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11	WHEREAS, the people of the State of Alabama are
12	resolutely committed to providing a top quality education to
13	our children; and
14	WHEREAS, the Holocaust was one of the most horrific
15	tragedies in human history; and
16	WHEREAS, assault, harassment, and vandalism against
17	Jewish people remain at near historic levels across the United
18	States; and
19	WHEREAS, a 2018 survey from the Conference on Jewish
20	Material Claims Against Germany found that 31 percent of
21	Americans and 41 percent of millennials erroneously believe
22	that two million or fewer Jews were killed in the Holocaust;
23	and
24	WHEREAS, a 2018 survey from the same organization
25	found that 41 percent of Americans and two-thirds of
26	millennials do not know what Auschwitz was; and

WHEREAS, a 2020 survey from the same organization found that nearly two-thirds of young adults in the United States are unaware six million Jews were killed in the Holocaust; and

WHEREAS, a 2020 survey from the same organization found that 31 percent of young adults in Alabama could not name a single Nazi Concentration Camp, 10 percent were not sure if they believe the Holocaust happened, and nine percent erroneously believe the Jewish people caused the Holocaust; and

WHEREAS, in the past year there have been several anti-Semitic incidents in the State of Alabama including acts of vandalism at houses of worship and a school; and

WHEREAS, a 2020 survey conducted by the American Jewish Committee found that 90 percent of Americans value Holocaust education; and

WHEREAS, in her 2017 proclamation concerning the Days of Remembrance, Gov. Kay Ivey noted, "the people of the State of Alabama should always remember the terrible events of the Holocaust and remain vigilant against hatred, persecution and tyranny"; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That we commend the unwavering and heroic commitment of our state's educators to ensure our children have the knowledge and tools they need to become productive, upstanding, and informed members of society, and that we welcome the Alabama State Department of Education's

stated commitment to ensuring Alabama students have access to quality Holocaust education.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That we believe the forthcoming revised Alabama Course of Study social studies curriculum should contain components that ensure students learn the breadth of the history of anti-Semitism and the Holocaust, including the Third Reich dictatorship, concentration camp system, persecution of Jews and non-Jews, Jewish and non-Jewish resistance, and post-World War II trials, and communicates the impact of personal responsibility, civic engagement, and societal response in the context of the Holocaust.
