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To amend Sections 21-7-1 to 21-7-9, inclusive, Code of Alabama 1975, relating to the use of service animals; to provide for the rights and responsibilities of an individual with a disability who uses a service animal in a public accommodation or a housing accommodation; to provide criminal penalties for a person who misrepresents the use of a service animal or as a trainer and for denying or interfering with the right of an individual with a disability to use a service animal or the trainer of a service animal to have a service animal in a public accommodation under certain conditions; and in connection therewith to have as its purpose or effect the requirement of a new or increased expenditure of local funds within the meaning of Amendment 621 of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, now appearing as Section 111.05 of the Official Recompilation of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

1	Section 1. Sections 21-7-1 to 21-7-9, inclusive,
2	Code of Alabama 1975, are amended to read as follows:
3	"\$21-7-1.
4	"(a) It is the policy of this state to encourage and
5	enable the blind, the visually handicapped impaired, and the
6	otherwise physically disabled to participate fully in the
7	social and economic life of the state and to engage in
8	remunerative meaningful employment.
9	"(b) For the purposes of this act, the following
10	terms shall have the following meanings:
11	"(1) HANDLER. Includes an individual with a
12	disability and a trainer.
13	"(2) HOUSING ACCOMMODATION. Any real property or
14	portion thereof which is used or occupied, or intended,
15	arranged, or designed to be used or occupied, as the home,
16	residence, or sleeping place of one or more persons, but may
17	not include any single-family residence, the occupants of
18	which rent, lease, or furnish for compensation not more than
19	one room therein.
20	"(3) INDIVIDUAL WITH A DISABILITY. As defined by 42
21	U.S.C. §12102, and further defined as a person who has a
22	physical or mental impairment, including a physical, sensory,
23	psychiatric, intellectual, or other mental disability, that
24	substantially limits one or more major life activities of the
25	individual.

1	"(4) MAJOR LIFE ACTIVITY. A function such as caring
2	for one's self, performing manual tasks, walking, seeing,
3	hearing, speaking, breathing, learning, and working.
4	"(5) PHYSICAL OR MENTAL IMPAIRMENT. A physiological
5	disorder or condition, disfigurement, or anatomical loss that
6	affects one or more bodily functions, or a mental or
7	psychological disorder that meets one of the diagnostic
8	categories specified in the most recent edition of the
9	Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders
10	published by the American Psychiatric Association, such as an
11	intellectual or developmental disability, organic brain
12	syndrome, traumatic brain injury, post traumatic stress
13	disorder, or mental illness.
14	"(6) PUBLIC ACCOMMODATION. A common carrier,
15	airplane, motor vehicle, railroad train, motor bus, streetcar,
16	boat, or other public conveyance or mode of transportation, a
17	hotel, a timeshare that is a transient public lodging
18	establishment, a lodging place, a place of public
19	accommodation, amusement, or resort, and other places to which
20	the general public is invited, subject only to the conditions
21	and limitations established by law and applicable alike to all
22	persons. The term does not include air carriers covered by the
23	Air Carrier Access Act of 1986, 49 U.S.C. Section 41705, and
24	by regulations adopted by the United States Department of
25	Transportation to implement that act.
26	"(7) SERVICE ANIMAL. As defined by 28 C.F.R.
27	§35.104, and further defined as an animal that is trained to

Т	do work or perioriii casks for all illutvidual with a disability.
2	The work done or tasks performed shall be directly related to
3	the disability of the individual and may include, but are not
4	limited to, guiding an individual who is visually impaired or
5	blind, alerting an individual who is deaf or hard of hearing,
6	pulling a wheelchair, assisting with mobility or balance,
7	alerting and protecting an individual who is having a seizure,
8	retrieving objects, alerting an individual to the presence of
9	allergens, providing physical support and assistance with
10	balance and stability to an individual with a mobility
11	disability, helping an individual with a psychiatric or
12	neurological disability by preventing or interrupting
13	impulsive or destructive behaviors, reminding an individual
14	with mental illness to take prescribed medications, calming an
15	individual with post traumatic stress disorder during an
16	anxiety attack, doing other specific work, or performing other
17	special tasks. This shall include a dog owned, used, or in
18	training by any police or fire department, rescue or first
19	response squad, ambulance corps, or search and rescue
20	organization for the purpose of locating criminal and lost
21	persons, or detecting illegal substances, explosives,
22	cadavers, accelerants, or school or correctional facility
23	contraband. A service animal may not be a pet. For the
24	purposes of Sections 21-7-3, 21-7-4, and 21-7-5, the term
25	"service animal" shall be limited to a dog or a miniature
26	horse. The crime-deterrent effect of the presence of an animal
27	and the provision of emotional support, well-being, comfort,

1	or companionship may not constitute work or tasks for the
2	purposes of this definition.
3	"(8) TRAINER. Any of the following:
4	"a. An owner with a disability who is actually
5	involved in the training process.
6	"b. A person who is competent and qualified to train
7	a service animal, has at least one year's experience training
8	animals, and who is actually involved in the training process.
9	"c. A person having photo identification stating
10	that he or she is an employee, volunteer, agent, or graduate
11	of a school for seeing eye, hearing, service, or guide dogs or
12	an organization generally recognized by agencies involved in
13	the rehabilitation of persons with disabilities as reputable
14	and competent to provide dogs with training, and who is
15	actually involved in the training process.
16	"(9) TRANSIENT PUBLIC LODGING ESTABLISHMENT. Any
17	unit, group of units, dwelling, building, or group of
18	buildings within a single complex of buildings which is rented
19	to guests more than three times in a calendar year for periods
20	of less than 30 days or one calendar month, whichever is less,
21	or which is advertised or held out to the public as a place
22	regularly rented to guests.
23	" §21-7-2.
24	"The blind, the visually handicapped, and the
25	otherwise physically disabled have An individual with a
26	disability has the same right as the able-bodied a person who
77	is not disabled to the full and free use of the streets

highways, sidewalks, walkways, public buildings, public
facilities, and other public places.

3 "\$21-7-3.

"The blind, the visually handicapped, and the otherwise physically disabled are (a) An individual with a disability is entitled to full and equal accommodations, advantages, facilities, and privileges of all common carriers, airplanes, motor vehicles, railroad trains, motor buses, streetcars, boats or any other public conveyances or modes of transportation, hotels, lodging places, places of public accommodation, amusement or resort, and other places to which the general public is invited, subject only to the conditions and limitations established by law and applicable alike to all persons in every public accommodation.

"(b) A public accommodation shall modify its
policies, practices, and procedures to permit the use of a
service animal by an individual with a disability.

"(c) This act may not require a person, firm,
business, or corporation, or an agent thereof, to modify or
provide a vehicle, premises, facility, or service to a higher
degree of accommodation than is required for a person who is
not disabled.

"\$21-7-4.

"(a) For the purposes of this section, the term service animal means any dog that is individually trained to do work or perform tasks for the benefit of an individual with a disability.

"(b) Every person with a disability, including a person who is totally or partially blind, hearing-impaired, or diagnosed on the autism spectrum shall have (a) An individual with a disability has the right to be accompanied by a service animal in any public place all areas of a public accommodation, including a public or private school, and any of the places listed in Section 21-7-3 that the public or customers are normally permitted to occupy. The person may not be required to pay an extra charge for the service animal.

"(c) The work or tasks performed by a service animal must be directly related to the handler's disability. (b) A service animal shall be under the control of its handler and shall have a harness, collar, leash, or other tether, unless either the handler is unable because his or her disability prevents him or her from the use of a harness, collar, leash, or other tether, or the use of a harness, collar, leash, or other tether would interfere with the safe, effective performance of work or tasks by the service animal, in which case the service animal shall be otherwise under the control of the handler by means of voice control, signals, or other effective means.

"(d) A person training a service animal shall be entitled to the same privileges granted to a person with a disability pursuant to subsection (b). (c)(1) The trainer of a service animal, while engaged in the training of the animal, has the same rights and privileges with respect to access to areas of public accommodation and the same liability for

1	damage as is provided for an individual with a disability who
2	is accompanied by a service animal.
3	"(2)a. A service animal in training that is a dog
4	shall wear a harness, collar, leash, cape, or backpack that
5	identifies in writing that the dog is a service animal in
6	training.
7	"b. Other service animals in training shall be
8	identifiable by written identification as a service animal in
9	training.
10	"c. The written identification for a service animal
11	in training shall be visible and legible from a distance of at
12	<u>least 20 feet.</u>
13	"(3) To determine the difference between a service
14	animal in training and a pet, a public accommodation may ask
15	any of the following:
16	"a. If a trainer is an owner trainer with a
17	disability or a qualified trainer with at least one year's
18	experience training animals.
19	"b. For photo identification stating that the
20	trainer is an employee, volunteer, agent, or graduate of a
21	school for seeing eye, hearing, service, or guide dogs or an
22	organization generally recognized by agencies involved in the
23	rehabilitation of persons with disabilities as reputable and
24	competent to provide dogs with training, and who is actually
25	involved in the training process.

"c. What task the animal is being trained to
perform, and if the trainer is currently engaged in the
training of the animal.
"(d) Documentation that the service animal is
trained is not a precondition for providing service to an
individual accompanied by a service animal.
"(1) A public accommodation may not ask about the
nature or extent of the disability of an individual.
"(2) To determine the difference between a service
animal and a pet, a public accommodation may ask if an animal
is a service animal required because of a disability and what
work or tasks the animal has been trained to perform.
"(3) A public accommodation may not impose a deposit
or surcharge on a trainer or an individual with a disability
as a precondition to permitting a service animal to accompany
the individual with a disability, even if a deposit is
routinely required for pets.
"(e) In the case of a disabled child <u>minor with a</u>
disability, including a child minor diagnosed on the autism
spectrum, any aide assigned to assist the child minor shall be
trained with the service animal in basic commands in order to
assist the child <u>minor</u> as a team.
"(f) This section does not relieve a person
accompanied by a service animal from liability for any damages
done to the premises or facilities by the service animal. An
individual with a disability is liable for damage caused by a

service animal if it is the regular policy and practice of the

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1	public accommodation to charge a person who is not disabled
2	for damages caused by a pet.
3	"(g) The care or supervision of a service animal is
4	the responsibility of the individual owner of the service
5	animal.
6	"(1) A public accommodation may not be required to
7	provide care or food or a special location for a service
8	animal or assistance with removing animal excrement.
9	"(2) A public accommodation may exclude or remove an
10	animal from the premises, including a service animal, if the
11	animal is out of control and the handler of the animal does
12	not take effective action to control the animal, the animal is
13	not housebroken, or the behavior of the animal poses a direct
14	threat to the health and safety of others.
15	"(3) Allergies and fear of animals are not valid
16	reasons for denying access or refusing service to an
17	individual with a service animal.
18	"(4) If a service animal is excluded or removed for
19	being a direct threat to others, the public accommodation
20	shall provide the individual with a disability the option of
21	continuing access to the public accommodation without having
22	the service animal on the premises.
23	"(h) A person who knowingly and willfully
24	misrepresents himself or herself, through conduct or verbal or
25	written notice, as using a service animal and being qualified
26	to use a service animal or as a trainer of a service animal is
27	guilty of a Class C misdemeanor, and in addition to any fines

1	and penalties provided by law, shall perform 100 hours of
2	community service for an organization that serves individuals
3	with disabilities, or for another entity or organization, at
4	the discretion of the court, to be completed in not more than
5	six months.
6	"(i) A person convicted of a second or subsequent
7	violation of subsection (h) shall be guilty of a Class B
8	misdemeanor and shall be fined one hundred dollars (\$100).
9	" §21-7-5.
10	"Any person, firm, or corporation, or the agent of
11	any person, firm, or corporation, who denies or interferes
12	with admittance to or enjoyment of the public facilities
13	enumerated in Sections 21-7-2 and 21-7-3 or otherwise
14	interferes with the rights of a totally or partially blind or
15	otherwise disabled person under Sections 21-7-2 through 21-7-4
16	shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.
17	"A conspicuous sign may be posted in a location
18	accessible to public view in a place of public accommodation
19	that contains the following, or substantially similar,
20	<pre>language:</pre>
21	"NOTICE: Service animals welcome. It is illegal for
22	a person to misrepresent an animal in that person's possession
23	as a service animal."
24	" §21-7-6.
25	"(a) The driver of a vehicle approaching a totally
26	or partially blind pedestrian who is carrying a cane
27	predominantly white or metallic in color, with or without a

red tip, or using a guide dog service animal, or a person

employed by an accredited school for training guide dogs a

service animal who provides notice through a sign or other

method that he or she is training a dog an animal as a guide

dog service animal shall take all necessary precautions

prescribed by law to avoid injury to the blind pedestrian, and

or the dog trainer.

"(b) (1) A service animal in training that is a dog shall wear a harness, collar, leash, cape, or backpack that identifies in writing that the dog is a service animal in training.

- "(2) Other service animals in training shall be identifiable by written identification as a service animal in training.
- "(3) The written identification for a service animal in training shall be visible and legible from a distance of at least 20 feet.
 - "(c) Any driver who fails to take all necessary precautions shall be liable in damages for any injury caused to the pedestrian, or the guide dog trainer.

"\$21-7-7.

"A totally or partially blind pedestrian not carrying a cane as described in Section 21-7-6 or any totally or partially blind person not using a guide dog service animal in any of the places, accommodations, or conveyances listed in Sections 21-7-2 and 21-7-3 a public accommodation shall have all of the rights and privileges conferred by law upon other

persons, and the failure of a totally or partially blind pedestrian to carry such a cane or of a totally or partially blind person to use a guide dog service animal in any such places, accommodations, or conveyances shall a public accommodation may not be held to constitute nor be evidence of contributory negligence.

"\$21-7-8.

"It is the policy of this state that the blind, the visually handicapped, and the otherwise physically disabled an individual with a disability shall be employed in the state service, the service of the political subdivisions of the state, in the public schools, and in all other employment supported in whole or in part by public funds on the same terms and conditions as the able-bodied a person who is not disabled, and an employer may not refuse employment to an individual with a disability on the basis of his or her disability alone, unless it is shown that the particular disability prevents the satisfactory performance of the work involved.

"\$21-7-9.

"(a) Blind persons, visually handicapped persons, and other physically disabled persons An individual with a disability shall be entitled to full and equal access, as are other members of the general public, to all any housing accommodations offered for rent, lease, or compensation in this state, subject to the conditions and limitations established by law and applicable alike to all persons.

"(b) "Housing accommodations" means any real
property or portion thereof which is used or occupied or is
intended, arranged, or designed to be used or occupied as the
home, residence, or sleeping place of one or more human
beings, but shall not include any accommodations included
within subsection (a) of this section or any single-family
residence, the occupants of which rent, lease, or furnish for
compensation not more than one room therein.

"(c) (b) Nothing in this section shall require any person renting, leasing, or providing for compensation real property to modify his <u>or her</u> property in any way or provide a higher degree of care for a blind person, visually handicapped person, or other physically disabled person an individual with a disability than for a person who is not physically disabled.

"(d) Every totally or partially blind person (c)(1)

An individual with a disability who has a guide dog service

animal or who obtains a guide dog service animal shall be
entitled to full and equal access to all any housing
accommodations provided for in this section, and he shall.

- (2) An individual with a disability may not be required by the housing accommodation to pay extra compensation for such guide dog a service animal, but shall be liable for any damage done to the premises or to another person on the premises by such guide dog the service animal.
- "(3) A housing accommodation may request proof of compliance with vaccination requirements for a service animal.

Section 2. Although this bill would have as its purpose or effect the requirement of a new or increased expenditure of local funds, the bill is excluded from further requirements and application under Amendment 621, now appearing as Section 111.05 of the Official Recompilation of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended, because the bill defines a new crime or amends the definition of an existing crime.

Section 3. This act shall become effective on the first day of the third month following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
