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8	RECOGNIZING PORNOGRAPHY AS A PUBLIC HEALTH CRISIS IN
9	ALABAMA.
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11	WHEREAS, pornography, including obscenity, is
12	creating a public health crisis; and
13	WHEREAS, due to advances in technology and the
14	universal availability of the Internet, children, adolescents,
15	and adults are frequently exposed to what used to be referred
16	to as "hardcore pornography" that was legally "obscene", to
17	what is now considered to be "mainstream pornography"; and
18	WHEREAS, a study of university students found that
19	93 percent of boys and 62 percent of girls had seen Internet
20	pornography during adolescence; and
21	WHEREAS, pornography promotes and encourages
22	sexually toxic expectations and behaviors, and it also
23	contributes to the hyper-sexualization of children,
24	adolescents, and adults; in addition, pornography is
25	associated with low self-esteem, as well as body image
26	disorders, eating disorders, an increase in problematic sexual
27	activity at younger ages, and a greater likelihood of engaging

in risky sexual behaviors, such as sending sexually explicit images, partaking in "hookups", having multiple sex partners, participating in group sex, and using substances during sex as young adolescents; and

WHEREAS, exposure to pornography often replaces age-appropriate sex education for children and youth, which distorts their sexual templates; and

WHEREAS, because pornography treats women like objects and commodities for the viewers' use, it teaches younger girls and women that they are to be used and teaches boys and men to be users; pornography often depicts degrading, painful, and aggressive abusive acts as if they are harmless or pleasurable; and

WHEREAS, pornography fosters less egalitarian and more hostile sexist attitudes of men towards women, increased acceptance of rape myths, a greater likelihood of sexual harassment or sexually coercive and forceful behavior by adolescents, increased male sexual aggression against women (effects being more pronounced among men who are predisposed to sexual aggression who consume pornography with higher frequency, or who use violent pornography), as well as increased verbal and physical aggression among both male and female pornography consumers; and

WHEREAS, pornography increases the demand for sex trafficking by increasing the demand for prostitution and child sexual abuse images; potential detrimental effects on pornography's users can impact brain development and

functioning, contribute to emotional and medical illnesses, shape deviant sexual arousal through animal and/or child pornography use, and problematic or harmful sexual behaviors such as child-on-child sexual behaviors that can occur in schools, playgrounds, homes, and other settings; and

WHEREAS, research indicates that pornography is potentially biologically addictive, which means that the user requires more novelty, often in the form of more shocking material, in order to be satisfied; this biological addiction leads to an increasing use of pornography that features themes of risky sexual behaviors, extreme degradation, violence, and animal and child sexual abuse images; and

WHEREAS, pornography use is linked to difficulty in forming or maintaining intimate relationships, lessening the desire in young men to marry, dependence on thoughts of pornography to create or maintain sexual excitement with a partner, preference for pornography over sexual intercourse with a partner, dissatisfaction in marriage, and infidelity; pornography has a detrimental effect on the family unit as well; and

WHEREAS, pornography is a multi-billion dollar industry that finances, creates, and distributes material through the Internet and by other means; the inundation of pervasive and hyper-sexualized materials by the pornography industry desensitizes the community conscience and impedes enforcement of obscenity and harmful-to-minors laws, by a lack

of support in the community and a disinterest by law enforcement; and

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WHEREAS, the obscenity industry considers the line of legality to be drawn by prosecutors, not by legislators, and pornographers in many parts of the country have responded by self-regulating when federal obscenity laws were enforced; and

WHEREAS, overcoming pornography's harms is beyond the capability of the afflicted individual to address alone; efforts to prevent pornography exposure and correlated risky or compulsive behaviors, to educate individuals, families, and communities concerning pornography's harms, and to develop effective recovery treatment modalities must be addressed systematically in ways that hold broader influences accountable and utilize public health channels; and

WHEREAS, law enforcement must actively enforce laws that protect community standards against materials that unlawfully appeal to prurient interests and are patently offensive, as well as laws that prohibit materials that are harmful to minors; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That we recognize that pornography is a public health hazard that leads to a broad spectrum of individual and public health impacts and societal harms; furthermore, we recognize the need for education, prevention, research, and policy change at the local, state, and national level in order to address the pornography epidemic that is

harming the people of our State and nation. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution shall be sent by the Secretary of the State of Alabama to the Secretaries of State Agencies overseeing obscenity prosecution, health and human services, child and family welfare, and education; we direct that the Legislature calls on the U.S. Department of Justice, Alabama Attorney General, and Alabama District Attorneys to vigorously enforce federal and state obscenity and harmful-to-minors laws; we also direct that the Legislature calls on Congress to address the crisis of children and adults accessing pornography and obscenity on the Internet. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution shall be sent to the Governor of Alabama, the Secretary of the State of Alabama, the President of the United States, the United States Senate and House of Representatives, the Governors throughout the United States, and each member of the Alabama congressional delegation.

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
