11	WHEREAS, on December 7, 2020, Senator Cam Ward of
12	Alabaster, Alabama, continued his public service by assuming

WHEREAS, after serving as a Deputy Attorney General under Attorney General Bill Pryor, Assistant Secretary of State for election laws and corporate filings, and District Director for Congressman Spencer Bachus, Cam Ward was selected for a Marshall Memorial fellowship in Europe, where he observed the democratic process at several European capitols; his international political experience also includes service on the Spain-U.S. Council and the American Council of Young Political Leaders; and

WHEREAS, after returning home to Shelby County to practice law in 2001, Cam Ward helped lead the economic development efforts of Alabaster, prior to his election to the House of Representatives in 2002; after serving two terms in the House, Cam Ward won election to the Senate in 2010; he served as Chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee for nine years, and President of the Alabama Law Institute for 10 years; and

WHEREAS, during his terms of office in the Alabama Legislature, Cam Ward leveraged his deep understanding of the democratic process and reached across every aisle necessary to achieve meaningful progress for the peoples of Alabama in the areas of economic growth, ethics laws, and criminal justice, earning a well-deserved reputation as a true statesman and a scholar; and

WHEREAS, Cam Ward has been recognized for his service to the State of Alabama and the nation as a whole; in addition to earning national marks for his efforts in
