BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA: 26

Section 1. Section 22-20-5.1, Code of Alabama 1975,
 is amended to read as follows:

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"§22-20-5.1.

4 "(a) For purposes of this section, the following
5 words have the following meanings:

6 "(1) BAKED GOOD. Includes cakes, breads, Danish, 7 donuts, pastries, pies, and other items that are prepared by 8 baking the item in an oven. A baked good does not include a 9 potentially hazardous food item as defined by rule of the 10 department.

11 "(2) COTTAGE FOOD PRODUCTION OPERATION. A person 12 operating out of his or her home who meets all of the 13 following requirements:

14 "a. Produces a baked good, a canned jam or jelly, a
15 dried herb or herb mix, <u>any roasted coffee</u>, or a candy for
16 sale at the person's home.

17 "b. Has an annual gross income of twenty thousand 18 dollars (\$20,000) or less from the sale of food described in 19 paragraph a.

20 "c. Sells the foods produced under paragraph a. only21 directly to consumers.

22 "(3) DEPARTMENT. The State Department of Public 23 Health.

24 "(4) HOME. A primary residence that contains a25 kitchen and appliances designed for common residential use.

"(b) A cottage food production operation is not a
 food service establishment and is not required to have a food
 service permit issued by the county health department.

4 "(c) Neither the State Department of Public Health
5 nor a county health department may regulate the production of
6 food at a cottage food production operation except as provided
7 by this section.

8 "(d) The department may issue a stop sale, seize, or 9 hold order for any food suspected of being the cause of a food 10 borne illness.

"(e) The department shall promulgate adopt rules 11 requiring a cottage food production operation to label all 12 13 baked goods, canned jams or jellies, candies, roasted coffees, and dried herb or herb mix that the operation sells to 14 15 consumers, and requiring completion of a food safety course. The label shall include the name and address of the cottage 16 17 food production operation and a statement that the food is not 18 inspected by the department or local health department. The operator of a cottage food production operation shall maintain 19 20 certification of having attended and passed a food safety 21 course approved by the department.

"(f) A cottage food production operation may not sell baked goods, jams and jellies, candies, <u>roasted coffees</u>, or dried herbs and herb mixes over the Internet."

25 Section 2. This act shall become effective on the 26 first day of the third month following its passage and 27 approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.

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
