22	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
23	Section 1. There is hereby appropriated for the
24	support of public education in Alabama for the fiscal year
25	ending September 30, 2022, for debt service, and for capital
26	outlay to be paid out of funds specified in subsection (a) of
27	Section 2 of this act, the amounts specified in subsections

(a), (b), (c), (d), and (e) of Section 3 of this act. For the 1 2 purpose specified in subsection (b) of Section 2 of this act, amounts are shown by programmatic area and the total for all 3 programs is shown so as to include estimated sources of funds 4 other than those listed in subsection (a) of Section 2 of this 5 act. For the purpose of this act, "ETF" shall mean the 6 Education Trust Fund and "Federal and Local Funds" shall mean 7 all gifts, grants, contributions, or entitlements, including 8 9 grants by the Congress of the United States, municipalities or 10 counties.

Section 2. (a) The appropriations provided for in 11 this act shall be paid from funds in the State Treasury to the 12 13 credit of the Education Trust Fund, Alabama Peace Officers' Standards and Training Fund, Impaired Drivers Trust Fund, 14 15 Driver Education and Training Fund, Special Education Catastrophic Fund, Public School Fund and other listed funds 16 17 and are hereby made for the support of public education in 18 Alabama for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2022, and the appropriations herein made shall be subject to the provisions, 19 20 terms, conditions and limitations of the Budget and Financial 21 Control Act (Code of Alabama 1975, Sections 41-4-80 et seq.), 22 the provisions of the Budget Management Act of 1976 (Code of Alabama 1975, Sections 41-19-1 et seq.), and shall be in the 23 24 amounts hereinafter specified.

(b) Amounts shown hereinunder the columns "Earmarked
Funds" and "Appropriation Total" are as set forth for the
purpose of establishing amounts estimated to be available by

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Upon certification and approval by the Deputy State Superintendent of the Office of Administrative and Financial Services that any newly formed city school system is an operational public school system within the State of Alabama, the Department shall ensure that any Foundation Program funds or other state funds allocated to the parent county board of education of the newly formed city school system for students that attended and were counted in the Average Daily Membership of the parent county board of education and now will attend the newly formed city school system shall be transferred to the newly formed city school system for operational expenses. The above appropriation shall be distributed by the State Board of Education in accordance with the provisions of Sections 16-13-230 through 16-13-239, Code of Alabama 1975, and all other laws and regulations of the State Board of Education relating to the expenditure of such funds. These funds shall be used to provide a minimum school term of 180 full instructional days, or the hourly equivalent thereof, and for equitable educational opportunities in the public schools of the State. It is the intent of the Legislature that funds appropriated from the Education Trust Fund shall not be used to pay membership dues to any organization/association. Foundation Program calculations for FY 2021-2022 are based on the funding divisors set forth below. Units earned under the Foundation Program shall be employed as regular classroom teachers and assigned by the local board of education. The divisors listed below shall not serve to prescribe pupil-teacher ratios. It is the intent of the Legislature that local boards of education have flexibility in determining where reductions are made. At least fifty percent of all professional learning requirements necessary to retain a valid Alabama teaching certificate shall be directly related to the knowledge and skills necessary to provide high quality instruction that leads to student development and academic growth. The State Superintendent shall establish an approval system, including, but not limited to a menu of micro credentials, that relates directly to any valid teaching certificate holders' responsibilities as an educator. necessary, for initial or recertification criteria. The State Superintendent shall provide a status report on the approval system status and budgetary needs to the Chairs of the House Ways and Means-Education and Senate Finance and Taxation-Education Committees on a quarterly basis.

Notwithstanding Section 16-13-231.1(d), Code of Alabama 1975, there shall not be an appropriation for the 1% over the total cost of instructional salaries for the Foundation Program as calculated by the State Minimum Salary Schedule for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2021. For "Fringe Benefits" the rate per day for two personal days and five sick days (for units earned in the Foundation Program) shall be \$95. The Teachers' Retirement System employer rate shall be 12.43% of salaries for Tier I members and 11.32% of salaries for Tier II members. The Public Education Employees' Health Insurance Program (PEEHIP) rate shall be \$800 per month for each full-time employee. As funds are appropriated, the appropriation herein shall include funds to pay for substitute support employees for each day a support employee is absent.

For "Classroom Instructional Support," the uniform amounts used in determining the Foundation Program allowance for classroom instructional support shall be: (1) textbooks or digital resources at \$75.00 per pupil in average daily membership during the first 20 scholastic days after Labor Day of the preceding school year; (2) classroom materials and supplies at \$700.00 per unit earned in the Foundation Program; (3) technology at \$500.00 per unit earned in the Foundation Program; (4) professional development at \$100.00 per unit earned in the Foundation Program; and (5) library enhancement at \$157.72 per unit earned in the Foundation Program. Funds allocated for instructional support units to meet Advanced Education standards may be used for principals, assistant principals, counselors, and librarians as calculated by the State Department of Education and assigned to the schools where such units are earned. An instructional support unit earned for a principal shall be increased by .31 for elementary schools, .35 for middle schools, and .45 for secondary schools and unit schools. An instructional support unit earned for an assistant principal shall be increased by .10 for elementary schools, middle schools, secondary schools and unit schools. 12 Section 4. Each college or university receiving an appropriation from the Education Trust Fund in Section 3C that 13 operates a public teacher preparation program leading to the 14 15 attainment of an initial elementary teaching certification 16 shall be in compliance with the credit hour requirements of 17 reading or literacy coursework, or both, based on the science 18 of learning to read, including multisensory strategies in foundation reading skills. All such programs shall fully 19 20 cooperate with the Alabama State Department of Education's 21 internal or external initiatives, such as the Barksdale 22 Reading Institute, that gauge compliance with the Literacy Act 23 to improve the preparation of classroom teachers. Any college or university not in compliance with these provisions by 24 25 January 2, 2022, as determined by the State Superintendent of 26 Education, shall have their Education Trust Fund appropriation

in Section 3C reduced by \$1,000,000 or one-half of one 1 2 percent, whichever is greater. The State Superintendent of Education shall certify the list of non-compliant colleges or 3 universities to the Finance Director, the Chair of the House 4 5 Ways and Means-Education, the Chair of the Senate Finance and Taxation-Education Committee, and the Deputy Director of the 6 7 Legislative Services Agency-Fiscal Division prior to any reduction in funding. 8

9 Section 5. (a) In addition to the appropriations 10 herein made, all gifts, grants, contributions, insurance proceeds or entitlements, in excess of the amount carried in 11 this act, including grants by the Congress of the United 12 13 States, municipalities or counties, to any department, division, board, bureau, commission, agency, institution, 14 15 office or officer of the State of Alabama are hereby appropriated and, in the event the same are recurring, are 16 reappropriated to such department, division, board, bureau, 17 18 commission, agency, institution, office or officer to be used only for the purpose or purposes for which the grant or 19 20 contribution was or shall be made. Further, all state, county, 21 municipal and educational entities are authorized to disburse 22 such sums as deemed necessary by mutual agreement between said entities and the State of Alabama, Department of Examiners of 23 24 Public Accounts to partially defray the cost of auditing 25 services performed by said agency. All such sums are hereby 26 appropriated and reappropriated if necessary to the Department of Examiners of Public Accounts for audit services, to be 27

expended through the fund established by Section 41-5A-22,
 Code of Alabama 1975.

(b) The State Superintendent of Education shall 3 encourage the Local Education Agencies to use federal stimulus 4 5 funds provided by the Congress of the United States through the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund for 6 7 one-time, non-recurring allowable expenses to address the 8 coronavirus pandemic in Alabama public schools. The Superintendent shall periodically report to the Finance 9 10 Director, Chairs of the Senate Finance and Taxation-Education Committee, House Ways and Means-Education Committee, and 11 12 Deputy Director of the Legislative Services Agency, Fiscal 13 Division, regarding the planned and actual expenditures of 14 these funds by the Local Education Agencies.

15 (c) The Local Education Agencies shall expend no 16 less than \$100,000,000 of all federal stimulus funds provided 17 by the Congress of the United States to address the 18 coronavirus pandemic in Alabama public schools to implement the safely opening schools program, to include, but not 19 20 limited to: screening, testing, isolation and quarantine of 21 students and school personnel with symptoms, in order to 22 protect students, teachers, and support personnel for schools 23 to return to full-time in-person education. Local school 24 boards shall have the choice to utilize the funds for the 25 above purposes to the degree that meets their individual 26 needs.

1 Section 6. The State Superintendent of Education 2 shall make requisitions to the State Comptroller in favor of the proper beneficiary in accordance with the law and rules 3 and regulations governing the expenditure or disbursement of 4 5 any and all funds appropriated to the State Department of Education and/or the State Board of Education in this act, 6 7 whereupon the Comptroller shall issue her warrant therefor. 8 All other appropriations in this act shall be paid after 9 proper requisitions are made to the State Comptroller in the 10 manner now provided by law.

Section 7. Nothing in this act shall be construed to 11 affect or repeal any law authorizing or permitting any 12 13 college, school or other education or eleemosynary institution 14 of the State to receive, collect or disburse any fees, 15 tuitions, charges, sales, endowments, trusts or income therefrom, which are now or may hereafter be authorized to 16 17 receive, collect or disburse. The receiving college, school or 18 institution shall further maintain separate accounts for such receipts or shall maintain a system of accounting which will 19 show a cash flow of such receipts received under the provision 20 21 of this appropriation.

22 Section 8. The appropriations made herein to the 23 departments, boards, offices, commissions, and agencies 24 include the amounts necessary and said departments, boards, 25 offices, commissions, and agencies are hereby directed to make 26 the transfer of funds to the State Personnel Department in the 27 amounts enumerated in the general appropriations act for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2022. All agencies and institutions enumerated in this act that receive services from other governmental agencies enumerated in this act or the general appropriations act shall make full payment in a timely manner (as determined by the Department of Finance) for such services.

7 Section 9. All encumbered balances of a previous 8 fiscal year appropriation other than the exclusions authorized by the Code of Alabama 1975, Section 41-4-93, shall lapse no 9 10 later than September 30 of the fiscal year immediately following the fiscal year for which the appropriation was made 11 and shall revert to the credit of the Education Trust Fund or 12 13 earmarked fund from which the appropriation or appropriations 14 were made.

15 Section 10. Upon certification to the Director of Finance by the State Attorney General that a federal court has 16 17 ordered the State of Alabama to pay claims, attorney fees, or 18 other costs relating to said court order, funds are hereby appropriated to the affected department, board, bureau, or 19 20 commission in the amount necessary to satisfy that court 21 order. Such appropriations are in addition to any other 22 appropriation heretofore or hereafter made in this 23 appropriation act. Such appropriations are conditioned upon 24 the availability of funds and a determination by the Director 25 of Finance that other current appropriations are not available for court-ordered payments. 26

Section 11. Local boards of education may exercise
 flexibility among line item expenditures, not to create a
 reduction of earned teacher units and/or local board of
 education support personnel.

5 Section 12. The State Superintendent of Education 6 may approve a request by a local board of education for 7 redirecting Other Current Expense funds designated for 8 pass-through calculations to their local Child Nutrition 9 Program if the redirected funds do not prevent the Child 10 Nutrition Program of that local board of education from 11 maintaining a one-month fund balance.

12 Section 13. The appropriations made herein to the 13 departments, boards, offices, commissions and agencies include 14 the amounts necessary to pay the State Employees' Insurance 15 Board (SEIB). The SEIB rate shall be \$930 per month for each 16 full-time employee for the fiscal year ending September 30, 17 2022. The State Employees' Insurance Board will adjust the 18 insurance program wherever appropriate to maintain the aforementioned fixed rate. 19

20 Section 14. Notwithstanding any other provisions of 21 this act or any other act, any amount from appropriations for 22 the fiscal year ending September 30, 2021 to the various state agencies and institutions in this act, including 23 24 appropriations from the Education Trust Fund, which are 25 unexpended and reverted on September 30, 2021 are hereby 26 reappropriated to the respective state agencies, offices and institutions for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2021. 27

1 Section 15. (a) The At-Risk and High Hopes 2 appropriations made to the State Department of Education shall be expended as follows: 50% shall be at the discretion of the 3 State Superintendent of Education and 50% shall be awarded in 4 5 the form of grants to school systems/entities for activities or programs designed to enhance outcomes for At-Risk Students. 6 7 At-Risk Students shall be defined as students who have not met 8 proficiency standards for state accountability assessments and 9 one or more of the following apply: the student attends a 10 Title I school; qualifies for free or reduced lunch; qualifies for special education or Tier III intervention; or is an 11 12 English language learner. In the awarding of grants, 13 preference will be given to undertakings that will directly 14 impact student achievement and improve performance on state 15 assessments to include remediation for students, after-school and tutorial programs, career/technical programs, character 16 education, enrichment activities, programs that enhance 17 18 reading and mathematics abilities in students, activities that increase grade-to-grade promotion, career and college 19 20 readiness and early warning and prevention programs. Programs 21 must employ evidence-based practices and measure student 22 growth and achievement using research-based norms and 23 criterion. Funds should be awarded on a per-pupil basis, with 24 no more than ten percent of the grant award going toward 25 personnel costs.

(b) In an effort to provide the best and most
 efficient implementation for intervention and innovation in

schools, administration of the grant awards shall be assigned 1 2 to the Alabama State Department of Education's Division of Administrative and Financial Support with evaluative input 3 from other Alabama State Department of Education advisory 4 5 personnel, including the State Superintendent of Education, as 6 appropriate. The grant application process must require 7 districts to submit plans to the Alabama State Department of Education detailing their intended use of the grant funds with 8 regard to student proficiency and growth. Grants may be 9 10 awarded any time after July 1st so schools can prepare for the new school year. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Alabama 11 State Department of Education's Division of Administrative and 12 13 Financial Support shall make every reasonable effort to notify 14 grant recipients of awards by August 1, 2021. No funding will 15 be available until October 1, 2021. Grantees will have no 16 guarantee of funding until October 1, 2021.

17 (c) Upon the awarding of any grant funds, the 18 Alabama State Department of Education must submit a report to the Chairs of the House Ways and Means-Education Committee and 19 20 the Senate Committee on Finance and Taxation-Education and the 21 Deputy Director of the Legislative Services Agency-Fiscal 22 Division, that shall indicate the grant-recipient districts and each district's plan for those funds. Those districts 23 24 shall submit follow-up reports indicating the results of those 25 plans from the previous school year by July 31, 2022.

26 Section 16. All nongovernmental entities, identified 27 by the Legislative Services Agency, which are allocated funds in Section 3 of this act shall file a report with the Chair of
the House Ways and Means-Education Committee, the Chair of the
Senate Committee on Finance and Taxation-Education, Finance
Director, and the Deputy Director of the Legislative Services
Agency-Fiscal Division regarding the proposed expenditures and
usage of the funds appropriated in the fiscal year ending
September 30, 2022.

8 Section 17. If any section, paragraph, sentence, 9 clause, provision or portion of this act or all or any portion 10 of the appropriations herein made is held unconstitutional or 11 invalid, it shall not affect any other section, paragraph, 12 sentence, clause, provision or portion of this act or any 13 other appropriation or appropriations or portion thereof 14 hereby made not in and of itself unconstitutional or invalid.

Section 18. All laws or parts of laws, general, special, private or local in conflict with or inconsistent with the provisions of this act are hereby expressly repealed.

Section 19. This act shall become effective onOctober 1, 2021.

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
