This bill would provide further for the 8 appeal of a final decision of the board. 9 10 This bill would also provide further for the membership of the board, would make each board 11 member accountable to the Governor, and would 12 13 provide further for meetings and a quorum. 14 15 A BILL 16 TO BE ENTITLED 17 AN ACT 18 To amend Sections 34-4-21, 34-4-23, 34-4-25, 19 20 34-4-27, 34-4-28, 34-4-29, 34-4-30, 34-4-31, 34-4-33, 34-4-50, 21 and 34-4-52, Code of Alabama 1975, relating to the State Board 22 of Auctioneers and the licensing of auctioneers; to provide further for the qualifications for licensure and grounds for 23 24 denying a license; to provide for the issuance of a single use 25 auction license; to establish inactive status and provide for the restoration of an inactive license; to prohibit the 26 reciprocal licensing of an apprentice auctioneer; to provide 27

further for the conduct of auctions without a license, specify 1 2 certain conditions regarding auction companies, and provide further for the actions required of auctioneers in the conduct 3 of auctions; to provide further for instances in which 4 5 disciplinary actions are warranted; to authorize the board to employ an investigator to investigate actions of licensees, 6 7 issue a complaint, and hold hearings pursuant to the Alabama 8 Administrative Procedure Act; to provide further for the 9 appeal of a final decision of the board; to provide further 10 for the membership of the board and to make each board member accountable to the Governor; to provide further for meetings 11 12 of the board and a quorum; and to repeal Section 34-4-22, Code 13 of Alabama 1975, relating to the register of applicants. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA: 14

Section 1. Sections 34-4-21, 34-4-23, 34-4-25, 34-4-27, 34-4-28, 34-4-29, 34-4-30, 34-4-31, 34-4-33, 34-4-50, and 34-4-52 of the Code of Alabama 1975, are amended to read as follows:

"§34-4-21.

"(a) Any person desiring to enter into the auction business and obtain a license as an auctioneer or apprentice auctioneer shall make written application for a license to the board. Each application shall be accompanied by an examination fee of an amount not to exceed one hundred <u>fifty</u> dollars (\$100) (\$150), as set by rule of the board, which shall be collected from each applicant to defray the expenses of the examination. The application shall be submitted on forms
 prepared and furnished by the board.

3 "(b) (1) Each applicant for a license as an
4 auctioneer shall be 19 years of age or over, and each
5 applicant for a license as an apprentice auctioneer shall be
6 18 years of age or over and shall be a citizen of the United
7 States or legally present in this state. Each applicant for an
8 auctioneer's license shall:

9 "(1) have completed a prescribed course of study at
10 an accredited auctioneering school approved by the board; <u>a.</u>
11 <u>Have successfully graduated from an accredited public high</u>
12 <u>school, an accredited private high school, or a home school</u>
13 <u>instruction program or obtained a general equivalency diploma.</u>

14 "(2) have b. Have served one year as an apprentice 15 auctioneer under the supervision of a licensed auctioneer in this state; (3) have been the principal auctioneer in at least 16 17 five auctions of either real or personal property during this 18 period of time; and (4) furnish satisfactory proof of these 19 requirements to the board and have successfully completed a 20 course of study consisting of not less then 85 hours of 21 classroom instruction in the fundamentals of auctioneering that satisfies the requirements of the board. 22

"(2) An application shall also be accompanied by a
recommendation of an employing auctioneer. If an applicant has
not <u>sucessfully</u> completed a <u>an approved</u> course of study at an
accredited auctioneering school <u>that satisfies the</u>
requirements of the board, then he or she shall be required to

serve two years as an apprentice under <u>the supervision of</u> a
 licensed auctioneer, and shall have been the principal
 auctioneer in at least 10 auctions of real or personal
 property in this state.

5 "(c)(1) Any person who files an a complete application with the board in the proper manner shall be 6 7 entitled to take an oral and written examination to determine his or her qualifications. The board shall may require 8 9 applicants to take and pass a written and oral an examination 10 establishing, in a manner satisfactory to the board, that the applicant has a general knowledge of ethics, reading, writing, 11 12 spelling, elementary arithmetic, elementary principles of land 13 economics, and a general knowledge of the statutes of this state relating to the bulk sales, auctions, brokerage, and 14 15 this chapter. The examination for an auctioneer's license shall be of a more exacting nature and scope than the 16 17 examination for an apprentice auctioneer.

18 "(2) The board shall, through application and 19 examination, shall determine whether the applicant is of good 20 repute, trustworthy, honest, and competent to transact the 21 business of an auctioneer, or of an apprentice auctioneer, in 22 a manner that safeguards the interest of the public.

23 "(3) The board shall require, and it shall be the 24 responsibility of any applicant for an initial, renewal, or 25 reciprocal license to disclose any prior felony conviction, 26 any prior misdemeanor conviction involving moral turpitude, 27 any pending criminal arrest of any nature except misdemeanor

traffic violations, and any prior or pending disciplinary 1 2 proceedings against the applicant before a board of auctioneers or real estate commission in this or any other 3 state. Where an applicant has been convicted of a crime in a 4 5 court of competent jurisdiction of this or any other district, 6 state, or territory of the United States or of a foreign 7 country, the untrustworthiness of the applicant and the 8 conviction, in itself, may be sufficient grounds for refusal 9 of a license.

10 "(4) All auctioneers, apprentice auctioneers, and auction firms companies are under a continuing duty to report 11 to the board any and all such criminal arrests, charges, 12 13 convictions, or disciplinary proceedings which they may incur, 14 as well as any civil suits involving them. The board must 15 shall receive notice of any such arrest, charge, criminal conviction, or commencement of disciplinary proceedings within 16 17 30 days of its occurrence. Notice of the commencement of any 18 civil suit must shall be received by the board within 30 days 19 after service of the complaint upon the defendant in the 20 action.

21 "(d) The board may grant a single auction license
22 once per calendar year to any nonresident individual, who is
23 duly licensed in good standing as an auctioneer, or to an
24 auction company in another state, who makes written
25 application to the board and provides satisfactory proof of
26 all of the following:

1	"(1) The applicant satisfies the age, reputation,
2	and other qualifications to be licensed as an auctioneer.
3	" <u>(</u> 2) The applicant has paid a fee as established by
4	rule of the board.
5	" <u>(</u> 3) The applicant has not applied for or previously
6	obtained a license under this chapter.
7	"(4) The applicant is not the subject of a
8	disciplinary action in any state; has not had a professional
9	license or business license for any company in which he or she
10	is a principal in this, or any other licensing jurisdiction,
11	disciplined, suspended, revoked, or denied; has not been
12	convicted of a criminal offense; and has no criminal charges
13	pending in any jurisdiction.
14	"(5) The applicant has provided proof of financial
15	responsibility in the form of either an irrevocable letter of
16	credit, or a cash bond or surety bond in the amount of ten
17	thousand dollars (\$10,000). If the applicant gives a surety
18	bond, the bond shall be executed by a surety company
19	authorized to do business in this state. A bond shall be made
20	payable to the board and shall be conditioned on compliance by
21	the applicant with this chapter and the rules adopted by the
22	board. All bonds shall be in a form approved by the board.
23	" (d)<u>(</u>e) The license fee for each auctioneer <u>or</u>
24	auction company shall be an amount to be determined by the

25 board, not to exceed two hundred fifty dollars (\$250), and the 26 license fee for each apprentice auctioneer shall be an amount 27 to be determined by the board, not to exceed one hundred <u>fifty</u> 1 dollars (\$100) (\$150). The license fees for an auctioneer
2 shall not be increased more than twenty-five dollars (\$25) in
3 any given year.

"(e)(f) All licenses shall expire on September 30 of 4 5 each year following issuance thereof and may be renewed upon 6 payment of the appropriate license fee as required by this 7 chapter. Renewal of a license may be effected at any time during the months preceding the date of expiration. No 8 9 examination shall be required for the renewal of any license, 10 unless the license has been revoked or suspended. If a licensee fails to renew his or her license by the deadline of 11 12 each year, he or she may have renew his or her license renewed 13 within 60 days after the expiration date, upon payment of the required fee and a late fee of twenty-five dollars (\$25) for 14 15 apprentices and fifty dollars (\$50) for auctioneers and auction companies. If a licensee elects not to pay the penalty 16 and renew his or her license, he or she shall be required to 17 18 submit an application, pay the examination fee, and take the examination required for new licensees. 19

20 "(f)(g) The board, by rule, shall adopt a program of 21 continuing education for its licensees. No licensee shall have 22 his or her license renewed unless, in addition to any other 23 requirements of this chapter, the minimum annual continuing 24 education requirements are met. The continuing education 25 program shall not include testing or examination of the licensees in any manner. Any licensee 65 years of age or older 26 shall be exempt from the continuing education requirement. 27

1 "(g)(h) The board shall prepare and deliver to each
2 licensee a license certificate and pocket card. The
3 certificate shall be displayed openly at all times in the
4 office of the licensee. The certificate and the pocket card of
5 the apprentice auctioneer shall contain his or her name as
6 well as that of the auctioneer under whose supervision he or
7 she is employed.

"(h)(i) When any auctioneer discharges an 8 9 apprentice, or terminates his or her employment with the 10 auctioneer for any reason, the auctioneer shall deliver or mail by registered or certified mail to the board the license 11 of the discharged apprentice auctioneer. It shall be unlawful 12 13 for any apprentice auctioneer to perform any of the acts contemplated by this chapter, either directly or indirectly 14 15 under authority of his or her license, until the apprentice auctioneer receives a new license bearing the name and address 16 17 of his or her new employer. No more than one license shall be 18 issued to any apprentice auctioneer for the same period of time. 19

"(i) Written notice shall be given immediately to 20 21 the board by each licensee of any change in his or her mailing 22 address and the board shall issue a new license for the unexpired period. A change of mailing address without 23 24 notification to the board shall automatically cancel the 25 license previously issued. For changing a mailing address and 26 issuance of a new license, the board shall collect a fee of five dollars (\$5) in an amount determined by rule of the 27

1 <u>board</u>. Each prior license shall be returned or accounted for 2 to the board and be canceled before the issuance of the new 3 license. The board may require other proof considered 4 desirable with due regard to the paramount interest of the 5 public in the issuance of the license.

"(k)(1) An auctioneer who is in good standing with 6 7 the board may request inactive status by submitting to the board a written application, his or her current license 8 9 certificate and pocket card, and a fee. The auctioneer shall 10 certify on the application that he or she will not perform any business of auctioneering while on inactive status. An 11 12 auctioneer who has a disciplinary or suspension hearing 13 pending against him or her may only be granted inactive status upon approval of the board. Inactive status may be renewed 14 15 annually upon written application and payment of a fee. The board, by rule, shall determine the amount of the initial 16 application fee and the annual renewal fee. 17

18 "(2) An auctioneer on inactive status may be 19 restored to active status by submitting to the board a written 20 application requesting reactivation and providing proof of 21 satisfying all continuing education requirements for the most 22 recent licensure period during which the license was inactive.

"(j)(1) Pursuant to Sections 41-22-1 to 41-22-27,
 inclusive, the Alabama Administrative Procedure Act, the board
 may make and enforce any necessary and reasonable rules and
 regulations pursuant to the application for any license.

1	"(m) The board, by rule, may establish and charge
2	reasonable fees relating to the administration and enforcement
3	of this chapter for application or other processing costs;
4	online service; continuing education provider services; copy,
5	mailing, and filing services; and other fees as necessary to
6	offset licensing and processing costs.

"§34-4-23.

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8 "The issuance of a license by the board shall be 9 evidence that the person, partnership, association, or 10 corporation or business entity named therein is entitled to 11 all the rights and privileges of an auctioneer or apprentice 12 auctioneer while the license remains unrevoked or unexpired. 13 "\$34-4-25.

14 "(a) A nonresident of this state, or a resident of 15 this state who is licensed by another state, may become an 16 auctioneer or apprentice auctioneer in this state by conforming to this chapter, or in the case of a nonresident 17 18 from a nonlicensing state, such person may be licensed provided an examination is given and passed and the person has 19 20 at least five years' experience in the auction business. 21 Provided further, that if a nonresident auctioneer or 22 apprentice auctioneer, or a resident who is licensed as an 23 auctioneer or apprentice auctioneer in another state, has a 24 lawsuit or other legal action filed and pending against him or 25 her in this or any other state, the board shall may not issue 26 a license to him or her until final disposition of the action, and then only at the discretion of the board. The terms 27

1 "auctioneer" and "apprentice auctioneer" shall include any 2 individual, firm, company, partnership, association, or 3 corporation by whom the "auctioneer" or "apprentice 4 auctioneer" is employed.

5 "(b) The board may recognize a license issued by any other state to a resident of this state or a nonresident 6 7 auctioneer or apprentice auctioneer if the other state 8 reciprocates with Alabama in like manner and if the licensing 9 requirements of the state include the passing of an 10 examination of equal or higher standards than those required by this state. The nonresident licensee, or resident licensee 11 of another state, shall, however, be required to secure a 12 13 license from the board which shall be issued upon application therefor, accompanied by payment of the license fee required 14 15 by this chapter and the filing of a certified copy of the 16 license of the applicant issued by the other state.

17 "(c) The board shall have the authority to may 18 impose any fee or licensing requirements on applicants for 19 licenses from a reciprocal state that the reciprocal state 20 imposes on Alabama licensees by rule, regulation, policy, or 21 law.

"(d) Every applicant shall file an irrevocable consent that actions may be commenced against the applicant in the proper court in the county in this state in which a cause of action may arise, in which the plaintiff may reside, by service of any process or pleadings authorized by laws of this state on the board, or a deputy to be designated by the board,

the consent stipulating and agreeing that service of process 1 2 or pleading shall be begun and held in all courts to be as valid and binding as if due service had been made upon the 3 applicant in this state. The consent shall be duly 4 5 acknowledged and, if made by a corporation, shall be 6 authenticated by the seal of the corporation. In case of any 7 process or pleadings mentioned in this chapter being served 8 upon the board or upon a deputy to be designated by the board, 9 duplicated copies shall be made, one of which shall be filed 10 in the office of the secretary of the board, and the other immediately forwarded by registered or certified mail to the 11 main office of the applicant against which process or 12 13 pleadings are directed. No default in the proceedings or 14 action shall be taken unless it shall be made to appear by 15 affidavit of a member of the board, or a deputy designated by the board, that a copy of the process or pleadings was mailed 16 17 to the defendant as herein required. Judgment by default shall 18 be taken in any action or proceedings within 20 days after the date of the mailing of process or pleadings to the defendant. 19

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"§34-4-27.

"Each auctioneer shall annually pay one state license in an amount not to exceed two hundred fifty dollars (\$250). Each auctioneer shall also annually pay a county license <u>fee</u> of twenty-five dollars (\$25) in each county where he or she sells by auction. No privilege license shall be required for any apprentice auctioneer when he or she is listed as the principal auctioneer. No license shall be 1 required for any auctioneer who conducts an auction, without 2 compensation for himself or herself, where all proceeds from the auction go to the benefit of any charitable organization. 3 The term "auctioneer" shall include any person selling real 4 5 estate, goods, wares, merchandise, automobiles, livestock, or other things of value by or at public outcry auction. Sales at 6 7 public outcry auction involving any of the following may be 8 made conducted for compensation without a license involving 9 any of the following:

10 "<u>(1) Sales at auction conducted by the owner of any</u> 11 part of the goods or real estate being offered, or an attorney 12 representing the owner, unless the owner acquired the goods to 13 resell.

"(1)(2) Sales for the estate of a decedent by an
 administrator, executor, or any person acting under order of
 any court or the attorney of an administrator, executor, or
 any person acting under order of any court.

18 "(2)(3) Sales of property conveyed by deed of trust, 19 mortgage, judgment, or ordered to be sold according to the 20 mortgage, judgment, or order, or decree.

21

"(3)(4) All sales under legal process.

22 "§34-4-28.

"(a) Authority to transact business as an auctioneer
under any license issued by the board shall be restricted to
the person named in such the license and shall may not inure
to the benefit of any other person.

"(b) Where an auctioneer's license shall be issued 1 2 to a corporation or association an auction company that is duly qualified and registered to conduct business in this 3 state, authority to transact business thereunder shall be 4 5 limited to one officer of such corporation or association, member, copartner, or owner of the company, to be designated 6 7 in the application and named in the license. Each other officer of such association or corporation, member, copartner, 8 or owner of the company desiring to act as an auctioneer in 9 10 connection with the business of the association or corporation company, or otherwise, shall be required to make application 11 12 for and take out a separate license in his or her own name 13 individually. Where the licensee is a copartnership, the license issued to such copartnership shall confer authority to 14 15 act as auctioneer upon one member of such copartnership only, 16 who shall be designated in the application and named in the 17 license. All the other members of the copartnership desiring 18 to act as auctioneers in connection with the business of the 19 partnership or otherwise shall be required to apply for and 20 take out individual licenses in their own names. 21 "(c) No licensed auction company may hire an 22 unlicensed auctioneer to conduct any auction business, nor shall any licensed auctioneer conduct an auction for an 23 24 unlicensed auction company in this state. 25 "(d) Every licensee authorized to transact business pursuant to this chapter shall do all of the following: 26

1	" <u>(1) Maintain a segregated escrow or trust account</u>
2 <u>i</u>	in a bank insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance
3 <u>C</u>	Corporation, in which funds belonging to sellers or consignors
4 <u>r</u>	received in the course of business transacted shall be kept
5 <u>s</u>	separate from the funds of the licensee. All funds received
6 <u>f</u>	from sales by an apprentice shall be maintained in the escrow
7 <u>c</u>	or trust account of the sponsor.
8	"(2) Enter into a written contract with the owner or
9 <u>c</u>	consignor of any property to be offered for sale before the
10 <u>a</u>	auction. All contracts shall clearly contain the terms and
11 <u>c</u>	conditions upon which the licensee received the property for
12 <u>a</u>	auction including, but not limited to, whether the auction

14 <u>t</u>	the proceeds due the owner or consignor shall be remitted to

16	"(3) Provide a copy to the seller or consignor of
17 <u>a</u>	all written instruments prepared by the licensee at the time
18 <u>c</u>	of execution. Consignment agreements shall contain the name
19 <u>a</u>	and signature of the licensee responsible for the auction.
20	"(4) Provide a closing statement to the seller or
21 <u>c</u>	consignor giving a full accounting of all proceeds received
22 <u>a</u>	and disbursements made relative to the auction. A closing
23 <u>s</u>	statement shall contain the date and location of the auction
24 <u>a</u>	and the name, license number, and signature of the licensee
25 <u>r</u>	responsible for the auction. A closing statement shall be

26 provided within 30 days after the auction. A properly prepared

1	HUD-1 statement, or equivalent, satisfies the requirements of
2	this section for the sale of real property.
3	"(5) Display the name and license number of the
4	auctioneer in all advertising for the auction. In the case of
5	an apprentice auctioneer, all advertising shall also contain
6	the name and license number of the sponsor. An auction company
7	shall display the name and license number of the auctioneer
8	named in the license in any and all advertisements.
9	"(6) Ensure that all advertising is accurate and
10	truthful.
11	"(7) Maintain complete and accurate documents,
12	books, and records of all transactions concerning every
13	auction for a period of five years after the date on which the
14	seller or consignor contracted with the auctioneer or the
15	auction was conducted, whichever is later. The documents,
16	books, and records shall be made available for inspection by
17	the board, or its authorized personnel or representatives,
18	upon request. Failure to produce the requested documents,
19	books, records, or copies thereof within 30 days after request
20	of the board shall be grounds for disciplinary action by the
21	board.
22	"(8) Assume responsibility, as the sponsoring
23	auctioneer, for the acts of any apprentice in the conduct of
24	auction business and be present at every auction to directly
25	supervise the apprentice.
26	"§34-4-29.

"(a) The board may revoke or suspend licenses as
 provided in this section.

3 "(b)(a) The board may, upon its own motion, and
4 shall, upon the verified complaint in writing of any person
5 containing evidence, documentary or otherwise, that makes out
6 a prima facie case, investigate the actions of any auctioneer,
7 apprentice auctioneer, or any person who assumes to act in
8 either capacity, and hold a hearing on the complaint.

9 "(c)(b) The board may suspend or revoke any license
10 which has been issued based on false or fraudulent
11 representations. The board may also suspend or revoke the
12 license of any licensee for invoke disciplinary action

15 licensee is guilty of any of the following acts:

1 with his or her own, or failing to keep funds of others in an

3 "(5) Paying valuable consideration to any person for
4 services performed in violation of this chapter.

5 "(6) Being convicted in a court of competent
6 jurisdiction of this or any other state of a criminal offense
7 involving moral turpitude or a felony.

8 "(7) Violation of Violating any rule or regulation
9 promulgated adopted by the board.

10 "(8) Failure Failing to furnish voluntarily at the 11 time of execution copies of all written instruments prepared 12 by the auctioneer or apprentice auctioneer <u>licensee</u>.

"(9) Any conduct of any auctioneer which
 demonstrates Demonstrating bad faith, dishonesty,

15 incompetency, or untruthfulness.

"(10) Any conduct of any auctioneer which
 demonstrates <u>Demonstrating</u> improper, fraudulent, or dishonest
 dealings.

"<u>(11) Having had any license to practice a business</u>
 or profession in this or any other state or jurisdiction
 revoked, suspended, annulled, sanctioned, or otherwise having
 any disciplinary action taken against him or her by any other
 licensing authority in this or any other state.

24 "(11)(12) Failing prior to before the sale at public
25 auction, to enter into a written contract with the owner or
26 cosignee of any the property to be sold containing the terms

1 and conditions upon which the licensee received the property
2 for sale.

3	" (12) Failure by the auctioneer conducting an
4	auction to show (13) Failing to display his or her name and
5	state license number in the <u>all</u> advertising of the <u>for an</u>
6	auction the licensee is conducting.
7	" (13) (14) Presenting a worthless check to the board.
8	"(15) Filing frivolous, unfounded complaints with
9	the board.
10	" <u>(16) Knowingly making any misleading</u> , false, or
11	deceptive statement on any application for a license.
12	"(17) Aiding or abetting an unlicensed person in the
13	performance of acts that require a license under this chapter.
14	"(18) Violating any other provision of this chapter.
15	"(c) When the board finds any licensee guilty of any
16	of the grounds set forth in subsection (b), the board may
17	enter an order imposing one or more of the following
18	penalties:
19	" <u>(1) A letter of reprimand.</u>
20	"(2) Probation for a period of time and subject to
21	any condition prescribed by the board.
22	"(3) Denial of an application for an initial or
23	renewal license.
24	"(4) Suspension of a license for a period of time
25	established by the board, with or without automatic
26	reinstatement.
27	" <u>(5)</u> Revocation of a license.

1 "(6) Imposing continuing education requirements in 2 the area or areas in which the licensee has been found 3 deficient.

4 "(7) Assessment of the costs of any disciplinary
5 proceedings on the licensee.

"(d) Before denying an application for license or 6 7 suspending or revoking any license, the board shall hold a hearing and shall, at least 21 days prior to before the date 8 set for the hearing, notify in writing the accused licensee of 9 10 the charges made or the question to be determined, including notice of the time and place of the hearing, and afford the 11 licensee an opportunity to be present, be heard in person or 12 13 by counsel, and to offer evidence orally, or by affidavit or 14 deposition. Written notice may be served by delivery of the 15 notice personally to the applicant or licensee or by mailing the notice by registered or certified mail to the last known 16 17 mailing address of the applicant or licensee. If the applicant 18 or licensee is an apprentice auctioneer, the board shall also notify the auctioneer employing him or her, or whose employ he 19 20 or she is about to enter, by mailing notice by registered or 21 certified mail to the auctioneer's last known address. The 22 hearing shall be held at a time and place prescribed by the 23 board and shall proceed in accordance with the Alabama 24 Administrative Procedure Act. The board may deny any applicant 25 for an apprentice auctioneer or auctioneer license the right to take an examination for a period of up to one year if the 26 applicant is found by the board to have conducted auction 27

business within this state as an apprentice auctioneer or
 auctioneer without first having been properly licensed.

"(e) In addition to the disciplinary powers granted 3 in this section, the board may levy and collect administrative 4 5 fines from any person for serious violations of this chapter or the rules and regulations of the board of not less than 6 7 $\frac{200}{200}$ five hundred dollars (\$500) or more than $\frac{500}{200}$ two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) for each violation. 8 9 "(f) The board may seek an injunction against any 10 person in violation of this chapter in addition to the penalties and disciplinary powers otherwise conferred upon the 11 board herein. In an action for an injunction, the board may 12 13 demand and recover a civil penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per 14 day for each violation, reasonable attorney fees, and court

15 <u>costs.</u>

"(g) Failure to comply with any final order of the
 board is cause for suspension or revocation of a license. The
 board may also suspend or revoke any license that has been
 issued based on false or fraudulent representations.

"(a) The board may administer oaths and prescribe all necessary and reasonable rules for the conduct of a hearing. The board may take testimony of any person by deposition, with the same fees and mileage and in the same manner as prescribed by law in judicial procedure of courts of this state in civil cases. The fees and mileage shall be paid by the party at whose request the witness is subpoenaed. "(b) If the board determines that the licensee is
 guilty under this chapter, his or her license may be suspended
 or revoked.

4 "(c)(b) The affirmative vote of a majority of the
5 members of the board shall be necessary to revoke or suspend a
6 license required before any disciplinary action may be taken
7 against a licensee in accordance with this chapter.

8 "(d)(c) The board is declared to be a quasi judicial 9 body, and the members or the employees of the board are 10 granted immunity from civil liability and shall not be liable 11 for damages therefrom when acting in the performance of their 12 duties as described in this chapter.

14 "Whenever any person, partnership, association or 15 corporation claiming to have been injured or damaged by the gross negligence, incompetency, fraud, dishonesty, or 16 17 misconduct on the part of any licensee following the calling 18 or engaging in the <u>auction</u> business, as herein described, shall file an action upon such claim against such licensee in 19 20 any court of record in this state and shall recover judgment 21 thereon, such court may as part of its judgment in such case, 22 if it deems it a proper case in which to do so, revoke the defendant's license, which shall not be reissued to such 23 24 licensee except upon unanimous vote of all members of the 25 board in favor of such reissuance and only then after the 26 lapse of a period of 90 days from the date of such revocation. "§34-4-33. 27

"(a) Findings of the board with regard to the 1 2 denial, suspension, or revocation of a license or the imposition of an any penalty or administrative fine shall be 3 final unless within 30 days after the date of the final order 4 5 of the board, the applicant, or otherwise known as the accused, whether an individual or a corporation registered in 6 7 Alabama, licensee files a notice of appeal in with the board to the Circuit Court of Montgomery County. A party The person 8 appealing a the decision shall post a two hundred dollar 9 10 (\$200) appeal cost bond with the clerk of the circuit court. The circuit clerk shall notify the board of the appeal after 11 12 the clerk has approved the appellant's bond board to cover the 13 reasonable costs of preparing the transcript of the proceeding 14 under review, unless waived by the board or the court on a 15 showing of substantial hardship. The appeal shall be conducted in accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act, and with 16 all the attendant rights and duties thereof. 17 18 "(b) An appeal does not act as supersedeas, but the

19 decision of the board may be stayed by the court pending the
20 appeal.

21 "(c) The board shall within 30 days of service of 22 the notice of appeal, or within the additional time as the 23 court may allow, file the record in the case with the circuit 24 clerk. A complaint setting forth with particularity the issues 25 raised on appeal shall be filed with the court and served on 26 the board by the appealing party within 30 days after the notice of appeal is filed. The action shall be conducted in
 accordance with the Alabama Rules of Civil Procedure.

"(d) The appeal shall be conducted by the court 3 without a jury and shall be confined to the record made before 4 5 the board. The decision of the board shall be taken as prima facie just and reasonable and the court shall not substitute 6 7 its judgment for that of the board as to the weight of the evidence on questions of fact. The court shall affirm or 8 reverse, in part or in whole, or modify the decision of the 9 10 board. The court may remand the case to the board for further 11 proceedings.

12 "(e)(b) If the decision of the board is affirmed in 13 whole or in part, the cost of the appeal shall be taxed 14 against the party taking the appeal. If the decision of the 15 board is not affirmed, the court shall tax the costs of appeal 16 against the board.

18 "(a) The Governor shall appoint a State Board of Auctioneers to be comprised of seven auctioneer members and 19 20 one consumer member. Except as otherwise provided by Act 98-271, all All appointments and subsequent appointments by 21 the Governor shall be for a term of five years, with each 22 auctioneer member appointed being a resident of a different 23 24 congressional district and the consumer member being a 25 resident of and appointed from the state at-large. Within 60 26 days after July 1, 1998, the Governor shall appoint one 27 additional auctioneer member provided for herein for a term of

1 two years and the other additional auctioneer member provided 2 for in Act 98-271 shall be appointed by the Governor for a 3 term of four years. Thereafter, subsequent appointments shall be for a term of five years. Appointments shall end on the 4 5 anniversary date of the original appointments, except appointments to fill a vacancy which shall be for the 6 7 unexpired term only. No member shall serve more than two consecutive terms of office. Each member of the board and his 8 or her successor shall have been a resident and citizen of 9 10 this state for at least five years prior to his or her appointment. Each auctioneer member of the board and his or 11 her successor shall have been a licensed auctioneer in this 12 13 state for at least five years. In the event a district has no qualified candidate for appointment, the appointment may come 14 15 from the state at-large. Each member shall hold office until his or her successor is appointed by the Governor. The 16 membership of the board shall be inclusive and reflect the 17 18 racial, gender, geographic, urban/rural, and economic diversity of the state. 19

"(b) Each auctioneer member of the board shall be of good moral character and shall have been licensed by the board and actively engaged in the auction business for at least five years prior to the appointment.

24 "(c) On the appointment of a new auctioneer board 25 member, the board shall, at its next meeting, elect one of its 26 members as chair, one member as vice-chair, one member as 27 secretary, and any other officers deemed necessary. The board 1 may do all things necessary and convenient for carrying into 2 effect this chapter. The board may make bylaws, rules, and 3 regulations not inconsistent with this chapter or other 4 general laws of the state.

"(d) Except as otherwise provided in Section
34-4-53, members of the board, board staff, and board
attorneys shall receive the same per diem and travel allowance
paid to state employees for each day they meet to conduct the
official business of the board.

10 "(e) The board may employ an administrator who shall be exempt from the classified service of the state, and other 11 12 staff members necessary to discharge board duties and 13 administer this chapter. The administrator shall be employed on the basis of his or her education, experience, and skills 14 15 in administration and management. The board shall determine the duties and fix the compensation of the administrator and 16 other staff members, subject to the general laws of the state. 17

18 "(f) The board shall provide by rule for the 19 investigation of any auction activity that is being promoted, 20 managed, or supervised by unlicensed individuals in violation 21 of this chapter and may employ an investigator to assist the board in enforcement of the laws, rules, and policies adopted 22 23 thereunder. The investigator shall be employed on the basis of 24 his or her education, experience, and skills in law 25 enforcement. The board shall determine the duties and fix the compensation of the investigator, subject to the general laws 26 27 of the state.

"(f)(g) The board shall adopt a seal by which the 1 2 board shall authenticate records and documents. On the seal shall be the words State Board of Auctioneers. Copies of all 3 records and documents in the office of the board that are duly 4 5 certified and authenticated by the seal of the board shall be received in evidence in all courts equally and with the same 6 7 effect as the original. All public records kept in the office 8 of the board shall be open to public inspection during 9 reasonable hours.

10 "(h) Each board member shall be accountable to the Governor for the proper performance of his or her duties as a 11 member of the board. The Governor shall investigate any 12 13 complaints or unfavorable reports concerning the actions of 14 the board and take appropriate action thereon, including 15 removal of any board member for misfeasance, malfeasance, neglect of duty, commission of a felony, incompetence, or 16 permanent inability to perform official duties. A board member 17 18 may be removed at the request of the board for failing to attend four consecutive, properly noticed meetings. 19

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"The board shall meet at least four times each year, in January, April, July, and October, <u>quarterly</u> for the purpose of transacting business as may properly come before the board. Special meetings of the board shall be held at such times as the board may provide in the bylaws the board may adopt. Four <u>A majority of the then appointed board</u> members shall constitute a quorum at a board meeting. A majority vote

of a quorum of the board eligible to vote on a matter shall be required for any action taken by the board. Due notice of each meeting and the time and place thereof shall be given each member in such manner as the bylaws <u>and applicable law</u> may provide."

6 Section 2. Section 34-4-22, Code of Alabama 1975, 7 requiring the board to keep a register of applicants, is 8 repealed.

9 Section 3. This act shall become effective on the 10 first day of the third month following its passage and 11 approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
