections 1 2 to the eligibility of a proposed project. ADECA shall address any objections within 30 days of submission and shall make any 3 appropriate changes to grant awards based on a finding of 4 5 ineligibility resulting from such protest. Subject to such protest procedure, grants issued by ADECA shall be conditioned 6 7 upon compliance with the terms of the grant but shall not otherwise be revocable. Providers' grants shall be paid within 8 30 days upon ADECA receiving written certification of the 9 10 completion of the project and evidence of compliance with the terms of the grant as prescribed by ADECA. 11

"(f) Grants shall be conditioned on project 12 13 completion within two years of awarding of the grant. If a 14 recipient fails to complete a project within the two-year 15 deadline due to reasons other than delay caused by a government entity, ADECA may revoke the grant in its entirety 16 and rededicate the funds to a new recipient. 17 18 "(g) ADECA shall condition the release of any grant funds awarded under this chapter on: 19 20 "(1) the progressive completion, as measured on not 21 more than a quarterly basis, of the approved project; and 22 "(2) operational testing, when possible, to confirm 23 the level of service proposed in the grant application. Such 24 regulations shall not exceed in degree or differ in kind from 25 testing and reporting requirements imposed on the grant recipient by the Federal Communications Commission, as 26

1 <u>adjusted for the service specifications in the ADECA grant</u>
2 agreement.

3 "(g) (h) Notwithstanding any other provision of this
4 section, eligible projects shall include projects <u>any of the</u>
5 following:

"(1) Projects to serve unserved areas in which the 6 7 grant applicant is either or both: (i) an existing or future service provider which has or will receive support through 8 9 federal universal service funding programs designed 10 specifically to encourage broadband deployment in an area without broadband access; or (ii) an existing or future 11 service provider which has or will receive other forms of 12 13 federal or state financial support or assistance, such as a 14 grant or loan from the United States Department of 15 Agriculture; provided, however, that any award of state funds under this act, when combined with other forms of state or 16 17 federal support or assistance dedicated to the project, other 18 than interest-bearing loans, may not exceed sixty percent (60%) of the total project costs. Nothing in this section 19 20 shall prohibit a grant applicant who has not previously 21 received any federal or state funds, grants, or loans for 22 broadband deployment from applying for and receiving grant 23 funds under this act. that have received funds through other 24 federal universal service funding programs designed 25 specifically to encourage broadband deployment in an area 26 without broadband access in an amount not exceeding 50 percent 27 of the total project cost; provided, however, that any award

1 of state funds may only be utilized to either (i) fund project 2 components that extend beyond the specifications supported by the federal funding, the eligible components being an 3 extension of service to unserved rural areas not otherwise 4 5 served by the federally supported project, or (ii) ensure that areas being served by the federal funding at speeds less than 6 7 25 megabits per second of download speed and three megabits 8 per second of upload speed will, in fact, receive faster speeds of not less than 25 megabits per second of download 9 10 speed and three megabits per second of upload speed. Grants issued under this subsection shall not exceed 40 percent of 11 12 total grant funding, with such grants not exceeding 20 percent 13 of total project costs.

"(2) Middle Mile Projects, where the applicant 14 15 demonstrates that the project will connect other service providers eligible for grants under this section with 16 broadband infrastructure further upstream in order to enable 17 18 such providers to offer broadband service to end users; 19 provided that eligible projects under this subdivision may 20 include projects in (i) an unserved area or (ii) a rural area 21 that does not meet the definition of an unserved area but 22 otherwise meets the requirements of this section, for which the grant applicant demonstrates, by specific evidence, the 23 24 need for greater broadband speeds, capacity, or service which 25 is not being offered by an existing service provider. 26 "(3) Projects to provide broadband service to a specific hospital, public school, public safety, or economic 27

1 development site in a rural area that does not meet the
2 definition of an unserved area but otherwise meets the
3 requirements of this section, for which the grant applicant
4 demonstrates, by specific evidence, the need for greater
5 broadband speeds, capacity, or service which is not being
6 offered by an existing service provider.

7 "(4) Grants issued under subdivisions (2) and (3)
8 shall not exceed forty percent (40%) of the total funds
9 appropriated for grants on an annual basis.

"§41-23-214.

"(a) There is created the Alabama Rural Broadband 11 Oversight Committee. The oversight committee shall consist of 12 13 the Chair of the House Ways and Means Education Committee or 14 his or her designee, the Chair of the Senate Finance and 15 Taxation Education Committee or his or her designee, two 16 members appointed by the Speaker of the House of 17 Representatives, two members appointed by the President Pro 18 Tempore of the Senate, and the Director of ADECA or his or her designee. The oversight committee shall meet at least 19 20 annually, provide general oversight of the implementation of 21 the article, and recommend further statutory changes to 22 promote rural broadband development.

"(b) The committee shall reflect the racial, gender,
 geographic, urban/rural, and economic diversity of the state.

"(c) For any year in which grants are distributed
under the program, ADECA shall produce a quarterly report on
the status of grants under the program to the Oversight

1 Committee, including progress toward increased access to and 2 adoption of broadband services. The report shall <u>be provided</u> 3 <u>at the oversight committee's first meeting of the year and</u> 4 also be published on ADECA's website. By March 28, 2019, ADECA 5 shall produce a report on the availability of broadband within 6 the state."

Section 2. Nothing in this act shall affect the
approval and continued funding of grants awarded prior to the
effective date of this act.

10 Section 3. If any provision of this act or its 11 application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the 12 invalidity does not affect other provisions or applications of 13 this act which can be given effect without the invalid 14 provision or application, and to this end, the provisions of 15 this act are severable.

Section 4. This act shall become effective immediately following the passage and approval of this act by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
