8	HONORING GOVERNOR JOHN MALCOLM PATTERSON ON THE
9	OCCASION OF HIS CENTENNIAL YEAR.

11	WHEREAS, it is a great pleasure and privilege to
12	extend our highest commendations and honor to Governor John
13	Malcolm Patterson on the momentous occasion of his centennial
14	year; and
15	WHEREAS, born on September 27, 1921, in Goldville,
16	Alabama, to Albert Love Patterson and Agnes Louise Benson
17	Patterson, John Patterson graduated from Central High School
18	in Phenix City and began his celebrated career of public
19	service by joining the U.S. Army at only 17 years old, needing
20	his father's permission to do so; quickly rising through the
21	ranks to major, young John served honorably in World War II,
22	earning a Bronze Star for his meritorious service with an
23	artillery battalion in military campaigns across North Africa,
24	Sicily, Italy, Southern France, and Germany; and
25	WHEREAS, John Patterson married the late Mary Jo
26	McGowin in 1947, and they had two children, Albert Love
27	Patterson, III and Barbara Patterson Scholl; he attended The

University of Alabama, majoring in political science, and received his law degree in 1949; he was recalled by the Army for service in the Korean War and was transferred to the Judge Advocate General section; after his military service, Mr. Patterson returned to Phenix City in 1953 and practiced law with his father until his father was assassinated as he left his law office; John assumed the law and order mantle of his fallen father and was elected the thirty-sixth Attorney General of Alabama on a campaign platform to end the illegal gambling operations and corruption that had been pervasive throughout Phenix City and elsewhere in the state; and

WHEREAS, in 1958, he defeated George Wallace in the race for Governor and was sworn into office on January 19, 1959, becoming the second youngest person to ever serve as Governor; and as Governor, John Patterson amassed a remarkable resume: He devised a rescue plan for the state's schools, which were in disrepair and underfunded; he called a special legislative session on education to raise teachers' salaries and pass a \$100 million bond issue for schools; he worked fiercely to pass a \$60 million bond issue for highway construction and maintenance; he obtained desperately needed additional revenue for education, state pensions, and mental health by increasing the state sales tax on liquor and cigarettes and closing several sales tax loopholes; and he marshalled support for the passage of a much needed small-loan law that effectively curtailed the activities of loan sharks; and

WHEREAS, after serving with distinction and dedication in Montgomery for eight years, Mr. Patterson returned home to practice law and teach American government at Troy State University; in 1975, he married the former Florentina "Tina" Brachert Sawyer, to whom he has been wedded for 45 joyous years; unable to refrain from serving his state, in 1984, the distinguished gentleman accepted an appointment to the Alabama Court of Criminal Appeals; during his respected tenure on the court, Judge Patterson authored over 450 opinions; and, in 2004, as his last act of public service, he was sworn in as the Special Chief Justice of the Alabama Supreme Court to preside over an appeal; and

WHEREAS, Governor Patterson has long been known for his impeccable dress, courtly manner, genteel speech, and gracious and generous demeanor; he served the state admirably as Attorney General and Governor, but many believe his true calling was in a judicial robe; unquestionably an extraordinary legal scholar, Judge Patterson lent wisdom, fairness, common sense, and refined judicial temperament to the courts of Alabama; and

WHEREAS, John Patterson remains razor sharp and amazingly astute; he is a joy to share a beverage with and feast on his wisdom, wit, and waggish yarns; his remarkable life is a treasure trove of Alabama and American history; few Alabamians have prominently participated in government from such varied and influential vantage points, and his contributions to our state and country remain meaningful,

continuing, and significant; and after a lifetime spent in the service of our state and country, John Patterson now resides as a full-time gentleman farmer with his wife, Tina, at the place of his birth, Timbergut Farm, in Goldville, Alabama; now therefore,
