8 SYNOPSIS: This bill makes supplemental appropriations  
9 from the Education Trust Fund Advancement and  
10 Technology Fund for the fiscal year ending  
11 September 30, 2020; to the public institutions of  
12 higher education in the amount of \$65,559,353; and  
13 to the Department of Education, the Board of  
14 Trustees of the Alabama Institute for Deaf and  
15 Blind, the Board of Youth Services School  
16 Districts, the Board of Directors of the Alabama  
17 School of Fine Arts, and the Board of Trustees of  
18 the Alabama School of Math and Science in the  
19 amount of \$176,983,575; and makes a transfer from  
20 the Education Trust Fund Advancement and Technology  
21 Fund to the Education Trust Fund in the amount of  
22 \$15,000,000 at the end of the fiscal year ending  
23 September 30, 2020 to reimburse the Education Trust  
24 Fund for the estimated first year debt service of  
25 the Public School and College Authority bond issue  
26 contemplated by Senate Bill 242 of the 2020 Regular  
27 Session.

6 To make supplemental appropriations from the  
7 Education Trust Fund Advancement and Technology Fund for the  
8 fiscal year ending September 30, 2020, to the public  
9 institutions of higher education in the amount of \$65,559,353,  
10 and to the Department of Education, the Board of Trustees of  
11 the Alabama Institute for Deaf and Blind, the Board of Youth  
12 Services School Districts, the Board of Directors of the  
13 Alabama School of Fine Arts, and the Board of Trustees of the  
14 Alabama School of Math and Science in the amount of  
15 \$176,983,575; and to make a transfer from the Education Trust  
16 Fund Advancement and Technology Fund to the Education Trust  
17 Fund in the amount of \$15,000,000 at the end of the fiscal  
18 year ending September 30, 2020 as reimbursement for the  
19 estimated first year debt service expenses of the Public  
20 School and College Authority bond issue contemplated by Senate  
21 Bill 242 of the 2020 Regular Session.

22 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

23 Section 1. In addition to all other appropriations  
24 heretofore or hereafter made, there is hereby appropriated a  
25 total of \$65,559,353 from the Education Trust Fund Advancement  
26 and Technology Fund to the public institutions of higher edu-  
27 cation for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2020. This

1 appropriation shall be expended as provided in Section 29-9-4,  
2 Code of Alabama 1975. This appropriation shall be distributed  
3 as follows:

1           Section 2. In addition to all other appropriations  
2 heretofore or hereafter made, there is hereby appropriated a  
3 total of \$176,983,575 from the Education Trust Fund  
4 Advancement and Technology Fund to the Department of  
5 Education, the Board of Trustees of the Alabama Institute for  
6 Deaf and Blind, the Board of Youth Services School Districts,  
7 the Board of Directors of the Alabama School of Fine Arts, and  
8 the Board of Trustees of the Alabama School of Math and  
9 Science for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2020. This  
10 appropriation shall be expended as provided in Section 29-9-4,  
11 Code of Alabama 1975.

12           Section 3. (a) The Department of Education shall al-  
13 locate the funds appropriated herein to the local boards of  
14 education and entities as follows:

10                   (b) Notwithstanding any other laws to the contrary,  
11 the funds appropriated to the Department of Education by  
12 subsection (a) of this section shall not be expended without  
13 prior approval of the State Superintendent of Education.

14                   (c) (1) The above appropriation for teacher  
15 professional development shall be allocated to the Alabama  
16 Department of Education to be distributed to the Ed Farm  
17 Classroom of Tomorrow. These funds will be used by Ed Farm to  
18 provide technology tools and professional development services  
19 to classroom teachers in an effort to improve instruction and  
20 student learning gains. It is the intent of the legislature  
21 that in addition to general programmatic costs, Ed Farm may  
22 also expend funds for software, hardware, administrative costs  
23 and professional learning services.

1                   (2) The State Superintendent shall provide a report  
2 of the initiative to the Chair of the House Ways and  
3 Means-Education Committee and the Chair of the Senate  
4 Committee on Finance and Taxation-Education no later than  
5 October 1, 2021.

6                   Section 4. Notwithstanding any other provision of  
7 law, in addition to the allowable expenses from the Education  
8 Trust Fund Advancement and Technology Fund provided in Section  
9 29-9-4, Code of Alabama 1975, there is hereby transferred  
10 \$15,000,000 from the Education Trust Fund Advancement and  
11 Technology Fund to the Education Trust Fund at the end of the  
12 fiscal year ending September 30, 2020 to reimburse the  
13 Education Trust Fund for the first-year cost of the Public  
14 School and College Authority bond issue proposed by Senate  
15 Bill 242 of the 2020 Regular Session or similar legislation  
16 allocating bond proceeds to both public schools and  
17 institutions of higher education in the state.

18                   Section 5. All funds not expended in the current  
19 fiscal year shall not revert but be carried forward for the  
20 purpose appropriated.

21                   Section 6. This act shall become effective  
22 immediately upon its passage and approval by the Governor, or  
23 upon its otherwise becoming law.
