RECOGNIZING THE IMPORTANCE OF CLEAN WATER ACCESS IN

THE STATE OF ALABAMA AND ENDORSING THE MISSION OF CLEAN WATER

WHEREAS, as residents of Alabama rely on water access to support their economies, the state is committed to ensuring that access to water is available for all; and

WHEREAS, within Alabama are more than 132,000 miles of river and stream channels, and the state is thus entrusted with stewardship over 14 percent of all freshwater in the continental United States; the Mobile-Tensaw Delta at the head of Mobile Bay is one of the most biodiverse areas in the North American continent, and its watershed covers 65 percent of the state; as such, the preservation of this area is a responsibility held by the entire state; and

WHEREAS, Alabama is also home to the 9th largest deep-water port by total tonnage, located in Mobile; this economic driver spreads wealth through the entire state and attracts industry and jobs to the state; across the bay in Baldwin County, Alabama's fastest-growing county, access to

beautiful white sand beaches has helped drive Alabama's

tourism economy for decades and has made Alabama a national,

and international, destination; and

WHEREAS, since the days of the original Alabama settlers, access to rivers and streams - America's original "highways of commerce" - was of the utmost importance; the current sites of many of our cities and towns are due to their access to these waterways, and continued access to clean water remains critical to the health and vibrancy of Alabama's communities; and

WHEREAS, the article, "Water Access Issues in Alabama", published on the Alabama Cooperative Extension System website, summarizes the importance of water access to all Alabamians: "Transportation, sport fishing, seafood processing, and canoeing are among the many uses of Alabama's waterways. In the cities and towns along Alabama's many miles of waterfront, the way of life depends on waterfront access, and the economic web spun here stretches wide across the state. Entire economies of some small towns depend on access to waterways for traditional business uses, and water-related activities make a large impact on the state's economy"; and

WHEREAS, it is incumbent upon the people of Alabama to continue to work together to make sure that there is sufficient access to clean water in the state; this is the mission of Clean Water Alabama, and we recognize the vital importance of that mission to all Alabamians; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH
HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That this body recognizes the
importance of water access in Alabama and declares that it is
imperative that all Alabamians continue to work together to
