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8 CREATING A COMMISSION TO STUDY THE FEASIBILITY OF
9 ESTABLISHING A MIDWIFERY PROGRAM AT WALLACE STATE COMMUNITY
10 COLLEGE IN SELMA.

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WHEREAS, the practice of midwifery has existed throughout history; in the United States a resurgence in midwifery occurred from the vision of public health nurses, obstetricians, and social reformers concerned with high maternal and infant mortality rates during the early decades of the 20th century; in the 1940s, the greatest expansion in midwifery occurred in the South and Southwest in home births, birthing centers, and an occasional community hospital; and

WHEREAS, Alabama has seen one of the highest infant mortality rates in the nation, and although the infant mortality rate has dropped in the past several years, the racial gap remains; African American babies have a mortality rate double that of their white peers; and

WHEREAS, certified nurse midwives usually practice in hospital settings after earning a nursing degree; while certified professional midwives practice in a variety of

settings, including birth centers and homes, and go through an educational program separate from nursing; and

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WHEREAS, the state did not recognize certified professional midwifery until 2017, when the Legislature created the State Board of Midwifery and authorized the practice of professional midwifery by licensed midwives in the state; however, there are no educational programs in the state that relate to the practice of professional midwifery; and

WHEREAS, the state recognizes the need for better maternal care in the Blackbelt region, where health, safety, education, and economic security lag behind the rest of the state; and

WHEREAS, the state also recognizes the need for an educational program in professional midwifery in the Blackbelt region to ensure that anyone seeking to practice midwifery can be trained through an accredited program and can provide an alternative method of bringing much needed maternal care to women of this state and reducing infant mortality; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, That there is created a study commission to determine the feasibility of establishing an accredited educational program in professional midwifery at Wallace State Community College in Selma.

- (a) The study commission shall be comprised of the following members:
 - (1) The chair of the Senate Health Committee.

- 1 (2) Two members appointed by the President of
 2 Wallace State Community College, one with a background and
 3 experience in financing and program costs and one with a
 4 background and experience in curriculum.
 - (3) Two members appointed by the State Board of Midwifery.

- (4) One member appointed by the Chancellor of the Alabama Community College System.
- (5) One senator from the district that includes Wallace State Community College in Selma.
- (b) The appointing members shall coordinate their appointments so that diversity of gender, race, and geographical areas is reflective of the makeup of this state.
- (c) The chair of the Senate Health Committee shall serve as chair of the commission. The commission shall meet as soon as practical at a time and place set by the chair. Notice of the meetings of the commission shall be provided in a manner consistent with the rules of the Legislature pertaining to interim committees.
- (d) In addition to studying the feasibility of establishing an accredited professional midwifery program at Wallace State Community College in Selma, the commission shall determine the costs of such a program to the Education Trust Fund, including the costs of providing scholarships to eligible individuals.

1 (e) The Senate and the Legislative Services Agency
2 shall provide the necessary staff and support to the
3 commission to perform its duties.

- (f) (1) The Legislative members of the commission shall be entitled to their legislative compensation, per deim, and travel expenses for each day they attend a meeting of the commission in accordance with Amendment 871 of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901.
 - (2) Other members of the commission may be reimbursed for necessary expenses in attending meetings of the commission according to policies and procedures of their respective appointing authorities.
- (g) The commission shall report its findings to the Legislature, along with proposed legislation, not later than October 31, 2020, at which times it shall stand dissolved.
