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10	WHEREAS, counties in the United States routinely
11	provide treatment services to the estimated two million people
12	with serious mental illnesses who are jailed each year; and
13	WHEREAS, people in jails are three to six times more
14	likely than people in the general population to have serious
15	mental illnesses; and
16	WHEREAS, almost three-quarters of jailed adults with
17	serious mental illnesses also have substance-use disorders;
18	and
19	WHEREAS, adults with mental illnesses tend to stay
20	longer in jail and upon release are at a higher risk of
21	recidivism than people without these disorders; and
22	WHEREAS, county jails spend two to three times more
23	on adults with mental illnesses that require interventions
24	compared to adults without those treatment needs; and
25	WHEREAS, without appropriate treatment and services,
26	people with mental illnesses continue to cycle through the

criminal justice system, often resulting in tragic outcomes
for these individuals and their families; and

WHEREAS, adults with mental illness have three times longer boarding times in hospital emergency departments; and

WHEREAS, hospitals incur a direct loss of approximately \$1,200 per emergency room visit for people with mental illness; and

WHEREAS, the State of Alabama takes pride in its responsibility to protect and enhance the health, welfare, and safety of its residents in efficient and cost-effective ways; and

WHEREAS, through Stepping Up, the Alabama Department of Mental Health, the National Association of Counties, the Council of State Governments Justice Center, and the American Psychiatric Association Foundation are encouraging public, private, and non-profit partners to reduce the number of people with mental illnesses in jails and hospitals; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That this body signs on to the Call to Action to reduce the number of people with mental illnesses in our county jails and hospitals, commits to sharing lessons learned around the state, and encourages all county officials, employees, and residents to participate in Stepping Up.
