Upon certification and approval by the Deputy State Superintendent of the Office of Administrative and Financial Services that any newly formed city school system is an operational public school system within the State of Alabama, the Department shall ensure that any Foundation Program funds or other state funds allocated to the parent county board of education of the newly formed city school system for students that attended and were counted in the Average Daily Membership of the parent county board of education and now will attend the newly formed city school system shall be transferred to the newly formed city school system for operational expenses. The above appropriation shall be distributed by the State Board of Education in accordance with the provisions of Sections 16-13-230 through 16-13-239, Code of Alabama 1975, and all other laws and regulations of the State Board of Education relating to the expenditure of such funds. These funds shall be used to provide a minimum school term of 180 full instructional days, or the hourly equivalent thereof, and for equitable educational opportunities in the public schools of the State. It is the intent of the Legislature that funds appropriated from the Education Trust Fund shall not

be used to pay membership dues to any organization/association. Foundation Program calculations for FY 2021-2022 are based on the funding divisors set forth below. It is the intent of the Legislature that local boards of education have flexibility in determining where reductions are made. Any reductions made using flexibility of state units must comply with federal comparability and supplanting guidelines. The State Superintendent shall establish an approval system, including, but not limited to a menu of micro credentials, that relates directly to any valid teaching certificate holders' responsibilities as an educator. The State Board of Education shall adopt rules, as necessary, for initial or recertification criteria.

Notwithstanding Section 16-13-231.1(d), Code of Alabama 1975, there shall not be an appropriation for the 1% over the total cost of instructional salaries for the Foundation Program as calculated by the State Minimum Salary Schedule for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2021. For "Fringe Benefits" the rate per day for two personal days and five sick days (for units earned in the Foundation Program) shall be \$95. The Teachers' Retirement System employer rate shall be 12.43% of salaries for Tier I members and 11.32% of salaries for Tier II members. The Public Education Employees' Health Insurance Program (PEEHIP) rate shall be \$800 per month for each full-time employee. As funds are appropriated, the appropriation herein shall include funds to pay for substitute support employees for each day a support employee is absent.

For "Classroom Instructional Support," the uniform amounts used in determining the Foundation Program allowance for classroom instructional support shall be: (1) textbooks or digital resources at \$75.00 per pupil in average daily membership during the first 20 scholastic days after Labor Day of the preceding school year; (2) classroom materials and supplies at \$1,000.00 per unit earned in the Foundation Program; (3) technology at \$400.00 per unit earned in the Foundation Program; (4) professional development at \$100.00 per unit earned in the Foundation Program; and (5) library enhancement at \$157.72 per unit earned in the Foundation Program. Funds allocated for instructional support units to meet Advanced Education standards may be used for principals, assistant principals, counselors, and librarians as calculated by the State Department of Education and assigned to the schools where such units are earned. An instructional support unit earned for a principal shall be increased by .31 for elementary schools, .35 for middle schools, and .45 for secondary schools and unit schools. An instructional support unit earned for an assistant principal shall be increased by .10 for elementary schools, middle schools, secondary schools and unit schools. An instructional support unit earned for a counselor shall be increased by .03 for secondary schools and unit schools. The budgeting and expenditure of funds in the Foundation Program at the local level shall be determined and made by the local board of education in accordance with rules and regulations of the State Board of Education and all laws governing such school budgets and expenditures.

23 Section 4. Each college or university receiving an appropriation from the Education Trust Fund in Section 3C that 24 25 operates a public teacher preparation program leading to the 26 attainment of an initial elementary teaching certification shall be in compliance with the credit hour requirements of 27 28 reading or literacy coursework, or both, based on the science of learning to read, including multisensory strategies in 29 foundation reading skills. All such programs shall fully 30

1 cooperate with the Alabama State Department of Education's 2 internal or external initiatives, such as the Barksdale 3 Reading Institute, that gauge compliance with the Literacy Act to improve the preparation of classroom teachers. Any college 4 5 or university not in compliance with these provisions by January 2, 2022, as determined by the State Superintendent of 6 7 Education, shall have their Education Trust Fund appropriation in Section 3C reduced by \$1,000,000 or one-half of one 8 9 percent, whichever is greater. The State Superintendent of 10 Education shall certify the list of non-compliant colleges or universities to the Finance Director, the Chair of the House 11 Ways and Means-Education, the Chair of the Senate Finance and 12 13 Taxation-Education Committee, and the Deputy Director of the Legislative Services Agency-Fiscal Division prior to any 14 15 reduction in funding.

Section 5. (a) In addition to the appropriations 16 herein made, all gifts, grants, contributions, insurance 17 18 proceeds or entitlements, in excess of the amount carried in this act, including grants by the Congress of the United 19 20 States, municipalities or counties, to any department, 21 division, board, bureau, commission, agency, institution, 22 office or officer of the State of Alabama are hereby 23 appropriated and, in the event the same are recurring, are 24 reappropriated to such department, division, board, bureau, 25 commission, agency, institution, office or officer to be used 26 only for the purpose or purposes for which the grant or contribution was or shall be made. Further, all state, county, 27

municipal and educational entities are authorized to disburse 1 2 such sums as deemed necessary by mutual agreement between said entities and the State of Alabama, Department of Examiners of 3 Public Accounts to partially defray the cost of auditing 4 5 services performed by said agency. All such sums are hereby 6 appropriated and reappropriated if necessary to the Department 7 of Examiners of Public Accounts for audit services, to be expended through the fund established by Section 41-5A-22, 8 Code of Alabama 1975. 9

10 (b) The Local Education Agencies shall expend no less than \$150,000,000 of the federal stimulus funds provided 11 by the Congress of the United States to address the 12 13 coronavirus pandemic in Alabama public schools through the 14 Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund 15 (ESSERF) to implement the safely opening schools program, to include, but not limited to: screening, testing, isolation and 16 17 quarantine of students with symptoms and a school nurse at 18 each school, in order to protect students, teachers, and support personnel for schools to return to full-time in-person 19 20 education. Local school boards shall have the choice to 21 utilize the funds for the above purposes to the degree that 22 meets their individual needs.

23 Section 6. The State Superintendent of Education 24 shall make requisitions to the State Comptroller in favor of 25 the proper beneficiary in accordance with the law and rules 26 and regulations governing the expenditure or disbursement of 27 any and all funds appropriated to the State Department of Education and/or the State Board of Education in this act, whereupon the Comptroller shall issue her warrant therefor. All other appropriations in this act shall be paid after proper requisitions are made to the State Comptroller in the manner now provided by law.

Section 7. Nothing in this act shall be construed to 6 7 affect or repeal any law authorizing or permitting any 8 college, school or other education or eleemosynary institution 9 of the State to receive, collect or disburse any fees, 10 tuitions, charges, sales, endowments, trusts or income therefrom, which are now or may hereafter be authorized to 11 12 receive, collect or disburse. The receiving college, school or 13 institution shall further maintain separate accounts for such receipts or shall maintain a system of accounting which will 14 15 show a cash flow of such receipts received under the provision 16 of this appropriation.

17 Section 8. The appropriations made herein to the 18 departments, boards, offices, commissions, and agencies 19 include the amounts necessary and said departments, boards, 20 offices, commissions, and agencies are hereby directed to make 21 the transfer of funds to the State Personnel Department in the 22 amounts enumerated in the general appropriations act for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2022. All agencies and 23 24 institutions enumerated in this act that receive services from 25 other governmental agencies enumerated in this act or the general appropriations act shall make full payment in a timely 26

1 manner (as determined by the Department of Finance) for such 2 services.

Section 9. All encumbered balances of a previous 3 fiscal year appropriation other than the exclusions authorized 4 5 by the Code of Alabama 1975, Section 41-4-93, shall lapse no later than September 30 of the fiscal year immediately 6 7 following the fiscal year for which the appropriation was made and shall revert to the credit of the Education Trust Fund or 8 9 earmarked fund from which the appropriation or appropriations 10 were made.

Section 10. Upon certification to the Director of 11 Finance by the State Attorney General that a federal court has 12 13 ordered the State of Alabama to pay claims, attorney fees, or other costs relating to said court order, funds are hereby 14 15 appropriated to the affected department, board, bureau, or 16 commission in the amount necessary to satisfy that court 17 order. Such appropriations are in addition to any other 18 appropriation heretofore or hereafter made in this 19 appropriation act. Such appropriations are conditioned upon 20 the availability of funds and a determination by the Director 21 of Finance that other current appropriations are not available for court-ordered payments. 22

23 Section 11. Local boards of education may exercise 24 flexibility among line item expenditures, not to create a 25 reduction of earned teacher units and/or local board of 26 education support personnel. 1 Section 12. The State Superintendent of Education 2 may approve a request by a local board of education for 3 redirecting Other Current Expense funds designated for 4 pass-through calculations to their local Child Nutrition 5 Program if the redirected funds do not prevent the Child 6 Nutrition Program of that local board of education from 7 maintaining a one-month fund balance.

Section 13. The appropriations made herein to the 8 departments, boards, offices, commissions and agencies include 9 10 the amounts necessary to pay the State Employees' Insurance Board (SEIB). The SEIB rate shall be \$930 per month for each 11 full-time employee for the fiscal year ending September 30, 12 13 2022. The State Employees' Insurance Board will adjust the 14 insurance program wherever appropriate to maintain the 15 aforementioned fixed rate.

16 Section 14. Notwithstanding any other provisions of 17 this act or any other act, any amount from appropriations for 18 the fiscal year ending September 30, 2021 to the various state agencies and institutions in this act, including 19 appropriations from the Education Trust Fund, which are 20 21 unexpended and reverted on September 30, 2021 are hereby 22 reappropriated to the respective state agencies, offices and institutions for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2021. 23

24 Section 15. (a) The At-Risk and High Hopes 25 appropriations made to the State Department of Education shall 26 be expended as follows: 50% shall be at the discretion of the 27 State Superintendent of Education and 50% shall be awarded in

the form of grants to school systems/entities for activities 1 2 or programs designed to enhance outcomes for At-Risk Students. At-Risk Students shall be defined as students who have not met 3 proficiency standards for state accountability assessments and 4 5 one or more of the following apply: the student attends a 6 Title I school; qualifies for free or reduced lunch; qualifies 7 for special education or Tier III intervention; or is an 8 English language learner. In the awarding of grants, 9 preference will be given to undertakings that will directly 10 impact student achievement and improve performance on state assessments to include remediation for students, after-school 11 and tutorial programs, career/technical programs, character 12 13 education, enrichment activities, programs that enhance 14 reading and mathematics abilities in students, activities that 15 increase grade-to-grade promotion, career and college 16 readiness and early warning and prevention programs. Programs 17 must employ evidence-based practices and measure student 18 growth and achievement using research-based norms and criterion. Funds should be awarded on a per-pupil basis, with 19 20 no more than ten percent of the grant award going toward 21 personnel costs.

(b) In an effort to provide the best and most
efficient implementation for intervention and innovation in
schools, administration of the grant awards shall be assigned
to the Alabama State Department of Education's Division of
Administrative and Financial Support with evaluative input
from other Alabama State Department of Education advisory

personnel, including the State Superintendent of Education, as 1 2 appropriate. The grant application process must require districts to submit plans to the Alabama State Department of 3 Education detailing their intended use of the grant funds with 4 5 regard to student proficiency and growth. Grants may be awarded any time after July 1st so schools can prepare for the 6 7 new school year. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Alabama State Department of Education's Division of Administrative and 8 9 Financial Support shall make every reasonable effort to notify 10 grant recipients of awards by August 1, 2021. No funding will be available until October 1, 2021. Grantees will have no 11 guarantee of funding until October 1, 2021. 12

13 (c) Upon the awarding of any grant funds, the 14 Alabama State Department of Education must submit a report to 15 the Chairs of the House Ways and Means-Education Committee and 16 the Senate Committee on Finance and Taxation-Education and the 17 Deputy Director of the Legislative Services Agency-Fiscal 18 Division, that shall indicate the grant-recipient districts and each district's plan for those funds. Those districts 19 20 shall submit follow-up reports indicating the results of those 21 plans from the previous school year by July 31, 2022.

22 Section 16. All nongovernmental entities, identified 23 by the Legislative Services Agency, which are allocated funds 24 in Section 3 of this act shall file a report with the Chair of 25 the House Ways and Means-Education Committee, the Chair of the 26 Senate Committee on Finance and Taxation-Education, Finance 27 Director, and the Deputy Director of the Legislative Services Agency-Fiscal Division regarding the proposed expenditures and
 usage of the funds appropriated in the fiscal year ending
 September 30, 2022.

4 Section 17. If any section, paragraph, sentence, 5 clause, provision or portion of this act or all or any portion 6 of the appropriations herein made is held unconstitutional or 7 invalid, it shall not affect any other section, paragraph, 8 sentence, clause, provision or portion of this act or any 9 other appropriation or appropriations or portion thereof 10 hereby made not in and of itself unconstitutional or invalid.

Section 18. All laws or parts of laws, general,
 special, private or local in conflict with or inconsistent
 with the provisions of this act are hereby expressly repealed.

14Section 19. This act shall become effective on15October 1, 2021.
