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8	RECOGNIZING MARCH 2019 AS COLORECTAL CANCER
9	AWARENESS MONTH IN ALABAMA.
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11	WHEREAS, colorectal cancer is the second most common
12	cause of cancer deaths for men and women in Alabama; and
13	WHEREAS, the lifetime risk of being diagnosed with
14	cancer of the colon or rectum is 5.5 percent for men and 5.1
15	percent for women in the United States; and
16	WHEREAS, the vast majority of colon cancer deaths
17	can be prevented through proper screening and early detection;
18	and
19	WHEREAS, if 80 percent of adults were screened for
20	colon cancer, 203,000 fewer people would die by 2030; and
21	WHEREAS, the survival rate of individuals who have
22	colorectal cancer is 90 percent when detected in the early
23	stages versus only 10 percent survival rate when colorectal
24	cancer is diagnosed after it has spread to other organs; and
25	WHEREAS, the American Cancer Society estimates 2,230
26	cases of colorectal cancer will be diagnosed in Alabama this
27	year and 950 people will die from the disease; and

Τ	WHEREAS, deaths from colorectal cancer occur
2	disproportionately among those who are underserved or
3	underinsured; and
4	WHEREAS, when detected early, the five-year survival
5	rates for colon cancer is 90 percent; however, only 39 percent
6	of colorectal cancers are diagnosed at this stage, mostly due
7	to low rates of screening; and
8	WHEREAS, five-year survival rates decline
9	dramatically when colorectal cancer is diagnosed in later
10	stages; and
11	WHEREAS, greater awareness of colon cancer and the
12	means to prevent it could save the lives of hundreds of
13	Alabamians every year; and
14	WHEREAS, colorectal cancer is preventable,
15	treatable, and beatable in most cases; and
16	WHEREAS, observing a Colorectal Cancer Awareness
17	Month during the month of March would provide a special
18	opportunity to offer education on the importance of early
19	detection and screening; now therefore,
20	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH
21	HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That we recognize the importance of
22	colorectal screenings.
